

A legacy of spelling changes

Duxbury's name is the result of a legacy of spelling changes. Two centuries passed before the version we now use finally took hold, as the Old English language of New England settlers gave way to a new and improved American spin on the mother tongue.

Ready for the breakdown? Here goes...

The town originally started out as "Ducksborrow," which morphed into "Duxborrow," and from there it was changed to "Duxbury."

But wait! "Duxbury" only lasted for a couple of decades and then was traded in for "Duxboro," until residents apparently decided that they really like "Duxbury" after all, and thus the name has remained for more than 170 years.

Amidst a flurry of letter trade-offs (where the "ck" was upgraded to the more compact "x," and the "w" was dropped for the simpler "o" and then the more fashionable "y,") no one is will-

ing to say for certain how the town got its name to begin with.

But maybe one doesn't need to look beyond the obvious.

The original name "Ducksborrow" is pretty self explanatory - Duxbury was a favorite hangout for ducks. Those who find this explanation too easy, or lacking in nobility, will point to various history books that try to link the name to Captain Myles Standish, saying that the town was named in honor of the Standish family who resided in the township of Duxbury in Lancashire, England. However, this is considered a defunct theory, because it does not coincide with Standish's own account of his family tree, as he chooses to connect himself with a different Standish family from a different English town.

However, naming a town after ducks may not be simplistic or ignoble at all.

The fact that wildlife chose Duxbury's bay over other options is a worthy thing to note. The town's oceanfront is among the best on the

South Shore and down the arm of the Cape. While other towns have been forced to close their waterfront to shellfish harvesting and sometimes even to swimming because of coastal pollution, Duxbury has never had this problem. The bay loses almost two-thirds of its water with every tide, and such flushing keeps the water clean and free from bacteria buildup.

Apparently, the ducks recognized a good piece of property when they saw it, and quite frankly, the ducks were right.
