

## Teen Faces Attempted Murder, Hate Crime Charges in Marshfield Assault

A Duxbury resident is facing attempted murder charges after he and several others allegedly beat a man outside a Marshfield restaurant.

Jay Rains, 19, of Standish Street as well as Michael Anderson of Quincy, and Kevin Shdeed and Amanda Kelly of Marshfield, were charged with civil rights violations in addition to assault and battery charges stemming from an attack on Tizaya Robinson, a black Jamaica Plain man, outside the Garlic restaurant in Marshfield.

Rains was a Duxbury High School senior this year. A witness told police she had never seen "such a brutal beating in her life."

Police received a call shortly after midnight from a neighbor stating there was a fight outside the restaurant, according to a police report. Marshfield Police officer Michael Donovan responded to the call and discovered pools of blood in the parking lot and

on the street across from the restaurant. He also found a broken beer bottle and a long stick, both covered in blood.

While patrolling the area, Donovan ran into Rains, who claimed he had been jumped from behind and attacked with mace. He was shirtless and appeared intoxicated, the report said. While Donovan took Rains to a nearby convenience store to wash the mace from his eyes and face, Rains repeatedly used a racial slur to describe his attacker, the report said. Donovan reported that Rains used the term at least 25 times, to the point he was worried about disturbing the neighbors. When Donovan and Rains returned to Garlic, Rains was identified by a witness as part of a mob that had been kicking, hitting and jumping on Robinson.

Rains was then arrested and read his rights, and refused medical treatment, according to the report.

An eyewitness in the police report said she saw Rains in a group of 10-12 people beating Robinson, kicking him,

punching him while shouting racial slurs. Robinson hopped a fence and tried to run away but was caught on the other side of the street. When the witness tried to approach the fight, she was spat upon by Kelly, who told her to "mind her business," according to the report.

Two other witnesses at the scene identified Rains as the instigator of the fight, the report stated. They said he was calling Robinson as well as another black man who left the area a racial epithet.

Robinson was taken to the South Shore Hospital emergency room after the attack to treat multiple stab wounds on his arms and legs. He had been discharged from the hospital on Monday. Attempts to contact him for comment were unsuccessful. He told police he was attacked by 10 to 12 people who hit him over the head with bottles and stabbed him because of his race, the police report states. Robinson also told officers he used mace to defend himself.

Rains was charged with assault and battery to intimidate, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, civil rights violation with injury and attempted murder. He does not have an attorney, according to a clerk at Plymouth District Court. He is being held without bail and is due back in court July 10.

Attempts to contact Rains or his family were unsuccessful. Rains' address in Duxbury had an unlisted phone number. A phone call placed to an additional number attributed to Rains was not returned as of press time.
