Work Of Mrs. Bush-Brown On Exhibit At Library

DUXBURY — A retrospective exhibition of the paintings of Mrs. Marjorie Conant Bush-Brown is being shown through July 6 in the Helen Bumpus Gallery of the Free Library.

Because Mrs. Bush-Brown has been painting seriously for 65 years, the exhibition affords an opportunity to study the different stages of an artist's development. The artist at age 16 began her studies at the Boston Museum Art School. On the advice of her teacher, Frank Benson, she spent two years in Paris studying art and traveling in France and Italy. Upon her return she studied for

two years more at the Museum School.

Her paintings have been chosen by juries for national and international shows.

In her early years as a painter, Mrs. Bush-Brown, then Marjorie Conant, was a summer resident of Duxbury where she taught children's art classes and became a charter member of the Duxbury Art Association, founded in the early 1900s through the initiative of Charles Bittinger.

The exhibition may be seen during regular library hours from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. weekdays and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday.
