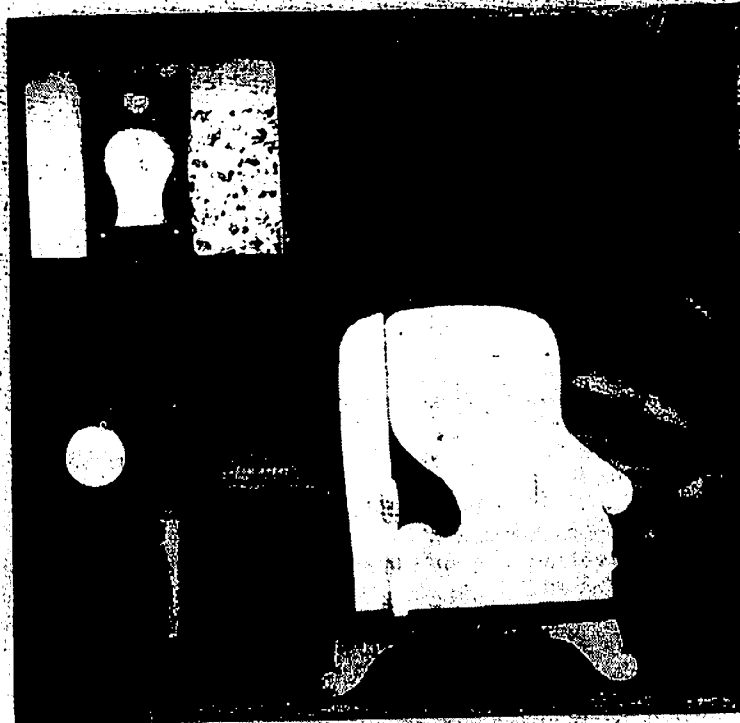
The works being shown have been loaned by the Peridot Gallery of New York, the Weeden Gallery of Boston, and from the artist's personal collection.
