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THE LATEST REPORT

Tree Warden Roy Parks and Malcolm Brock of the Elm Tree committee attended the State conference of the Trees and Parks Ass'n at Waltham Field Station Friday. The whole day was devoted to reports and discussions regarding the Dutch Elm Tree Disease. Details of the current status of the disease and methods of control were given by authorities from eight states.

The disease is still spreading. Where thorough spraying is carried out, and where all diseased trees are removed, losses are being kept below 1%. Where a sound control program is in effect, Trees lost could well be replanted with elms, but not in the same spot. Present methods of spraying from the ground showed possible insecticide coverage on tops of tall trees. Spraying by helicopter was recommended if used in conjunction with spraying from the ground, but not if used alone.
