PHOTO EXHIBIT

An exhibition of photographs by John Forgit will be open Sunday, Sept. 24, in the Helen Bumpus Gallery of the Duxbury Free Library.

The photographs in the gallery will be a study of old New England, depicting the age of the area, both by architecture and natural situations, in an all black and white exhibition.

Forgit, originally from Worcester, is a Duxbury resident. His work has appeared in the Goddard Library of Clark University, Worcester, in a group exhibit. This is his first one man show.

Personal growth being a main objective in his work, Forgit follows the idea stated by Edward Weston, "The question is



not whether am I better than the next, but am I alone better than yesterday."

Those in the area who are seriously interested in photography are invited to an evening of open critique on their own works on Oct. 18, at 8 p.m. The number will be limited by Forgit to the work of ten people,

two pieces each--but all are welcome to attend this informal event. Photographers who would like their work considered should submit it to the library during the week of Oct. 9.

The gallery will be open week days 10-9, Saturdays 10-6, and Sundays 2-5, with the Forgit exhibition showing through Oct. 22.
