Born in Boston and now living and painting in Brookline, Miss Bohlen is a 1953 graduate of Radcliffe College. She studied painting in 1952 with Hyman Bloom at the Fogg Art Museum and continued to study with him on a private basis. She has studied sculpture with Frank Tock and Harold Tovish.

She has had one woman exhibitions at the Swetsoff Gallery, the Shore Gallery, the Frago Gallery, and the Carl Siembab Gallery in Boston and is currently represented by the Farr Gallery of New York City.

Her work is represented in many private collections, including the Gerry Goldberg Collection.

The gallery is open, weekdays 10-9, Saturdays 10-6 and Sundays 2-5.
