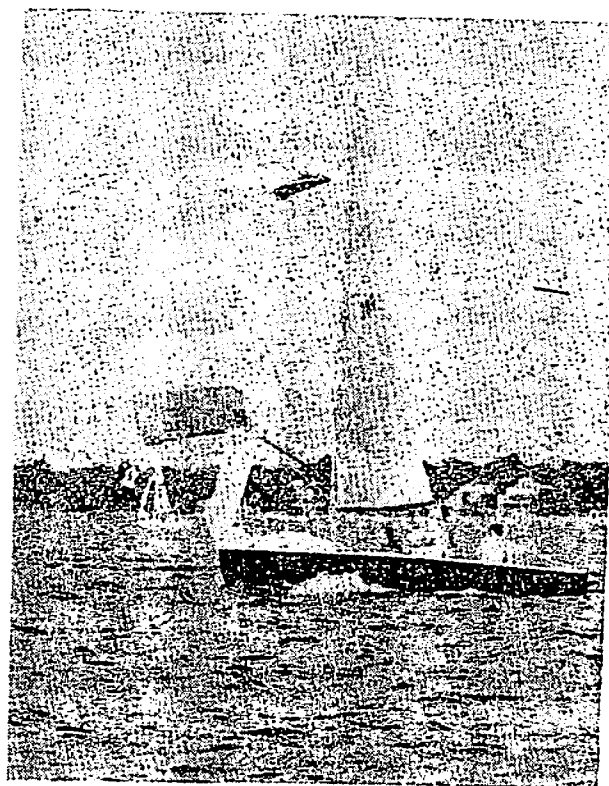
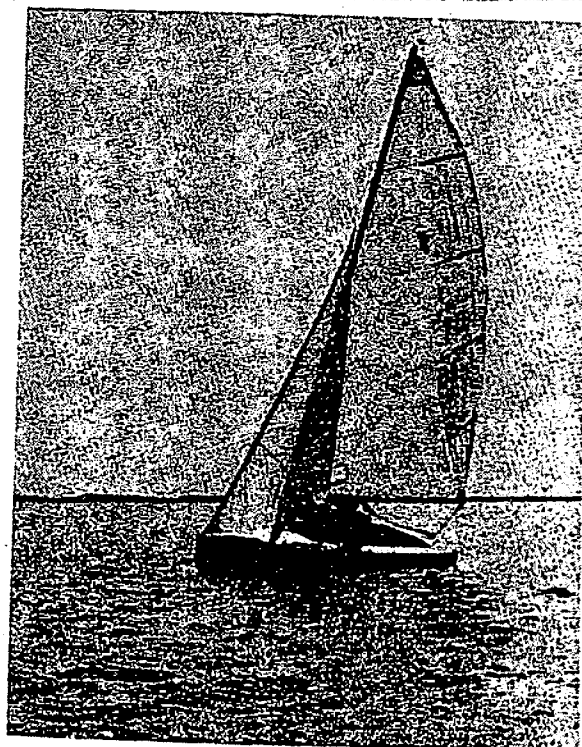
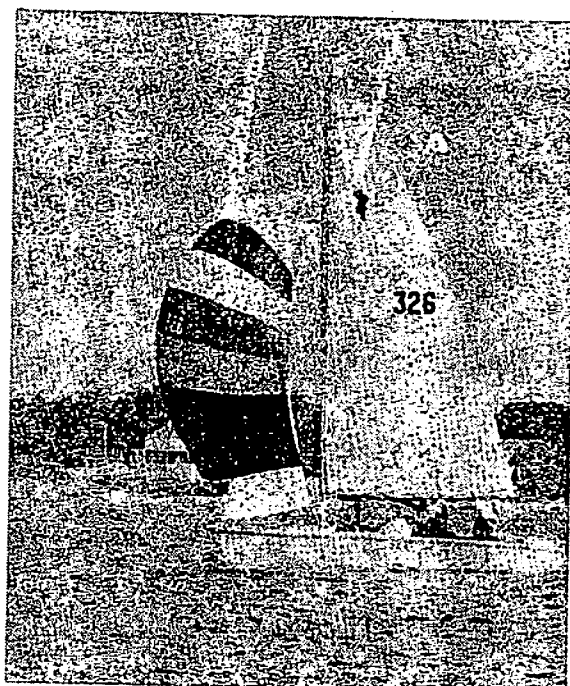


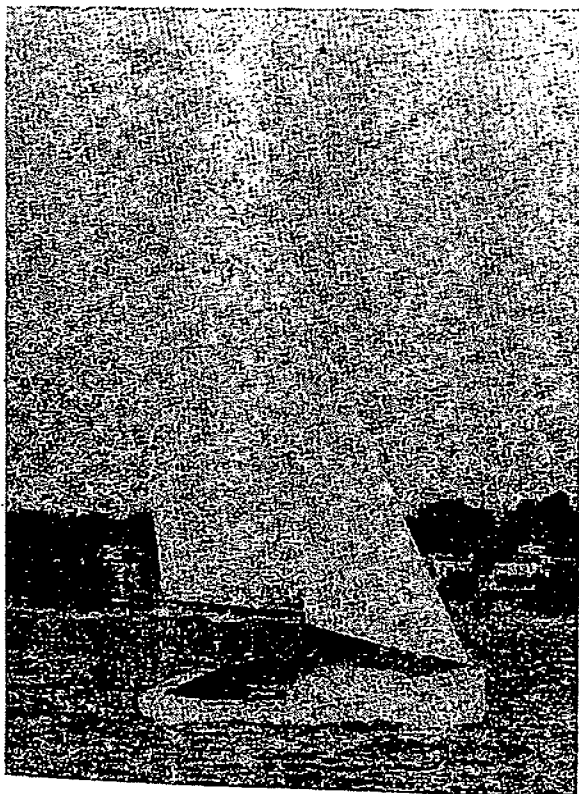
Bob Ross and son Tammy are in 160, and at the rudder of 89 is Dr. Belton Burrows.



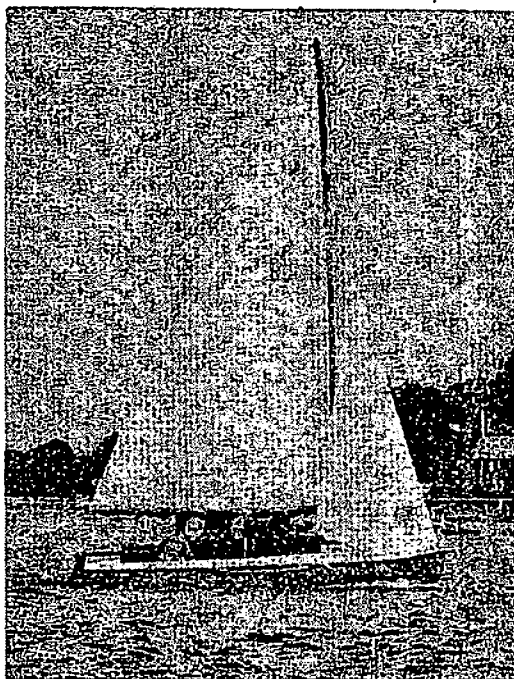
