

Urge Reservation at Duxbury Beach

The special legislative commission appointed to study and recommend legislation relative to development and regulation of Salisbury and Duxbury beaches gave a hearing at the State House today to residents of the district, who recommended that both places be converted into reservations.

J. P. Bryant of Marshfield, who favored a reservation at Duxbury Beach, felt that it would relieve the surrounding communities from the yearly expense of repairing the Powder Point Bridge which connects the town and the beach.

Representative Ernest W. Haskell of Merrimack, House chairman of the commission, then announced: "I think the commission favors the establishment of a reservation at Duxbury beach. We feel sure that if we recommend too elaborate a program that it would be voted down in the Legislature."

Harold V. Kellogg, architect, requested that buildings be prohibited on the reservation. He felt sure that it should not be "covered with cheap buildings."

There were 42 persons at the hearing, which was the second on both proposals. Chairman George E. Dow, of the Salisbury selectmen, told the commission that the majority of the people he talked with were in favor of a reservation at that beach.
