LIBRARY EXHIBIT

An exhibition of the paintings of Robinson Murray will open in the Helen Bumpus Gallery of the Duxbury Free Library with a reception for the artist Sunday, June 20, from 5 to 7. The public is invited.

Mr. Murray, a resident of Duxbury, is a New Englander by birth. He studied drawing and painting during his student days at Harvard and also at the Vesper George School of Art in Boston.

After working as a commercial artist for a number of years, he turned to a business career in advertising and became managing director of the branch office of a large advertising agency in Paris and London, where he lived with his family for seven years.

Upon his retirement from business in 1951, when he settled in Duxbury, he returned to painting as an occupation. His work has been exhibited in New England and in cities throughout



the country, including New York, Boston, Springfield, and Hartford.

The artist describes his work as a controlled form of abstraction, largely based on identifiable objects. Characteristic of his work is a sensitive use of color harmonies and simplification of basic design.

Mr. Murray is past president of the Duxbury Art Association, a member of a number of other art associations, and a member of the Copley Society of Boston,
