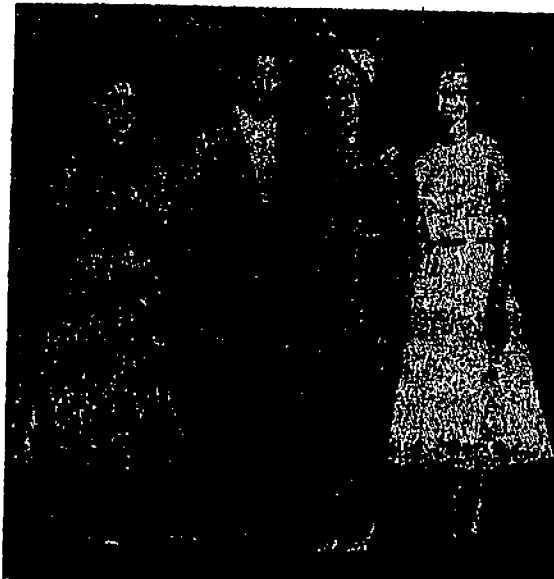


One Champion Crowns Another

"Outward Bound" Will Open
Tonight At Center Theatre

The Plymouth Rock Center of Music and Drama opens its 1954 music series this season with one of Gilbert and Sullivan's most popular operettas "The Gondoliers" on Wednesday, July 14, for a 4-day run through Saturday with a special Children's Matinee on Thursday, July 15, at 2:30. "The Gondoliers" is a delightful, double-barreled take-off on opera itself and the shifting political forms of the late 19th century. With their comedy goes some of the greatest music of the Gilbert and Sullivan tradition. Robert Myhrum has staged the production in a setting by John Kurten with musical direction by George Poinar.

The Stars

Lorraine Smorol, who sang the title role in "Amahl and the Night Visitor" in 1952, and Betty Hodges and Mildred Allen, two of the Center's most popular 1953 sopranos will be singing the roles of Giannetta and Tessa, the pert little peasant young ladies who marry the gondoliers just before they are sent to the fabulous land of Barataria to rule as one individual. Once there the gondoliers set up a "republican" monarchy—which means that the king does all the work for the Lord High Cook and Butler. Tenors Bill Anderson and Anthony DeRienzo will share the role of Marco and John Colleary and Jim Billings, Giuseppe.

The blue bloods in the operetta are the Duke of Plaza-Toro and his family played by Fred Griesinger, Joan Caplan (the Duchess), and Ada Mae Renfer and Violet Villani sharing the role of their daughter Casilda. Edward Robichaud, who sang "Cardo" in Pagliacci and Don Jose in Carmen in 1953, will be Luiz, the hero in disguise as a servant.
