Four classic films will be presented Monday, June 8, in the Helen Bumpus Gallery of the Duxbury Free Library, from 8-10 p.m. Shown in connection with the "Under 21 Show" now featured in the gallery, the four short films were selected by Magnus Johnstone, one of the young artists in the exhibit.

During intermissions, Jill Jones will sing and accompany herself on the guitar. Artists and friends are invited, as well

as all those under or over 21 who have enjoyed the present show.

The films, borrowed from the Boston Public Library, are: "A," a contemporary cartoon inspired by a theme by Ionesco; "The Hole," a witty animated film with the voices of Dizzie Gillespie and George Mathews improvising an argument by two workmen anxious about accidental nuclear explosion; "In the Park," with Marcel Marceau miming a number of characters; and "The Odessa Steps," an excerpt from Serge Eisenstein's 1925 silent film "Potemkin" depicting the horrors of revolution.

Artists are asked to pick up their work at the end of the program June 8 or after June 9, rather than on June 6 as previously announced.
