## Lillie exhibit in last week

The exhibit of Loyd Lillie's drawings and sculptures at the Helen Bumpus Gallery in the Duxbury Free Library will close on Dec. 6. This month long exhibition has drawn many art lovers to view the works of the gifted artist.

In her review of the Lillie exhibit, Margaret Jolnstone says: "The Lloyd Lillie exhibition at the Helen Bumpus Gallery, Duxbury, surpasses the dimensions of impressive. Upon entering the room, one is enveloped by the life and vivacity of spirit that expires from the moving and speaking sculpture. Magic and an overwhelming power release a light, a silent truth in the breath of creation within."

### Art show for children Dec. 11

The annual Children's Art Show will follow the Lillie Exhibit into the Helen Bumpus Gallery at the Duxbury Free Library beginning Dec. 11.

Miss Gay Youse, gallery art director, announced that the show will include works by Duxbury children from kindergarten through the fourth grade. Deadline for submission of drawings or paintings is Dec. 6.

Again this year, a tree will be erected in the rotunda and the children invited to decorate it with their own creations.

Two classes are being conducted at the library in conjunction with the art show; a children's art class conducted by Miss Youse and a class in creative dramatics under Pamjaneel Peters, a library page.

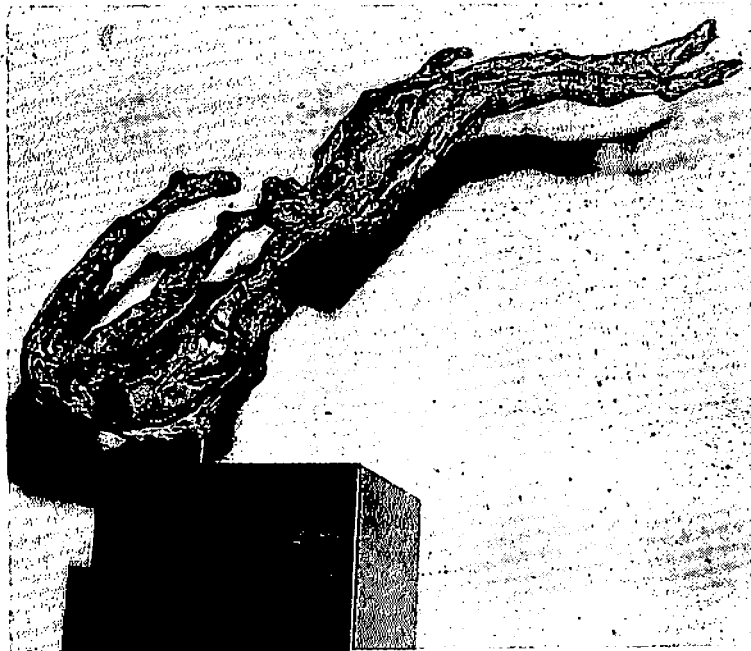
"Commencing in the rotunda, one is greeted by a pensive standing figure of a woman with drape, encompassed by an aura of thought, the soft color even suggesting a mood itself. Two heads directly behind portray dark and light moods, while a pulsating life vibrates in the horse and men figures to the right and a seated woman regards from the left. Two heads of young girls and a terra cotta mask also observe from their stands, their visages speaking individually."

"Several other figured sculptures stand in the adjoining room. Feelings of falling, isolation, and being trapped expand themselves."

Several figure and head drawings rest on the walls between bronze relief sculptures of falling figures tumbling into boundless depths. One relief, fighting against defeat and the tragedies of existence is expressed in Samurai battle.

"A freedom with strength lives in this exhibition; a deep expression from a feeling soul extracts itself, offering food for thought and a taste toward understanding the alive spirit."

The exhibit, selected and arranged by Miss Gay Youse, library art director, is open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. on weekdays, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and 2 to 5 p.m. on Sunday. Admission, of course, is free.
