## Who Is It?



Mrs. X, who was born in Akron, Ohio, spent 2 years in a convent school in Milford, Conn., when her father, who designed tires, was transferred from Akron. Mrs. X graduated from Gateway, a secondary school for girls in New Haven, Conn. She was a member of the fencing team coached by the retired fencing mentor at Yale. She did well in competition because of her "long arms and legs."

She graduated from Wellesley College with the Class of 1962. She majored in history and the Bible, which qualified her for a job with the Oxford University Press in New York City. (She lived for a couple of years in Greenwich Village).

Assigned to the Bible department, she worked as a copy editor. Her assignments included editorial work on the annotated version of the Revised Standard version of the Bible, and the re-editing of the Schofield Reference Bible. Her editorial experience included layout and paste-up.

On Valentine's Day in 1965 she was married to a manufacturing representative, whom she met on a blind date while at Wellesley College. When they moved to Winchester, Mass., Mrs. X became an administrative assistant working with graduate fellowships and scholarships. In 1967 Mrs. X and her husband moved to Duxbury to his family home, one of the town's older Capes. She began taking an active role in community life, an experience which proved contagious for her husband who now serves as chairman of the Historical Commission.

On the side she and her husband raise cows, pigs, sheep, chickens and turkeys.

Her hobbies include sailing, sewing, cooking, reading and "avoiding housework."

An associate director of the Massachusetts Audubon Society, she is a member of its sanctuary committee.

Meanwhile, she is studying for a master's degree in public administration at Northeastern University. She is now in her second year.

After serving with distinction on one 7-man committee which has a lot to do with conservation, she was elected to another 7-man committee which has a lot to do with shaping the future of Duxbury.
