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Tsang's Cafe Opens in Marketplace

Since Wayne Tsang took over the former restaurant location next to SportWorks last July the place has been completely renovated and remodeled.

Six months of hard work later, Tsang's Cafe at the Duxbury Crossroads Marketplace has finally opened its doors. Last weekend Tsang's hosted a party for fellow business people in the retail complex where several of his neighbors gave him symbolic "thumbs up".

Tsang's has a smartly styled decor with an open airy feeling. Tsang, himself, designed the interior to be both functional and inviting to diners, offering clean lines and a soft color and lighting scheme, easy on the eyes.

Linen table cloths and napkins, tasteful dinner and flatware all add to the neatness and ambience of the dining area which is set above a lower function area adjacent to the bar. Tsang's is a voluntary no-smoking establishment with a full liquor license serving exotic and other drinks, select beers and wines.

Tsang says he stakes his 21 years in the business on his menu. He manages the restaurant and is directly involved in the kitchen and food preparation.

Good taste is important to Tsang and his selection of Chinese cuisine reflects that.

The menu offers something for everyone with a full range of individual appetizers including traditional favorites such as Crab Rangoon and Peking Ravioli. A nice feature is the four item Tsang's Delights for \$9.25 with four separate and varied combinations such as egg roll, boneless spareribs, chicken wings, and fried shrimp and the larger PuPu platter.

But it's the chef's specialties in which Tsang takes particular pride. He says his menu combines the best Cantonese, Szechwan, Polynesian, and other ethnic tastes including some American touches with a Chinese flair such as Grilled Lamb Chops with Spicy Sauce or Sesame Filet Mignon.

"All of our vegetables are fresh," said Tsang, who is clearly proud of a business that, he adds, "I have put everything into."

Years of restaurant experience for Tsang include working in the family businesses in Easton and Norton and at other Massachusetts restaurants where he said he learned what

was required to be "the best".

"I am very particular about atmosphere and presentation. If customers are not satisfied then they won't come back," he said. "We hope people in Duxbury will come in and try our food. We are small but selective in what we offer."

With over 100 reasonably priced selections on the menu for dining or take out, Tsang's is certain to hit the taste trigger for discerning Duxbury diners.

Early word of mouth tells us Tsang's will be a big hit and a welcome addition that local patrons will hopefully support as a hometown business.
