

Winsor House SINCE 1803

Past and Present



The Winsor House, circa 1803, was acquired in 1842 by Daniel L. Winsor, a Duxbury sea captain. One of Capt. Winsor's claims to fame was his invention in 1854 of a windlass, for which he received the unheard of sum of \$10,000.

In 1934 Dan Winsor, grandson of Capt. Winsor, and his wife Marie remade the Captain's home into the Winsor House Inn. In honor of his heritage, Dan insisted upon classic New England dining. Marie, being a born Virginian, added the famous Winsor House fried chicken (Southern style). For twenty years, Dan and Marie were the professional hosts of Duxbury. Marie's roquefort dressing was known from Maine to Florida.





Dan and Marie knew how to put on a party. The "Southern Belle" influence, coupled with the European education of Dan, offered the best of both worlds when it came to hospitality. Here's a New Year's Eve/Birthday Party – the old way. (David Connor, present Innkeeper, offers a free after dinner refreshment for anyone who can correctly identify the participants.
