

FamilySearch Research Wiki: Guide to Great Genealogy Links

At the end of class each student will be able to:

I. Explain the value the Wiki.

A. Definition:

1. Wiki: An Internet site that can be edited by the public. Wikis usually feature internal and external links to further information. Some wikis are encyclopedia like.
 2. FamilySearch Wiki: An Internet wiki with encyclopedic data about how to do genealogical research. **Note:** It does NOT show genealogies, nor used for queries.
 3. Wiki explains how-to & background more—USGenWeb amalgamates database links.
- B. Original seed material for the Wiki was from the old FHL **research outlines**.
- C. Provides Internet **links** to **BEST** info and databases needed for genealogical research.
- D. Background on: **dates, jurisdictions, record types, repositories, migration routes**.
- E. *Wiki* and *FS Catalog* are a power combination for retrieving our ancestors' documents.
- F. When is it useful to check through information on the Wiki? — Almost always.
1. Whenever you begin researching a family in a new area.
 2. Answering questions about how to do genealogy in any area where you are weak.

II. Open the Wiki three different ways:

- A. in your browser by typing **wiki.familysearch.org** in the URL address box.
- B. from within FamilySearch by hovering over the **Search** tab.
- C. from a Google search for a topics like **New York genealogy**, or **Virginia genealogy**.

III. Search the Wiki using the search box to find (a) places, (b) topics, and (c) categories.

These are mostly taken from the Family History Library Catalog.
