In Latin, an imperative, as its name would suggest, is a command. *Imperatum* means order or command. Imperatives can either be singular or plural. Imperatives can also be negative or positive.

Positive Imperatives: Do something!

Sit!	walk!	Hurry!
Go away!	Enter!	Carry!

Negative Imperatives: Don't do something!

Don't run!	Don't talk!	Don't sing!
Don't cry!	Don't enter!	Don't touch!
