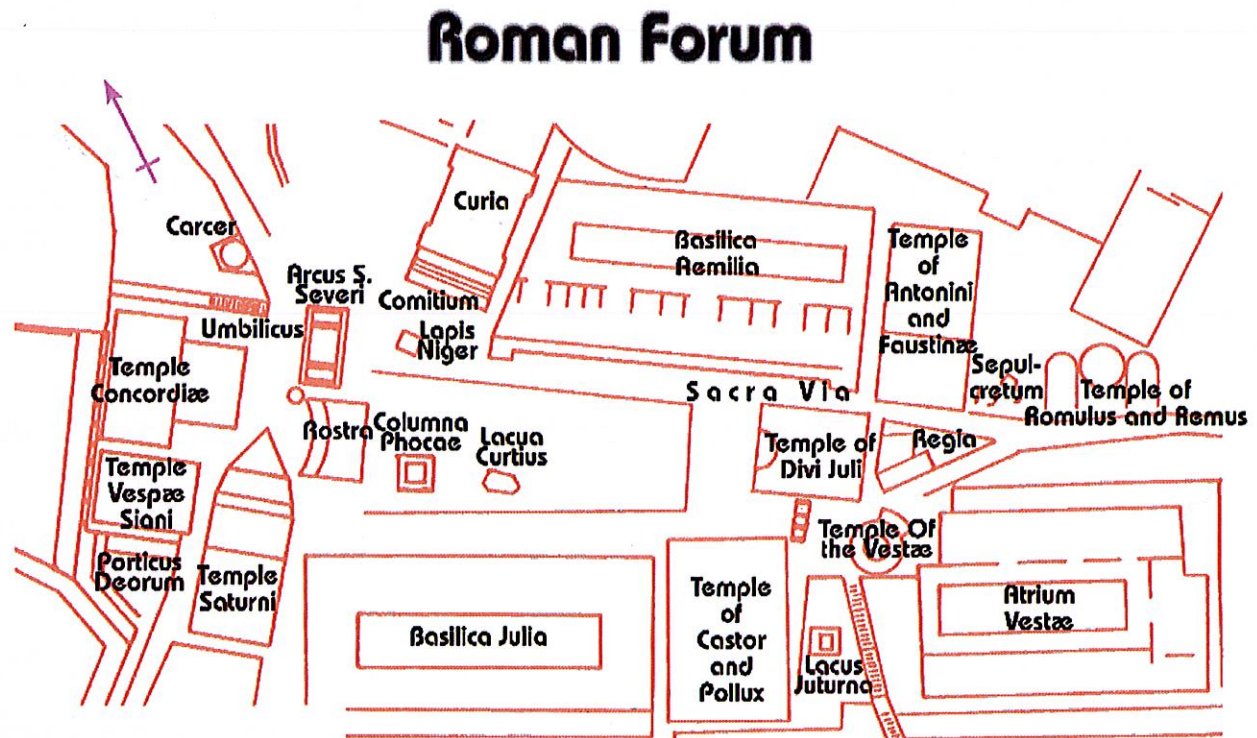

Aerial layout of the Roman Forum, when Quintus arrives in Rome.



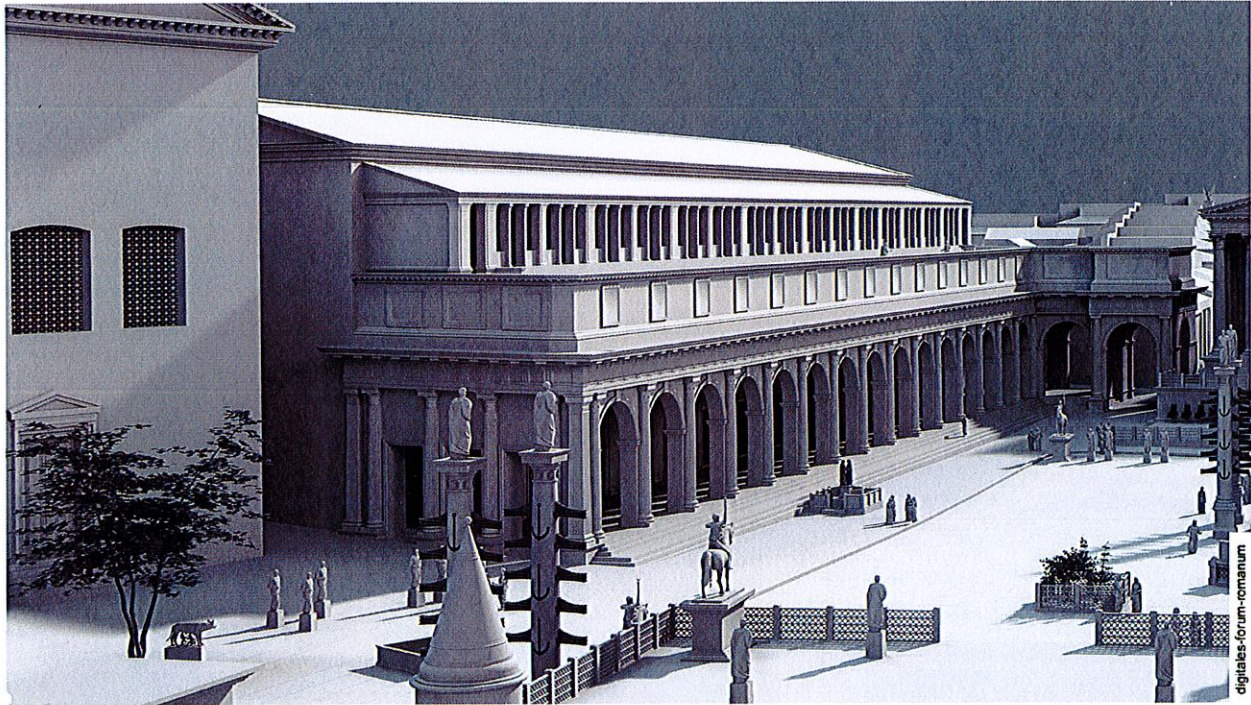
An image of the current state of the Forum today.

1. Basilica Aemilia

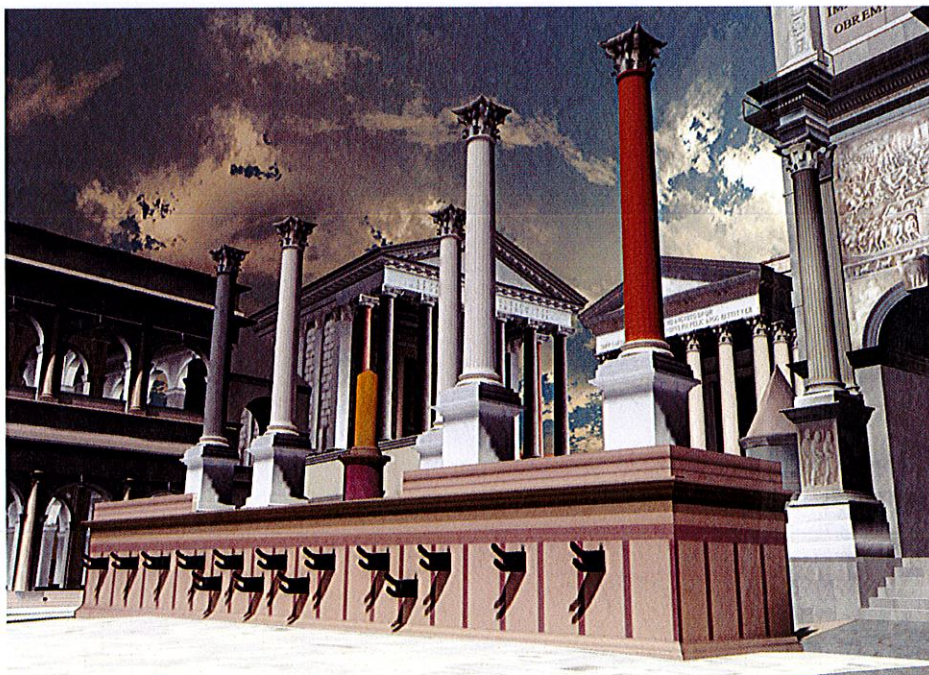
A Reconstruction of the Basilica Aemilia



Used mostly for business transactions, business meetings, important declarations of city affairs, and the law courts.

2. Rostra

A Reconstruction of the Rostra. Used as a speaker's platform for politicians, generals, and others.



3. Templum Vestae

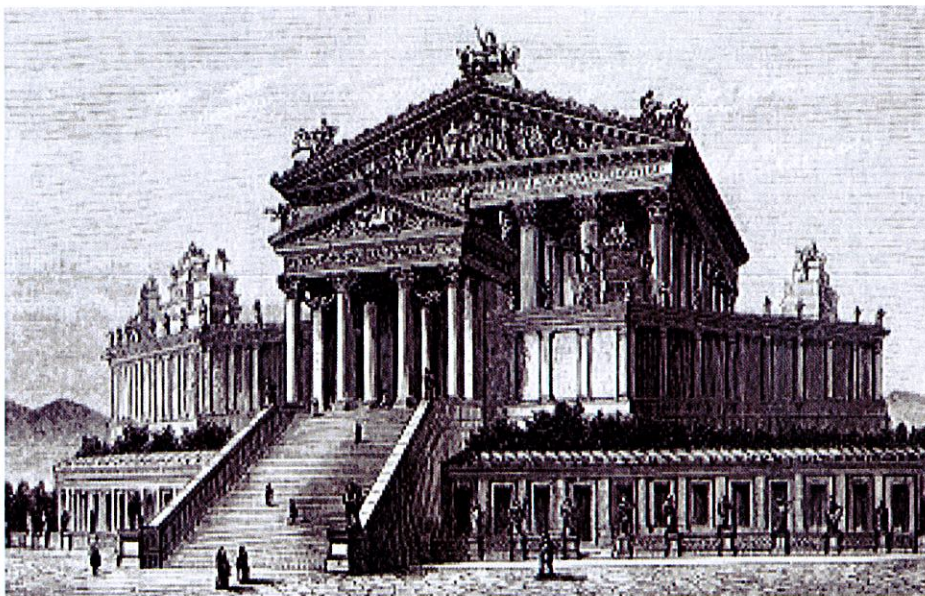
A reconstruction (left) and the remains (right) of the temple of Vesta.



The temple held the sacred flame of Rome, which the Vestal Virgins would tend and maintain.

4. Templum Iovis Optimi Maximi

A drawing of the temple of Jupiter the Greatest and Best, a massive temple on the Capitoline hill in Rome.



5. Curia

This image shows the most recent form of the Curia, the Curia Julia. This was the meeting house for the Senate.
