

## Demonstrative Pronouns - pg 47-50

1. A demonstrative pronoun is a word that points out, or demonstrates, where something is.
2. A demonstrative pronoun shows location - whether a noun is near or far away from the speaker/reader.

Ex. Take This pencil from my hand ; that mountain in the distance is huge!

3. A demonstrative pronoun can be used as a noun - by itself - or as an adjective (with a noun)

Ex. Hic celeriter currit = "This guy runs quickly" ; haec puella saepe ridet = "This girl often smiles"

4. You can translate 'ille' as a noun and as an adjective:

a. As a noun: the gender of the form of 'ille' will show the translation;

masculine - ille = that one, that guy, he, etc.

feminine - illa = that one, that girl, she, etc.

neuter - illud = that thing, it, etc.

b. As an adjective: using 'ille' with ~~an~~ a noun will be translated as "that \_\_\_\_"

Ex. illa arbor = That tree      ille miles = That soldier      illud litus = that shore
