Verb #1: lego, legere

Infinitive forms:

Latin Form	English Translation
<u>legere</u>	<u>to read</u>

Present Tense:

Person	Singular (Latin and English)	Plural (Latin and English)
1st	<u>lego - I read</u>	<u>legimus - we read</u>
2nd	<u>legis - you read</u>	<u>legitis - y'all read</u>
3rd	<u>legit - h/s/it reads</u>	<u>legunt - They read</u>

Imperative forms:

Number	Latin Form	English Translation
Singular	<u>lege</u>	<u>read!</u>
Plural	<u>legite</u>	<u>read!</u>

Negative Imperative forms:

Number	Latin Form	English Translation
Singular	<u>noli legere - don't read</u>	<u>don't read!</u>
Plural	<u>nolite legere</u>	<u>don't read!</u>

Verb #2: pareō, parēre

Infinitive forms:

Latin Form	English Translation
parēre	to obey

Present Tense:

Person	Singular (Latin and English)	Plural (Latin and English)
1st	pareo - I obey	paremus - we obey
2nd	parēs - you obey	paretis - y'all obey
3rd	paret - h/s/it obeys	parent - they obey

Imperative forms:

Number	Latin Form	English Translation
Singular	pare	obey!
Plural	parete	obey!

Negative Imperative forms:

Number	Latin Form	English Translation
Singular	noli parere	don't obey!
Plural	nolite parere	don't obey!

Verb #3: sentio, sentire

Infinitive forms:

Latin Form	English Translation
sentire.	to feel

Present Tense:

Person	Singular (Latin and English)	Plural (Latin and English)
1st	sentio - I feel	Sentimus - we feel

Person	Singular (Latin and English)	Plural (Latin and English)
2nd	Sentis - you feel	Sentitis Sentitis - y'all feel
3rd	sentit - h/s lit feels	sentiunt - They feel

Imperative forms:

Number	Latin Form	English Translation
Singular	Senti	feel!
Plural	sentite	feel!

Negative Imperative forms:

Number	Latin Form	English Translation
Singular	noli sentire	don't feel!
Plural	nolite sentire	don't feel!
