Pore, Pour, Poor	<p>A pore is an opening in one's skin. Pour means to "cause a flow or stream." Poor means "needy".</p> <p><i>People perspire through the pores in their skin. Pour yourself a glass of water. Your poor body needs it!</i></p>
Real, Very, Really	<p>Do not use the adjective real in placed of the adverbs very or really.</p> <p><i>The plants scattered throughout the restaurant are not real. Hiccups are very embarrassing. Her nose is really small.</i></p>
Sight, Cite, Site	<p>Sight means the "act of seeing" or "something that is seen." Cite means "to quote or refer to." A site is a location or position (include a website on the Internet).</p> <p><i>The Alamo at night was a sight worth the trip. I was also able to cite my visit to this historical site in my history paper.</i></p>
To, Too, Two	<p>To is the preposition that can mean "in the direction of." Too is an adverb meaning "very or excessive." Too is often used to mean "also."</p> <p><i>Only two of Columbus's first three ships returned to Spain from the New World. Columbus was too restless to stay in Spain for long.</i></p>
Ware, Wear, Where	<p>Ware means "a product to be sold"; wear means "to have on or to carry on one's body"; where asks the question "in what place or in what situation?"</p> <p><i>Where can you buy the best cookware to take on a campout—and the best rain gear to wear if it rains?</i></p>

<p>Capacity</p> <p>Capability to perform or produce</p>	<p>Petulant</p> <p>easily irritated or annoyed</p>
<p>Remorse</p> <p>a feeling of deep regret, usually for some misdeed</p>	<p>Palpable</p> <p>capable of being perceived</p>
<p>Jeer</p> <p>laugh at with contempt and derision</p>	<p>Serene</p> <p>not agitated; without losing self-possession</p>
<p>Chastisement</p> <p>verbal punishment</p>	<p>Apprehensive</p> <p>mentally upset over possible misfortune or danger etc</p>
<p>Wheedle</p> <p>influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering</p>	<p>Defiant</p> <p>boldly resisting authority or an opposing force</p>
