#1 Identity (poem)

- a. the qualities, beliefs, or traits that make a person or group different from others
- b. Noun
- c. When I visited the town where my parents grew up, I felt more in touch with my identity than I ever have before.

#2 Self (n/a)

- a. The evaluation of oneself as an individual, regardless of social position or standing
- b. Noun
- c. It was not until I started reading other people's autobiographies that I started thinking about the "self" and how it related to me.

#3 Feeble (p. 10 FFA)

- a. Lacking in force or effectiveness; weak
- b. adjective
- c. My brother always gave feeble excuses for why he could not do homework each night.

#4 Opportunist (p. 11 FFA)

- a. a person who takes advantage of a situation for personal gain, often by ignoring whether it is the right or wrong thing to do
- b. noun
- c. Harry accused Kellen of being an opportunist because he deliberately neglected homework when he knew a teacher would be absent the next day.

#5 Ethical

- a. something that relates to moral principles or beliefs
- b. adjective
- c. The doctor was questioning what the ethical choice was when faced with a dying patient who was asking to cut off all medicine.

#6 Dilemma

- a. a difficult situation or problem, often with two equally undesirable solutions

- b. noun
- c. Bobby faced the dilemma after seeing his friend cheat on the exam.

#7 Commemorate (p. 19 -- 7th Grade Reader)

- a. to pay tribute to or show respect for someone or something in a ceremony
- b. Verb
- c. The Redskins commemorated the anniversary of their last Super Bowl win by bringing the players on that team to the field during halftime.

#8 Anecdote (p. 23 -- 7th Grade Reader)

- a. a short, amusing or interesting story about a real incident or person
- b. Noun
- c. When I started at a new school, I heard a lot of anecdotes from students about events from previous years there.

#9 Marked ("mark") (p. 27 of Reader)

- a. clearly noticeable or evident
- b. adjective

#10 Aloof (bottom of page 33 of Reader)

- a. Not friendly or warm; distant and detached
- b. adjective

#11: Defer (ARITS)

- a) To put off or delay
- b) Verb
- c) The person deferred admission to college for a year, so he started school in the Fall of 2011.

#12: Fester (ARITS)

- a) To rot or wither
- b) Verb
- c) The wound festered on Jim's foot for weeks after he punctured it on a nail.

#13 Disheveled (p. 25 -- *A Raisin in the Sun*)

- a) Untidy; messy (usually about a person's hair, clothing, or appearance)

#14 Indifferent (p. 26 and 27 -- *ARITS*)

- a) Having no particular interest or sympathy; unconcerned

#15 Assimilation (p. 63...sort of)

- a) The process of absorbing one cultural group with another

#16 Insincere (p. 100 -- at the bottom)

- a) not expressing true feelings

#17 Strident (p. 110 -- *ARITS*)

- a) loud and harsh; hard on the ears
- b) adjective
- c) The presenter was losing patience with his rude audience members, and his voice became increasingly strident when speaking to them.

#18 Exuberant (p. 110 -- *ARITS*)

- a) filled with energy and excitement
- b) adjective
- c) My brother and I were exuberant about the new season of our favorite show, *Seinfeld*.

#19 Integrity

- a. the quality of being honest and of strong moral character
- b. noun
- c. Most of the presidential candidates have little integrity, it seems.

#20 Humility

- a. The act of being humble; having a low view of one's importance; modesty
- b. noun
- c. Kevin Durant is loved by many because of his humility; he never brags about his success.

#21 Right (not from a text)

- a) a freedom that cannot be denied to any person
- b) noun
- c) "I have a right to explain my side of the story if I want to!" the man explained to his lawyer.

#22 Prejudice (not from a text)

- a) an unjustifiable opinion about a group, a race, or an individual for their supposed characteristics

#27 Ascertain (p. 81 -- TKAM)

- a) to find (something) out for sure; to make certain of
- b) verb
- c) The police chief ascertained the cause of the crime by studying all of the footage from the security tapes.

#28 Cordial (p. 97 -- TKAM)

- a) warm and friendly
- b) adjective
- c) My brother and I used to fight all of the time, but our relationship has become more cordial as we have gotten older.

#29 Subdue (p. 112 -- TKAM)

- a) to bring under control (a person or feeling)
- b) verb
- c) The speaker attempted to subdue the loud and disorderly crowd.

#30 Disorderly (p. 113 -- TKAM)

- a) breaking down peaceful and law-abiding behavior; rowdy or unruly
- b) adjective
- c) The speaker attempted to subdue the loud and disorderly crowd.

#31 Innate (p. 160 -- TKAM)

- a) existing within a person since birth; natural
- b) adjective
- c) My innate curiosity led me to ask all kinds of questions about the new information I was learning.

#32 Melancholy (p. 161 -- TKAM)

- a) feeling or showing sadness; very unhappy
- b) adjective
- c) After enduring various difficult moments in his life, Kanye West released a melancholy album, "808s and Heartbreak."

#33 Formidable (p. 213 -- TKAM)

- a. inspiring fear or respect because of being strong, powerful, or talented at something
- b. adjective
- c. Muhammad Ali is considered one of the all-time greatest boxers because he defeated many formidable opponents.

#34 Elucidate (p. 213 -- TKAM)

- a. to make something clear; explain
- b. verb
- c. Mr. Freeman elucidated the new concept when he saw the confusion on his students' faces.

#35 Testimony (p. 232 -- TKAM)

- a) a formal written or spoken statement, especially one given in a court of law
- b) noun
- c) The witness gave her testimony, and the events she described convinced the jury she was not guilty.

#36 Haughty (p. 233 -- TKAM)

- a) thinking oneself is superior or dominant over others
- b) adjective
- c) The bully walked around with a haughty attitude and talked down to everyone in the school.

#37 Tedious (p. 248)

- a) Too long, boring, or slow; dull
- b) Adjective
- c) The professor knew he had to remake his lessons because his students complained of them being tedious.

#38 Idle (p. 274)

- a) inactive or not in use; doing nothing

#39 Acquit (p. 277)

- a) To free someone accused of a crime by ruling him “not guilty” in court
- b) Verb
- c) The jury made the easy decision to acquit her because there was no evidence suggesting she committed the crime

#40 Wholeheartedly (p. 313)

- a) With full, energetic, and/or enthusiastic sincerity or support
- b) Adverb
- c) My friends thought it was unwise to argue with the teacher about it, and I wholeheartedly agreed.
