Guide to Analyzing Quotes

Use this guide to select the quotes that you think are most significant in the assigned sections of your book.

Format:

a) Speaker

- i) Who said the quote? This could be the narrator, if it is narration and not a specific person.

b) Context

- i) What is happening at this point in the story when the quote was said?
- ii) Who is the speaker talking to, and what are they talking about?

c) Significance

- i) Is this a turning point in the story? If so, how?
- ii) Is this an example of a signpost (*Contrast and Contradiction, Words of the Wiser, Aha! Moment...*)?
 - 1) If so, what does this signpost tell us about the character or story?
- iii) Does this foreshadow a future event or connect back to a previous event?
- iv) Does this quote tell us something about the character that is speaking (what kind of person s/he is, what his/her values are? What does it tell us?
