What does this mean about Jolly’s ability to parent her children?	Explain what college means to LaVaughn, and how it is a force that shapes her identity using two examples from the text.	What are the conditions that LaVaughn’s mother sets for her working for Jolly? What does she hope LaVaughn will learn from this experience?	What does it mean to “Get up on the 1” and do things “all the way”? Who do these sayings come from? What do they teach?

500	He thinks the towel will fix her bloody face. Use this example to list two different adjectives and matching evidence to describe him.	Who did Jolly write a letter to and why? Explain what the letter shows about Jolly and her attitude about welfare and charity.	Identify two “parent-like” lessons LaVaughn teaches Jeremy in his apartment and explain why she teaches them.	In your own words, explain what Jeremy does on the bus ride to the shoe store? Identify the object that is the symbol and explain what it represents.	Explain the story of the blind woman and the orange. Why does Jolly tell the story? What does she want LaVaughn to understand and to stop doing?
600	Has a shame style and puts a shimmy with it. Explain what this dance shows about the character.	How did Jolly get pregnant? How does this relate to her quote about needing to wear a sign?	Explain why the “gutter” is a symbolic quote and what it represents about Jolly. Why is she in the gutter? What is she missing?	Use two textual examples to show that Jolly starts to address some of her failings or shortcomings. What is proof of her change?	Explain the symbol of the lemon seeds and what they represent to Jeremy. What do they need to grow?
700	Needs glasses because of one of Jolly’s failings. Explain how this affects him. What does it prevent him from doing?	LaVaughn’s dilemma or difficult decision: What does she have to decide about babysitting for Jolly when Jolly says she can’t pay her? What does LaVaughn’s decision show about her?	Explain how “Nobody told me” relates to Jolly’s identity and is a blind spot.	What does LaVaughn have to do to become an official Home Care Helper for Jolly?	Use LaVaughn’s decision to babysit for free to craft a thematic statement about the importance or duty of helping others.
