

LATIN SCRAPBOOK – DUE MAY 6, 2016

OBJECTIVE:

The Latin Scrapbook is a year-long project which is designed to underscore the great extent to which Latin is used in everyday life. Students are encouraged to use a variety of sources for the project, including newspapers, magazines, classified and commercial advertisements, the Internet, and articles on classical topics. Students may find pure Latin words and phrases such as *carpe diem*, *conductor*, *ego*, *et cetera*, *circus*, and *audio* or derivatives such as *verbal*, *ocular*, *vicinity*, *multiply*, *nature*, *firm*, and *cure*.

REQUIREMENTS AND GUIDELINES:

1. A **minimum** of **50** items must be included in the scrapbook. This means **50 acceptable** items. A scrapbook submitted with **fewer** than the **50 minimum** required will receive a grade of **C** or **less**.
2. Any one text that you find may contain a number of classical references or Latin expressions, but a **maximum of ten (10) items** can be used from the entire magazine, newspaper, book, etc.
3. Cut out the **entire** article of text—or a **very large portion** of it.
4. **All** items must be **numbered** in order. You may use **Roman numerals** if you are familiar with them.
5. **Underline, circle, or highlight** your item in a **VIVID** color.
6. Next to the item, **re-write** the Latin word, phrase, or derivative.
7. Write the **name of the reference** when mounting the item.
8. **Do not** split expressions and phrases, such as, *e pluribus unum*, *ad hoc*, *semper fidelis*. Each of these counts only as one item.
9. **All** items must include the **Latin root** from which the word is derived.

For example:
aquarium = aqua multiply = multus verbal = verbum
10. Include **more than 50** items in case some of them are not acceptable. It is better to be safe than to be sorry!
