

## Infinitives

### Vocabulary: Infinitives

In Latin, some verbs do not end in O, S, T, MUS, TIS, NT. Some verbs have different forms. An infinitive is one of those different forms.

All verbs have four principal parts like:

AMBULO, AMBULARE, AMBULAVI, AMBULATUS

The infinitive is always the second principal part. Most infinitives end in -RE. Translating an infinitive in English is easy. It is always translated as

==> to + the definition

Amo, Amare, Amavi, Amatus

Amare = to love

Debeo, Debēre, Debui, Debitus

Debēre = to owe

Cupio, Cupere, Cupivi, Cupitum

Cupere = to want

Audio, Audīre, Audi, Auditus

Audīre = to hear
