## Finding Information for a Works Cited Page

Try to find the following information for the webpage posted on the wiki. **Do not guess!** If you cannot find the information leave it blank. If you have a guess, write it to the side.

**Author:** \_\_\_\_\_

what: the person or organization who wrote the text on the page

why: helps to tell if the information is reliable

where: often at the top or bottom of the text; sometimes on an "about us" page

warning: no person or organization credited with writing the text may mean the source is unreliable!

**Title of the Page:** \_\_\_\_\_

what: name of the *webpage* (not the *website*)

why: provides specific detail to find the information you found useful

where: the top of the text or page

warning: avoid confusing the name of the page with the name of the site

**Website:** \_\_\_\_\_

what: the name of the whole site

why: provides context for how information is presented, helps judge reliability

where: homepage, usually at the top or bottom of internal page, and is often part of the web address

warning: this is not the url or web address

**Publication Date:** \_\_\_\_\_

what: year the text was added to the site (also provide month and day if available)

why: helps to tell if the information is up to date

where: usually in the footer, often listed as a copyright (©)

warning: can be confused with the date the site was created, if only one is given use that as the publication date

**Date of Access:** \_\_\_\_\_

what: when you were on the page, preferably when you took down your notes

why: websites change

where: your watch, cell phone, the clock in the upper right corner of the screen

warning: this one is pretty straightforward

**URL:** \_\_\_\_\_

what: the web address

why: allows other people to find your awesome resource

where: in the little url box at the top of the screen, above the actual webpage

warning: when making a works cited page, copy and paste this so you get the whole thing
