

PROJECT: American Patriots vs. American Loyalists Journal and Debate

Purpose

During the Revolution, colonists were divided over whom to support – the Rebels or the Tories. Those who supported the British were **Loyalist Tories** (loyal to the King of Great Britain), and those who supported the colonists were **Rebel Patriots**. The class will be roughly divided between Patriots and Loyalists, and each student will take on the role of one or the other for the next 2 and a half weeks.

Once you are given your side, you will begin to write a series of journal entries as if you were living during the time of the Revolution. This journaling will be constructed over the course of the unit as we encounter new material. Next, we will have a “Patriots v. Loyalists” debate where each side can make their case for ultimate revolutionary supremacy (dun dun dunnnn). At the end of the unit, a test will cover the issues of this time period from both the Patriot and Loyalist perspective - pay attention to both as we go.


Requirements

- Complete a seminar pre-write, seminar, and reflection based upon the life of John Adams and his experience with these events.
