Migrated to OpenOffice 3.2 on all student computers in the beginning of the school year. Our plan was to let the students use OpenOffice first and than get the teachers and staff migrated over later in the year. From day one we got nothing but negative feedback from the students and teachers. They complained about not being able to open Microsoft files they did from home and formatting issues when they could get a file open. Imported images from existing files would not open in OpenOffice. Powerpoint files would not run correctly. The students just never felt comfortable using OpenOffice and let the administration know about it. The administration made the decision to migrate back to Microsoft Office in November.
