II.17 & all voices following: *Heroic* is set throughout as a disyllable and is probably therefore to be pronounced *hīrɔɪk*'.

It is a word seldom found in Elizabethan writing: only once in the whole of Shakespeare, for example, although Shakespeare makes occasional use of 'heroical' apparently scanned as a trisyllable (see for example *Henry V*, II.iv.63 or *Troilus and Cressida*, III.iii.202; line-numbers from editions at <http://www.shakespeare-online.com>)

IV.111.2 & all voices following: the varied underlay of *dost* and *doest* is preserved from the source.
