The Elementary Connections Camp Programs

One of a kind camps! The Elementary Connections Camp Programs **have been specially designed for elementary school students, ages 5-11**. These high-quality sessions will be taught by experienced teachers and offer interesting and enjoyable options. Summer campers, depending on their program choices, will participate in such unique experiences as: a visitation to a wildlife rescue center, programming and construction of their own robots, and visits to actual training sites in the construction industry. **All Elementary Connections Camp programs will be held at Gloucester County College, 1400 Tanyard Road, Sewell, New Jersey, 08080**. Programs will be offered from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm, four days per week, Monday through Thursday, for a two-week cycle. Please see the descriptions below for special programs. Please note that camps will be closed July 3, 2009.

The Elementary Connections Camp has special options for extended care and for older campers looking for community service experience.

- **The Extended Care Program** allows you to register your campers for extended time beyond the scheduled camp day. You may drop them off as early as 8:00 am and pick them up as late as 5:30 pm.

The Paleontologist

(CSC 140-01) — June 29 to July 9

Ages: 6–7 (Campers must be entering first grade this fall OR be six years old by December 1, 2009)

Come join our “Dino Dig” at GCC and become our resident paleontologists! In this camp, campers will explore dinosaurs through wonderful children’s literature and the use of computers. The children will read various books, sing songs, write stories, and create several crafts for each theme. Campers will participate in individual and group projects with plenty of time for free exploration and organized games. Parents are invited to attend the final day to tour the museum that will house the campers’ discoveries!

Nature Safari

(CSC 141-03) — July 27 to August 6

Ages: 6–7 (Campers must be entering first grade this fall OR be six years old by December 1, 2009)

This summer, campers will go on safari to discover the wildlife on the GCC Campus! But to find them, we need to “stalk like a cat” to the homes of the underground tunnelers, high-wire acrobats, and paddling pond-dwellers. The Bug & Spider Safari

Ages: 6–7 Campers must be entering first grade this fall OR be six years old by December 1, 2009)

There’s a lot of fun to be had and tiny creatures to study in the Bug Safari! Campers will be searching the campus for these amazing creatures as well as conducting research in the computer lab. Our bug observations and research will be the foundation of art and science projects throughout this two week session. At the end of the session, parents are invited to attend an extra special “Buggy” celebration!

Art, Science, and Nature

Clay and Pottery Creations

(CSC 143-01) — June 29 to July 9

Field Trip – The Art Museum

Ages: 8–11

This camp has an additional \$30 materials fee.

Travel the world through clay. Make Japanese tea cups for a tea ceremony, sculptures inspired by the Chinese tomb treasures, an African Portrait Vessel, and Islamic geometric designs painted on bowls.

Clay and Pottery Creations

(CSC 143-02) — July 13 to July 23

Field Trip – Adventure Aquarium

Ages: 8–11

This camp has an additional \$30 materials fee.

After visiting and researching aquatic life at the Adventure Aquarium, campers will use their inspirations to explore various printmaking techniques and clay projects. They will “gadget print” a fish, then “imprint” a clay fish; carve a block print, then make a clay platter using their carved block design; print with leaves and make clay leaf tiles and bowl.

RE-CREATE Art Camp

(CSC 122-01) — June 29 to July 9

Ages: 8–11

This camp will inspire creativity while raising environmental awareness.

Campers will use salvaged, scavenged, or repurposed materials along with a variety of art media such as drawing tools, clay, and paint to “Make Art, Not Junk.” Campers will be introduced to artists and art techniques through unique projects inspired by real life art and sculpture.

Camper's will experience building and launching their very own model rocket. This "hands-on" camp will explore space travel and possibilities of life in outer space. Campers will design, decorate, and demonstrate what it takes to launch a rocket into space!

Computer Camp: Digital Image Editing and Web Design

(CSC 128-01) — June 29 to July 9

(CSC 128-02) — July 13 to July 23

Ages: 11–14

Camper's will work with digital imaging software such as Photoshop to display their individual creativity and vision. Using digital cameras to collect images and specialized software to create professional looking effects, campers will help chronicle our camp experience and produce the camp yearbook. A quick introduction to animation software and the basics of Web-page design will round out these campers' portfolios for display online.



Forensics

(GCT 101-01) — June 29 to July 9

Ages: 11–14

Campers will learn to use lab techniques, like those used in forensics labs, to analyze and identify “crime-scene” type samples. Blood types, hair samples, forensic anthropology, ink analysis, and more will be explored in daily lab activities. Campers will use techniques acquired during camp on the last day to solve a “crime.”

Gloucester County Choppers

(GCT 103-01) — June 29 to July 3

Campers will spend their time learning to prepare restaurant-style entrees, desserts, and confections, meeting established culinary standards. Half of each day will be spent on learning how to work in a commercial kitchen with chef demonstrations. The other half of the day will be devoted to hands-on preparation of food.

Students create their own menu, practice their individual dishes, and end up the week competing against each other for the “Golden Spoon Award” including a chef's toque and authentic certificate! Campers may take home their creations each day.

Chefs Challenge II

(GCT 111-01) — June 29 to July 9

(GCT 111-02) — July 13 to July 23

Ages: 11–14

Calling all bakers and kids with a “sweet tooth”! You can spend your days in this camp preparing a delicious and decadent array of cakes, cookies, tarts, mousses, parfaits, candy, and cookie houses. On the final day of camp you will be preparing a Viennese table of your creations for your parents to view and taste. Campers will learn the basic skills of measuring, pan preparation, the importance of oven temperature, and pastry bag use. Each day campers will bring home a sampling of the goodies they prepared.



Sweet Treats II

(GCT 135-03) — July 27 to August 6

Ages: 11–14

Campers who are serious about their sweets will spend their time in this camp preparing ice cream molds, custards, working with chocolate plastic, cake decorating and working with marzipan, culminating in a Viennese table of their creations on the final day of camp for parents to view and taste.
