



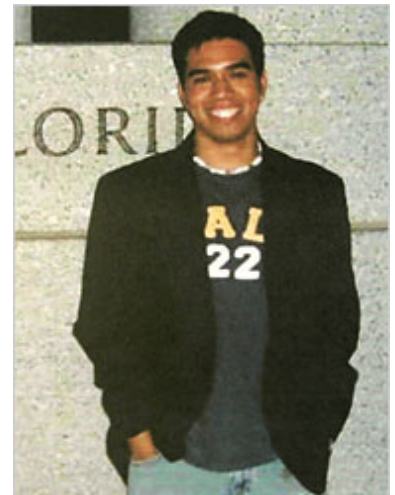
Emily Hilscher, 19, of Woodville, Va., was killed in the dorm shooting. She was a freshman animal and poultry sciences major.

Austin Cloyd, 19, was a freshman international studies major. Her father is a professor at Virginia Tech.



Brian Bluhm, 25, was a graduate student in civil engineering. He was about to finish his degree and had already accepted a job in Baltimore.



Rachael Hill, 18, of Glen Allen, Va., was a freshman studying biology at the school. She was the star of her high school volleyball team and played the piano.



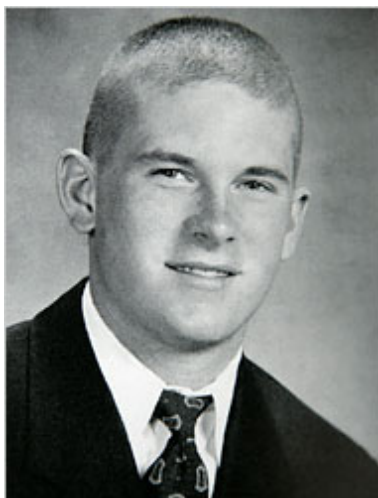
Minal Panchal, 26, was a first-year building-science graduate student from India. She wanted to be an architect like her father.



Kevin Granata, 46, was an engineering professor who studied neuromuscular control. He was "on a trajectory to become a notable star" in his fields.



Ross Alameddine, 20, of Saugus, Mass., was a sophomore English major who loved jazz music.



Michael Steven Pohle Jr., 23, of Flemington, N.J., was a senior majoring in biological sciences and was a member of the lacrosse team.



Julia Pryde, 23, of Middletown, N.J., was a graduate student in biological systems engineering. She was studying ways to improve water quality.



Reema Samaha, 18, was a freshman at the school. She was a dancer from Centreville, Va., and attended the same high school as the shooter.



Waleed Shaalan, 32, came to the U.S. from Egypt in August to work toward a doctorate in civil engineering.



Leslie Sherman, 20, of Springfield, Va., was a sophomore history and international studies student. She planned to study in Russia this summer.



Jarrett Lane, 22, was a senior civil engineering student from Narrows, Va. He was an athlete and valedictorian of his high school class.



Nicole White, 20, of Smithfield, Va., was a junior majoring in international studies. In high school she worked as a volunteer taking care of horses.

Maxine Turner, 22, of Vienna, Va., was a senior studying chemical engineering. She spent time volunteering at an animal shelter.

Matthew La Porte, 20, was a freshman from Dumont, N.J. He was studying political science and French and was part of the Air Force ROTC program.



Henry Lee was a freshman majoring in computer engineering. He emigrated from China and was salutatorian of his Roanoke, Va., high school class.



Liviu Librescu, 76, was an engineering science and mathematics lecturer. Several students credit the Holocaust survivor with saving their lives.



Lauren McCain, 20, of Hampton, Va., was an international studies major. On her MySpace page, McCain listed "the love of my life" as Jesus Christ.



G.V. Loganathan, 51, was a civil and environmental engineering professor. He moved to the U.S. from India in 1982.



Partahi Lombantoruan, 34, of Indonesia, was a civil engineering doctoral student. His goal was to teach in the U.S.



Matthew Gwaltney, 24, of Chester, Va., was a graduate student in civil and environmental engineering. He was an avid Tech sports fan.



Mary Read, 19, was a freshman from Annandale, Va., who had not yet declared a major. She was born in South Korea into an Air Force family.



Juan Ramon Ortiz, 26, was a native of Puerto Rico. He was a graduate student in civil engineering and recently married another student at Virginia Tech.



Jocelyne Couture-Nowak, who was from Nova Scotia, taught French at the university. Her husband teaches horticulture at Virginia Tech.



Erin Peterson, 18, was a freshman from Centreville, Va., who was studying international relations. She attended the same high school as the gunman.



Daniel O'Neil, 22, of Rhode Island, was a graduate student in engineering. He played guitar and wrote his own songs.

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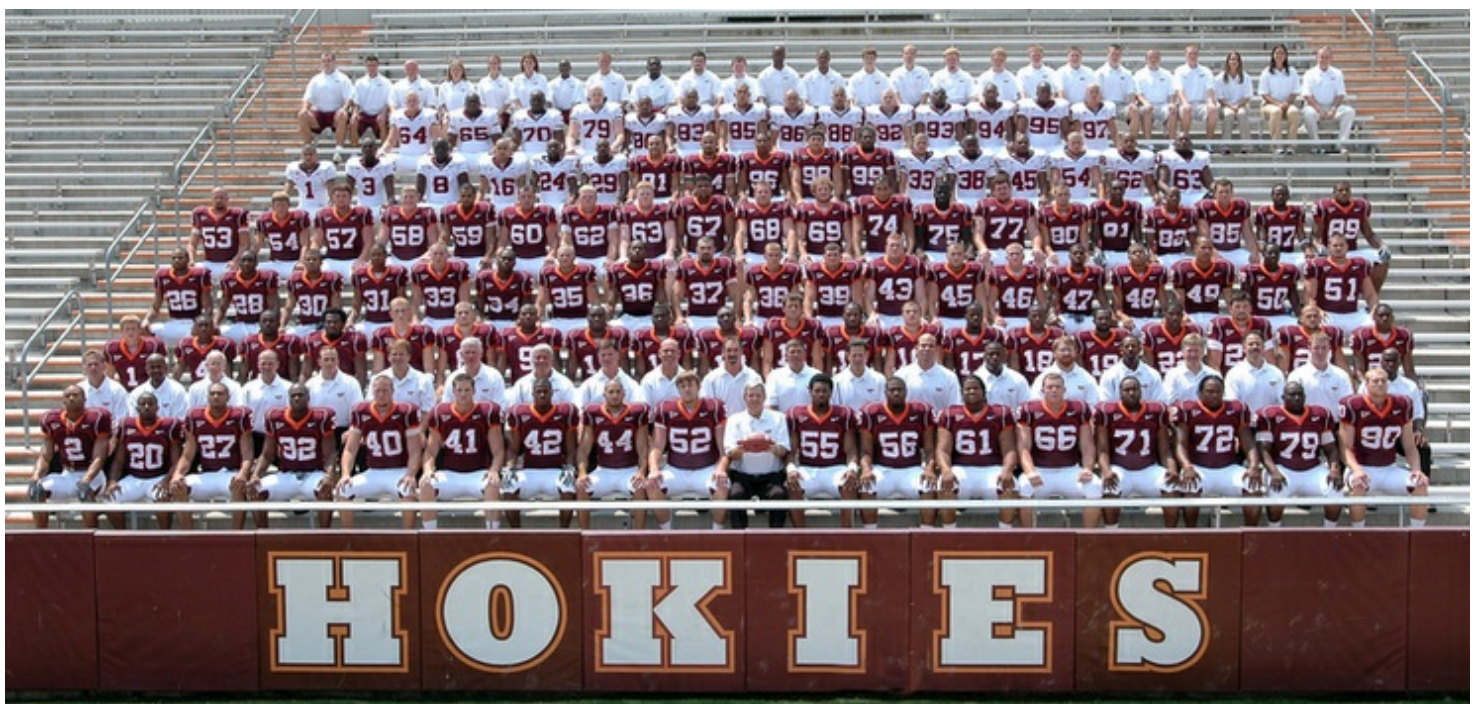

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Monday, April 16

7:15 a.m.:

A 9-1-1 emergency call to Virginia Tech Police reports a shooting at West Ambler Johnston Hall, leaving one person dead and one injured. The second person later died.

7:30 a.m.:

Investigators were following up on leads concerning a person of interest in relation to the double homicide. Investigators from VT PD and Blacksburg PD were actively following up on various leads. Meanwhile, Cho returns to his dorm room to re-load and leaves a "disturbing note."

8:00 a.m.:

Classes begin.

8:25 a.m.:

Virginia Tech leadership team meets to develop a plan on how to notify students of the homicide. Meanwhile, police stop the unidentified "person of interest" in a vehicle off-campus and detain him for questioning.

9:00 a.m.:

Virginia Tech leadership team is briefed on the latest events in the ongoing dormitory homicide investigation.

9:05 a.m.:

Cho seen in Norris Hall, an Engineering building. Cho chains the doors shut from the inside.

9:26 a.m.:

E-mails go out to campus staff, faculty, and students saying there has been a shooting on campus (in reference to the Dorm shooting).

9:45 a.m.:

Students in the engineering building Norris Hall call police to report more shots have been fired.[75]

Cho kills thirty more people before turning the gun on himself. Police have breached the barricaded doors, but the shooter is dead before police arrive.

9:50 a.m.:

A second e-mail announcing: "A gunman is loose on campus. Stay in buildings until further notice. Stay away from all windows" is sent to all Virginia Tech email addresses. Loudspeakers broadcast a similar message.

10:17 a.m.:

A third e-mail cancels classes and advises people to stay where they are.

10:52 a.m.:

A fourth e-mail warns of a multiple shooting with multiple victims in Norris Hall, saying the shooter has been arrested and that police are hunting for a possible second shooter. The entrances to the campus buildings are locked.

12:00 p.m.:

At a press conference, authorities said there may have been more than twenty-one people killed and twenty-eight injured.

12:42 p.m.:

University President Charles Steger announces that police are releasing people from buildings and that counseling centers are being set up.

4:01 p.m.:

President Bush speaks from the White House regarding the shooting.

7:30 p.m.:

7:00 p.m.:
A final confirmation that there have been thirty-one deaths at Norris Hall, including the shooter.

Tuesday, April 17

9:15 a.m.:

Virginia Tech Police Department releases name of shooter as Cho Seung-Hui and confirms the death toll of 33.

9:30 a.m.:

Virginia Tech announces that classes would be canceled "for the remainder of the week to allow students the time they need to grieve and seek assistance as needed."

2:00 p.m.:

A convocation ceremony is held for the University community at the Cassell Coliseum.

8:00 p.m.:

A candlelight vigil is held on the University Drillfield.

Originally from the small town of Smithfield in eastern Virginia, Ms. White was a fun-loving honor student who worked summers as a lifeguard. But her main passions were religion and animals. Her family was deeply religious. And in high school she volunteered at barns and stables and cared for horses, Chance Hellmann, a former classmate at Smithfield High School, told The Daily Press of Hampton Roads

On Tuesday, the high school held a moment of silence in her memory at 2 p.m., timed to coincide with the convocation on the campus of Virginia Tech.

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
