My dear Sir.

Knowing your interest in Oology I take the liberty of writing you, concerning some sets of *Helminthines* or nestlings I took during the past season.

I found, altogether some 9 or 10 nests, but only three of them, were perfect sets in good condition; the others being, much incubated or already hatched, while some were destroyed while awaiting the completion.

One set of these ^{nest} I would be glad to exchange for ^{sets} some rare warbler such as Yellow rump - Black-throated Blue, Audubon, and knowing that you collect in said I thought you might wish to exch^y for a set

of them. They are very fine specimens
perfect in every way & have the nests
from which they were taken, together
with full data. I have not made
any effort to exchange them, as I
desire to obtain something of undoubt-
ed authenticity for them - So many of
the rarer eggs now offered being very doubtful
in my opinion. The original set of this
species found by me June 6 1869 & so de-
scribed in Am Naturalist - I parted with,
a fact I now regret. They are different
from any sets since taken.
