The Complutensian Polyglot was a great multilingual edition of the Bible prepared by the best scholars available under the leadership of Cardinal Jiménez. It included Hebrew, Greek, and Latin versions, which appeared in parallel columns. The entire work was contained in six volumes. The work was completed in 1517, although it was not officially published until 1520. Just prior to the completion of the six-volume work of Jiménez, Erasmus published the first two editions of his Greek New Testament. Jorge Valdés argues that both the third and subsequent editions of Erasmus's Greek New Testament show the influence of the Complutensian Polyglot.
