According to him, "Much modern preaching fails to connect because the church in which it takes place has not been adequately related to reality. . . Gnostic theology has rendered even some of the better preaching irrelevant. It fails to deal with the realities of life--concentrating on the inner world and on the world to come, rather than on this one in which we live.

Ernest T. Campbell, a native of New York City, is a graduate of Bob Jones and New York Universities, who earned his M.Div. and Th.M. at PTS. He holds honorary doctorates from several colleges. After serving pastorates in Stroudsburg and York Pennsylvania, and Ann Arbor, Michigan, he was called to Riverside in September 1968. A frequent speaker on The Protestant Hour and the National Radio Pulpit, he undertook preaching missions to Alaska (in 1956) and Cuba (in 1959). He is noted for his involvement in action programs designed to bring relief to the oppressed, especially those to do with fair housing, school integration and the revision of national priorities to reflect national needs.

2. Dr. Russell is Assistant Professor of Theology at Yale University Divinity School, Adjunct Professor of Theology at New York Theological Seminary and consultant to the U.S. Working Group on Participation of Women in the World Council of Churches. The cum laude graduate of Harvard Divinity School and summa cum laude graduate of Union Theological Seminary served for 10 years as pastor of the Church of the Ascension in East Harlem. She has taught at Manhattan College and its graduate division; United Theological College, Bangalore; Union Theological Seminary and Princeton Seminary and has been a consultant to the YWCA in this country and in India. Her most recent publication is "Human Liberation in a Feminist Perspective--a Theology"; she has contributed chapters to "Colloquy on Christian Education" and to "Sexist Religion and Women in the Church."

Dr. Grant, who has been associated with the Divinity School since 1952, is a graduate of Union Theological Seminary and Harvard University and holds a Doctor of Divinity degree from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary. He is an ordained minister (Protestant Episcopal Church) and served a pastorate at St. James Church, South Cleveland, Massachusetts, before entering upon his teaching career. He was from 1944 to 1953 a member of the New Testament faculty of the University of the South and was Acting Dean in 1947. He was a Fulbright Research Professor at the University of Leiden, 1950-51, and has held three Guggenheim Fellowships. A visiting lecturer at Seabury-Western and Yale University, Dr. Grant was the 1957-58 Lecturer of the American Council of Learned Societies. Among his many books the most recent in his primary field are "The Early Christian Doctrine of God" and "After the New Testament." He is departmental editor for religion of the Encyclopedia Britannica, editor of the Anglican Theological Review and associate editor of Vigiliae Christianae, Journal of Religion.

1. FOR WHOM THE BELL TOLLS? Have you been hearing bells at 6:20 and 6:30 in the evening? It is the invitation to worship God through prayer. The purpose of Morning and Evening Prayer is not penance, but provision of a brief time of prayer to begin and end the day. The service includes daily Scripture readings from the Seminary International Lectionary. Time is spent in common prayers of intercession and thanksgiving, as well as in selected prayers of the Church. On Thursdays Evening Prayer is a sung service. Come any morning at 7:15 or evening at 6:30, Monday through Friday. It's only 15 minutes, but it's 15 minutes well spent.

4. Beginning 2 March and continuing on the 9th, 16th and 30th, Mr. Litton will lead a lecture-workshop on liturgical chant. Everyone is invited, whether to learn about the use of chant in worship, the history and the types of liturgical chant, or to experiment and be instructed while participating in the actual chanting. During Lent, Evening Prayer will be an all-sung (Evensung) service on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Mr. Litton's program will follow Evening Prayer and continue until 7:30 P.M.

5. Dr. Pannenberg, a student of Barth and Jasper at the University of Basel, has been called a "most original Christian thinker [of] highly complex and sophisticated theology." Oliver says: ". . . his thesis affirms that all is real is rational," which "involves him in the bold business of explaining the whole world of common experience....His commitment to reason will not allow him an escape into either transcendentalism or fragmentationalismReality holds together in the hard reality of Jesus and opens to the perceptive and willing mind a rational understanding....unified in and through Jesus. If 'mere anarchy is loosed upon the world,' it is only because of a type of irrational nonfaith that refuses to see in Jesus Christ the center of all things." Among his books translated into English are "Jesus: God and Man," "Theology and the Kingdom of God," "Revelation as History" and "Crisis of the Scripture-Principle."

Second of a series in celebration of the American Bicentennial, this is a critically praised account of the Darrow-Bryant debate on the Darwinian theory of evolution during the trial of John T. Scopes. Scopes, a teacher, had been dismissed for informing his classes of the theory that Man may have descended from an ancestor common to himself and the other primates, rather than being created in his present form. JPUSA NEWS: ECONOMIC JUSTICE, U.S. FOOD POLICY and the PLUTONIUM ECONOMY were major issues discussed by the United Presbyterian Council on Church and Society at its 28 - 38 January meeting in Philadelphia. The Council took action on papers relating to these subjects in preparation for the 188th General Assembly next May in Baltimore.

The ECONOMIC JUSTICE TASK FORCE presented a five-section document. After value assumptions undergirding industrialism and the social consequences of global industrialization are reviewed, the paper outlines five major issues and responses; discusses choices regarding future U.S. economy; and calls the Church to a dialogue on issues of political economy.

The COMMITTEE ON U.S. FOOD POLICY recommended: a minimum income floor for every citizen, improved food assistance programs, reduced consumption among the affluent, and an equitable farm policy. IN THE WORLD FOOD CRISIS, it was recommended: to seek humanitarian and developmental food aid programs, the reform and expansion of U.S. development assistance, and trade policies to benefit the poorest countries.

On THE PLUTONIUM ECONOMY: A 12-person taskforce from government, industry, academe and the church was convened to study the National Council of Churches' proposed statement. It was recommended that United Presbyterian delegates to the Governing Board of the NCC not approve the statement in its present form. An on-going group will be established within the United Presbyterian Church to study the theological and ethical issues involved.

RVS BIBLE COMMITTEE TO PTS CAMPUS: During the past week the office of the Revised Standard Version Bible Committee was moved from Oberlin, Ohio, to the PTS campus. About 500 pounds of files, records, archives and books, delivered to the Campus Center, are now being sorted out by Professor Bruce M. Metzger in Room 11, which will be the new RSV office. Dr. Metzger was recently elected Chairman of the Committee. Under the auspices of the National Council of Churches, this continuing committee comprises 25 scholars, men and women and ecumenical (5 Roman Catholic members (of whom 2 are from Great Britain), one Eastern Orthodox member, and (for Old Testament) one Jewish scholar). The group will meet on campus for a week in June to consider proposals for alterations of the Version in the interest of greater clarity and accuracy, in view of recent lexical and archaeological discoveries. The Sub-committee on the Apocrypha recently completed translating 3 and 4 Maccabees and Psalm 151; the texts will be published later this year by Oxford University Press in an enlarged edition of Professor Metzger's volume The Oxford Annotated Apocrypha.

EVANGELISM SEMINAR TO RETURN ARMSTRONG: The Reverend Richard S. Armstrong, senior minister of the Second Presbyterian Church of Indianapolis, will conduct a 15 - 18 March seminar on EVANGELISM at the Center of Continuing Education. NOTES

1. The Swiss theologian is widely regarded as the chief interpreter of Schweitzer. Author of more than 20 books in his field, he is considered a liberal theologian who, until recently opposed to the new orthodoxy, has now moved toward a creative interpretation of the traditional language of faith. His last visit to PTS was in December 1971, when he spoke on "The Self and the Nothing."

2. Ms. Stewart has taught many sign language courses in area colleges and churches. She has appeared in recent years on the PTS campus in presentations designed to bring to pastoral attention the problems of the deaf in the hearing church. Oliver Twist will be directed by Thomas Gradnauer, himself deaf, a social studies teacher at the Katzenbach School. A question and answer period will follow the performance. As background for the service and play a sign language exhibit is on display in the Speer Library foyer until 3 April. Other Seminarians assisting in the program include M.Div. candidates Sherry F. Brabham, Diane A. Monger and John L. Rice, all conversant with the sign language.

It will be possible to "drop in" and "drop out"; however, the service is a unit from its beginning to the Paschal Breakfast.

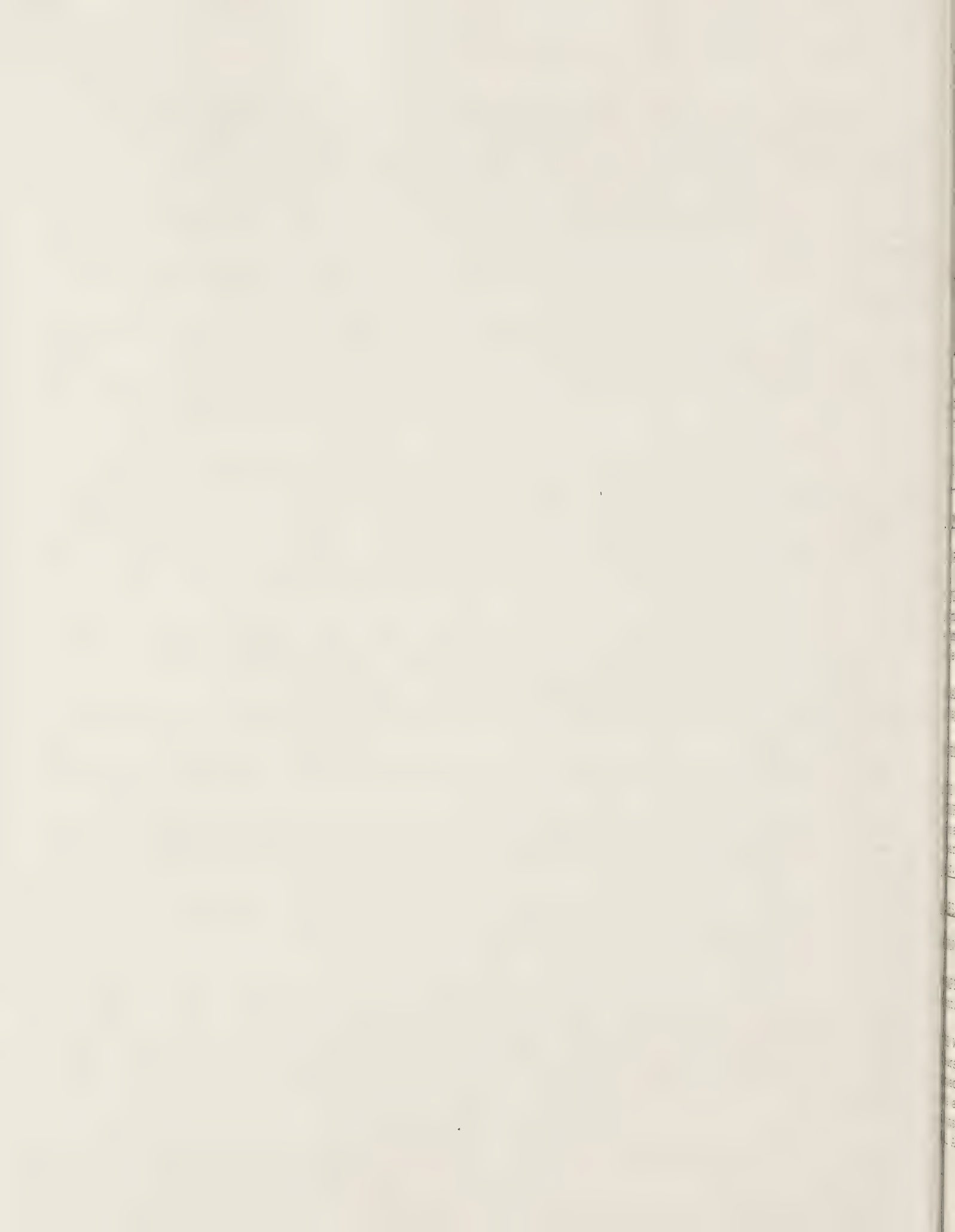
Small candles will be available, but you may want to bring your own larger candle to the service.
