


Erdman Art Gallery



Snow Reminders

When snow is predicted or falling, cars are to be removed from the upper level of the parking deck by the end of the academic/work day. The upper (open) levels are considered commuter or daily parking areas and are not for overnight/weekend/long-term parking. Lectures—"Listening for the Heartbeat of God: A Celtic Spirituality" and "At the Heart of Matter Is the Heart of God"

Main Lounge 9:00 a.m.–12:30 p.m.
J. Philip Newell, a Scottish minister and scholar who has taken a leading role in recovering the spirituality of the Celtic peoples and the Celtic church, will give two lectures on Celtic spirituality.

Newell's first lecture, "Listening for the Heartbeat of God: A Celtic Spirituality," is on Tuesday February 8 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Main Lounge. In the Celtic tradition, St. John the Evangelist is especially remembered as the one who leaned against Jesus at the Last Supper. It was said of him that he thus heard the heartbeat of God, and he became an image of the practice of listening within the whole of life for the beat of God's presence. Newell will explore what this tradition offers for the practice of Christian spirituality today.

The second lecture, "At the Heart of the Matter Is the Heart of God," is on Wednesday, February 9 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Main Lounge. The Celtic tradition sees creation as a "theophany" or disclosure of God, and Creation and Scripture as twin-loves. Newell will ask how we hold together our love of Scripture and our love of creation and how we learn to "read" creation and to "handle" it as a sacred text.

Newell is writer/theologian for The Cathedral of The Isles on the island of Cumbrae in Scotland. A Church of Scotland minister and former warden of lona Abbey, he did his Ph.D. research at the University of Edinburgh in the 1980s in the area of Scottish spirituality. Since then he has played a leading role on both sides of the Atlantic in the recovery of Celtic spirituality for today. His best-selling publications include *Listening for the Heartbeat of God* and *Celtic Benediction*.

Students eligible for summer housing include Ph.D. students (first through fourth year), students working on field education or CPE in the area, and those claiming PTS as their *only* residence.



If you are a returning student and will be enrolled in summer school or summer language, you will only be guaranteed a room for the period that the course is in session.



Jim Wallis founded Sojourners-Christians for Justice and Peace-more than 30 years ago. He continues to serve as editor for Sojourners magazine covering faith, politics, and social change. In 1995, he was instrumental in forming "Call to Renewal," a national federation of churches, denominations, and faith-based organizations from across the theological and political spectrum working to overcome poverty. Speaking at more than 200 events a year, from grassroots town meetings to gatherings of political and religious leaders all over the world, Wallis also offers regular commentary and analysis for radio and television and teaches a course at Harvard University on "Faith, Politics, and Society." His new book, God's Politics: Why the Right Gets It Wrong and the Left Doesn't Get It, has received tremendous response.

On Tuesday, April 26, Wallis will sign books at 3:45 p.m outside the Mackay Auditorium, and will speak on "The Healing of the Nation" at 4:30 p.m. in the auditorium. Later that evening, at 8:00 p.m., Wallis and Dr. Cornel West, The Class of 1943 University Professor of Religion at Princeton University, will dialogue on the topic of "Religion and Politics" in McCosh Hall #50 on the Princeton University campus. West is a theologian, activist, prolific author, and compelling speaker. His bestselling books—Race Matters and Democracy Matters—highlight his ongoing mission for racial equality and recognition of democracy as a spiritual force.


Facilities Announcements Spring Fertilizer Application



Princeton University, McCosh Hall #10 p. 7:30 p.m. Luke Timothy Johnson, Woodruff Professor of New Testament and Christian Origins at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia, will speak at Princeton University on Dan Brown's controversial bestseller The Da Vinci Code. Johnson's lecture, "The Da Vinci Code, the Culture Wars, and the New Gnosticism," will relate the popularity of the contentious book-which has sold 25 million copies in 44 languages—to the societal debates often described as the "culture wars." 
