GENERAL ASSEMBLY DELEGATE NOMINATIONS

The United Presbyterian General Assembly will meet in Houston, Texas, from May 20 to May 28, 1981. Princeton Seminary will be invited to send Seminary Delegates who will be elected by the student body early in this second semester. They must be active members of United Presbyterian Churches and will have the right to speak but not to vote at the Assembly which will pay travel expenses from Princeton and a per diem for hotel and meals. Students who attend should be prepared to leave Princeton on the morning of May 19th and they will not return until the evening of May 28th. The Seminary will also be invited to provide a few Seminary Assistants who will work on the floor of the Assembly half of the time and be behind the scenes half of the time. 



The high point of the Christian year is Easter, or the Christian Pascha. Historically the central celebration of the Church is Pascha, and from a very early time this celebration was focused in the Paschal Vigil. The major themes of Christian biblical theology and worship are included in this service as we journey from darkness to light, from sadness to joy, from fast to feast, from sin to righteousness, from death to life, from this world to the next. In the Vigil there is an attempt to recapitulate the history of salvation, beginning with the six days of creation, the seventh day (of redemption) and going on to the eighth day, the day of the Lord expressed in the Lord's Supper, the Eschatological banquet.

The service of the Vigil is a passage, a procession, and it is our prayer that on our journey to Emmaus the Lord will meet us. The stranger on the road interpreted to them all the scriptures, beginning with the Law and the prophets, and their eyes were opened when he broke bread with them. So in the Paschal Vigil the scripture readings begin with creation, and move through the liberation of the Exodus, the proclamation of the prophets and the victory of Christ over sin and death. The Announcement of the Resurrection, with the reading of the resurrection gospel is the fulcrum of the service. Christ our Passover has been sacrificed for us, therefore, let us keep the feast (I Cor 5:7).

In the light of Christ's resurrection and in response to it the Church is born. We then remember and identify with those members of the Body who have gone before, recounting the witness of apostles and martyrs, with emphasis on the present imperatives of the gospel. Remembering and acknowledging who we are as the Church, the people of God, we confess our faith, baptize new members into this Body, and renew our commitment to the Lord, to his Church and to service in the world.

The service comes to its culmination as we come to the Lord's Table, and there receive a foretaste of the banquet of the Kingdom which is in heaven.

In many traditions it is customary to serve a break-fast which historically concludes the fast of Lent.

The Vigil historically seeks to include all aspects of the parish community. For example, the Prologue of John's gospel is read in as many languages as are represented in the congregation. Various groups (choirs, study groups, classes, etc.) participate. This service gives the opportunity for the dedication of all of our abilities and talents to the service of the praise of the risen Christ. Central to the service are preaching, baptism and the Lord's Supper, but we also seek to incorporate music, dance, drama, procession, textile arts, prayer and praise as we seek the inspiration and the direction of the Spirit of God for our lives as a resurrection people.

The service should serve to sweep us into holy history, to challenge us anew by the Word of God and to impel us into service, strengthened with the Bread of Life and the Cup of Salvation.
