Monday, December 13, Naval Air Propulsion Center, Ewing,

for "Peace on Earth: Stop the Cruise and Pershing Missiles."
The Naval facility has a \$2.5 million contract for the cruise
missile, which is part of the new generation of first-strike,
destabilizing weapons. The General Assembly of the United
Presbyterian Church in 1982 urged the halt of cruise missile
production in a resolution entitled "Confronting Idolatry."
The legal vigil is sponsored by the Coalition for Nuclear
Disarmament, an organization started and supported by Princeton
area churches. The vigil is being conducted on the third
anniversary of NATO's decision to deploy 464 cruise and 108
Pershing missiles throughout Western Europe and will be
simultaneous with peace demonstrations organized throughout
