


CHRISTMAS I. RETURNS TO AUSTRALIA

After eighteen months, WORONI's efforts to awaken the Commonwealth Government to its duty in the Near North-East have succeeded. During the final week of the vacation it was announced that Christmas Island (Indian Ocean), not the barren and H-bomb-blasted Pacific isle that most Asian newspapers took it for, but a very tre-sure-store of guano, so necessary in the encouragement of growth of the wheat which is still, despite the rapid rise in our metal exports, sourred by overseas discoveries of new uses for metals and Australian enterprise, one of our main earners of foreign currency, is to be ceded to the Commonwealth.

PART TIMERS PARE WELCOME

Dear Sir,

Association, 23 students voted in favour of a motion which condemned an aspect of African 'apartheid'. That vote was sufficient to carry the motion, and, no doubt, in due course it will be presented to the South African Government as the voice of the C.U.C. students.

It is interesting to note that Dr. Van Rhijn, the South African Minister for Economic Affairs, recently (AAP 18/5/57) accused Great Britain of applying racial segregation more strictly than South Africa. Professor Clark reminded us in his "Democrat on the Ganges" lecture (8/5/57) that Australia practises 'apartheid' ... and we have our White Australia Policy!

The South African motion was very poorly debated and its proposer openly admitted his lack of specialist knowledge on South African problems and administration. It may be that the motion was submitted only to provide bulk at a time when it may have appeared that there would have been a dearth of motions for discussion at the Annual General Meeting - but there was ample time in which to withdraw it. The fact remains that a small unrepresentative vote of only 23 students passed a resolution which will be handed to the world as a product of the mature deliber tions of some 400 C.U.C. students.

Two important points emerge from this incident:

(i) We can dissociate ourselves from irresponsible resolutions only by attending the general meetings of the Students' Association and preventing their passage;

(ii) Canberra student affairs seriously lack drive when matters of local significance are shadowed by dilletantish discussions of the internal politics of foreign nations.

There is a current rumour, too widespread to be altogether without foundation, that at the general masting to be held early in second term, that motions will be submitted concerning a revision of the death of graves in Heligoland, the price of Almaca wool in Peru, and the compulsory wearing of academic gowns by all clerks in Ethionia. (Our Constitution may not provide for ex-Australian discussions, but they have been allowed on the agenda in the mast.)

To ensure that motions of the type illustrated above are ignominiously rejected and that the Association meetings concentrate on finding remedies for genuine student grievances and on implementing constructive student suggestions, all students - including those studying law - should make a special effort to be present at the forth-coming general meeting.
