


CRISIS AT CUC




-The Rebel Professor of Political Subversion.

In a shock move last night, the rebel professor of political Subversion seized the Canberra University College, and declared it independent. He claimed that the academic staff and the students were solid behind him. Melbourne has retorted that this is due to Canberra's weather. When faced with a professorial barrage (the most frightful weapon known to man) the C.U.C. administration had no choice but to surrender on the spot. The assistant Registrar collapsed from overwork.

It is not yet certain whether the cold war between staff and students has ceased. Some reports said that teachers and pupils were fraternising in the classrooms, but there were indications of renewed fighting elsewhere. A heavy barrage of essays has seriously affected many students. The worst casualties have been in the French I sector, where one student obtained 0% in the test, almost the lowest mark a student can obtain. However, there was a shock reversal in another subject, where all students returned their essays on time. 






A £ 25 prize has been announced for the best entry on the contentious topic - White Australia - Necessity or Folly?" The essays will be judged by a panel of the academic staff at the University of W.A. representing the Departments of History, English and Anthropology.


All undergraduate members of recognised Australian universities are eligible to compete. Essays are not to exceed 3000 words in length. The winning entry will be published in "The West Australian", a Perth daily, and appropriate rights are vested in the International Club. A fee of 2/6 will apply to all entries and should be submitted with essays. Entries close with the Secretary, International Club, University of Western Australia, Nedlands, W.A. at 5 p.m. on 1st August, 1958 and must be postmarked prior to that time.


world University Service is a charitable organisation sponsored by World Student Christian Federation, Pax Romana and the WORLD UNION OF JEWISH STUDENTS. In 1957 W.U.S. raised about £ 3500, a bit more than usual, but a good deal of it was carmarked for Hungarian students displaced by the Revolution Looking over the amounts raised from Australian Universities, we see that Adelaide is top with £ 1700 and Melbourne next with £ 745. The next was Sydney with £ 510, while New England made £ 119 and W.A. £ 50. We raised £10, but beat queensland, who raised nil. W.U.S. has built a T.B. Rest Centre at Katiarang, Indonesia, and supplied it with blankets, supported Hungarian refugees and helped towards scholarships in South Africa. A final quote from the report: "the bulk of the money raised was by students for students and the spirit of brotherhood aroused both in those who gave and those who received is probably as valuable as the material aid."





MBACKGROUND HO REVOLT

College is a peculiar institution.

Located in inconvenient, permanent temporary buildings, and irritated by various happenings resulting from long distance control from Melbourne University (notably the cause celebre of Economic Geography last year), the spirit of revolt has been fermenting for many years.


Until now the C.U.C. has not been strong enough to act. But in 1958 a colossel increase in the number of full-time students at the College, combined with a rise in the number of part-time evening students provided ready material for the skilful intribute who holds the chair of Political Subjersion.

Melbourne University intends to appeal to N.U.A.U.S., but the position is still uncertain, as powerful forces in Melbourne will be only too glad to see Canberra go.

In a victory speech to a milling throng of nearly fifteen people, the Professor of Political Subversion pointed out that the number of students only needed to double to get into four figures (a hostile interjector; four jirls will give you the same result. Interjector liquidated). The thirteen students cheered wildly as the rebel professor promised that a language course would no longer be compulsory for conscientious objectors. He foreshadowed the erection of a luxury new Senior Common Room; well away from the students, so that scholars could carry on their activities uninhibited by the excessive decibel rating of the Student Common Room. He also promised to donate a new typewriter to the S.R.C. and to burn the old one at the stake.

Later, this last promise was withdrawn on the representations of a delegation of students, who stressed the deleterious affects on morality which must follow segregation.





STILL NO S.R.C.

SRC-phobes can still rejoice. On THURSDAY 17th May, despite 3 consecutive meetings (Special G.M. One, Special G.M. Two, reconvened A.G.M. episode two) we were still unable to hear just who the unfortunate reps. were. However Ron Miller's original motion to declare the elections null and void was replaced by one directing the returning officer to complete the poll by sending ballot papers to the 30 people who did not receive them (NOTE: reason was that the record cards of these 30 had been mislaid by the SRC - not Brett Odgers).

One effect of the new motion was that Barry Schick was displaced as President and thrown back into the election scramble, but Mike Austin at once withdrew his nomination, and a motion was passed that Barry continue to act as President. Joan Thomson was also unseated, but we confidently predict that this will have no effect on her chances. On Thursday 12th June the third instalment of the A.G.M. will, we hope, be able to settle the SRC permanently. TIME? 9.00 p.m. In passing, the Presidential poll was 21.9%, faculties poll was 23.5%.

2nd SPECIAL G.M. Moved Miller that only members of a faculty could nominate for it - complaint seems to be that a swag of lawyers nominated for everything in sight but it was felt that the motion was too sweeping. For instance, what happens if no representatives of a faculty were forthcoming? (e.g. non-faculty or pub. admin.). So Austin put up an amendment that no-one can stand for more than one faculty, and saw it passed by the requisite 2/3 majority. WORONI's private view is that the whole faculty system should be scrapped, and the election be a straight contest. In practise the SRC acts as a collection of individuals, not as faculty reps. In previous years the SRC would often decide which members would represent which faculties, just to keep the books straight.

Also moved Miller that Union fees be: full-timers £ 2, part-timers £1, non-examination students 10/-. Discussion was heated; part-timers reckon they are paying through the nose for the benefit of a full-time clique; full-timers retorted that if part-timers bludged on fees, they would get thrown out altogether. Ron felt that it was only elementary justice that full-timers who were lounging round the Common Room swilling softdrink while part-timers were working the day to death should pay more, but the full-timers were unimpressed and had no hesitation in throwing the motion out.

FINALLY THERE WAS THE SECOND INSTALMENT OF THE A.G.M.

Several motions were withdrawn, but Ron Fraser still moved that:- "the arrogation of power to themselves by certain individuals as manifested in the imposition of censorship of Common Room decorations be expressly disapproved of." This refers to the pin-ups. Strong opinions were now expressed: Fraser had to be gagged following a strong denunciation of narrow-minded intolerance. Judy Baskin congratulated the removers on behalf of the SCM; Chris Jay retorted that SCM obviously had a low opinion of our self-control. Mike Austin demanded to know what was the dark and sinister motive behind the motion (Fraser: "There isn't). Ron Miller announced that the AQUINAS Society opposed such blatant sex exposure. McCarthy and Kennard moved the gag, but the motion was lost. Later, when the motion was finally put, 10 persons wished to censure the unknown individuals, 17 did not. Motion Lost.


There was also GENERAL BUSINESS:






In the Common Room, the females keep in tight little groups which regard with considerable suspicion any male who desires their company. Am I really so ugly, and repulsive?


And have these females got enough boyfriends already? I am desperate for company, but can't make the grade.




During the month of May, as first term wore on towards its end, a table tennis competition was slowly proceeding, the virtual exclusion of social play.



STUDENT SHOT

Taleb Abderrahmane, science student at the University of Algiers, was executed by the French Government 24th April at Algiers. Taleb was accused of being an accomplice in the fabrication of bombs thrown in an Algiers cafe. The 23 National Unions of students participating in the Extraordinary International Conference in London in mid-April on problems of Algerian students had adopted unanimously an emergency motion, calling for a suspension of his sentence and a retrial under "better conditions nof justice."

Close examination of the case indicated improper methods both in interrogation procedures and in the trial by a military court, which maintained an atmosphere of general intimidation. The Secretariat pointed out to the French government that students in other parts of the world were of the opinion that Algerian students were being subjected to a "generalised repression."

The Secretariat launched an appeal for the creation of study opportunities in other countries for 400 Algerian students who were unable for political reasons to continue their higher education in France, Scholarship offers have already arrived from the National Unions of Norway and Guatemala.

A special fact-finding student mission to study the university situation in Spain was expelled with 24 hours notice. The two members of the team, Juan Barros of Chile and Peter Reiser of Switzerland, were forced to leave abruptly after remaining six days in Spain, meeting representatives of various student groupings, including the official government sponsored body, religious organisations and political groups. Police refused to give reasons for their action.



FRENCH ARE OUTRAGED

The national headquarters of the Union Nationale des Etudiants de France (UNEF) were sacked in a swift and unannounced attacke by a gang of 15 extreme right wing demonstrators, believed to belong to the monarchist "Action Francaise" grouping, on late afternoon 15th May. Substantial damage resulted as the ransackers smashed windows, destroyed typewriters, ripped telephones from the wall and strewed files on the floor.

Meanwhile, the same day, UNEF joined with teachers' unions in appealing for preservation of "republican legality" in resolution of the political crisis now confronting France. Local unions were instructed to "hold themselves in readiness for any necessary action" as National Union leaders followed closely the evolution of the situation.
