

#### FOREWORD

I have undertaken the compilation and publishing of the Genealogy of the Worth Family at the request of several members of the family, although I, myself, am not a descendent. It has been a most interesting and engaging study as well as a time-consuming and difficult task. I am deeply indebted to every member of the family who so willingly cooperated and supplied needed information. The early ancestry of the Worth Family was graciously supplied by friends in Boston from records in the New England Historical and Genealogical Society, Boston, Mass. and can be verified there. I humbly beg forgiveness for any errors or ommissions and only regret that the biographical sketches had of necessity to be brief. It is also to be regretted that full dates could not be given but such would have made the genealogy twice as large.

I have found the Worths to be a noble progeny of worthy pioneer ancestors who came to Pennsylvania from New England when this section was still a wilderness forest. They brought with them their principles of honesty, upright living, industry and a deep faith in God. The family is to be noted for its longevity: Samuel Worth lived to be 93 and many of his descendents have passed their 75th and 80th birthdays while a few have even passed 90. Samuel and Hannah Worth had seven children, 27 grandchildren, 79 great grandchildren and today their descendents number well over 400. These are scattered throughout Northeastern Pennsylvania as well as New York and New Jersey, Maryland and Washington, D. C., Michigan and Illinois, Tennessee and Texas, Florida and California: I have found them for the greater part to be an honest, upright, intelligent family, many of whose members have distinguished themselves in fields of religion, education, medicine and law. Most of the Worths have been Baptists by religious faith and several of them have been Deacons and Ministers. Though most of the family have scattered from their original locality in Greenfield Township, the Worth name will live on there in the Worth Baptist Church and the Worth Cemetery nearby. This Genealogy of the Worth Family is humbly submitted with the desire that a faithful record of your ancestors might be preserved and the prayer that the noble characteristics of their lives will live on in the Worths of present and future generations.

# THE WORTH ANCESTRY

The Family of Worth, originally called De La Worth, came to England from Normandy with William the Conqueror in his famous Invasion in 1066. The Worth Family had become quite numerous in the county of Devonshire by the time of the reign of King Henry the 11th, JOHN WORTH of Devonshire was a Royalist at the time of the Puritan Revolution. He and his eldest son, John, lost their lives defending Plymouth Fort in 1645 during the Cromwellian Wars, after which his property was confiscated and his family scattered abroad. He had five sons, three of whom emigrated to America: William Worth settled on the Island of Nantucket where he became a prominent citizen; Richard Worth located in New Jersey where his descendents became very numerous and Lionel Worth settled in Massachusetts.

LIONEL WORTH, son-of John Worth of Devonshire, England, came to America in 1653 and located first at Salisbury, Massachusetts. He married Susannah Whipple, daughter of Joseph Whipple of Ipswich, Mass, and they had seven children: Susannah, Mary, Judith, Sarah, Infant twins and John. Lionel Worth later lived at Old Newbury, Essex Co., Mass. about 40 miles North of Boston. He died in 1667 and his widow later married Moses Pillsbury of the Pillsbury flour family.

JOHN WORTH 1664-1707, son of Lionel Worth, married in 1687 to Elizabeth Webster 1668-, daughter of John and Elizabeth Brown Webster. They had four children: Elizabeth, John, Joseph and Edmund Worth.

EDMUND WORTH was born in 1695, son of John Worth and married in 1718 to Elizabeth Kelley, daughter of John and Elizabeth Emory Kelley. They lived on the cld Worth farm at West Newbury, Mass. and had two sons: Edmund and Stephen Worth.

EDMUND WORTH 1719-1761, som of Edmund Worth and fourth in line of descent, married in 1740 to Abigail Courrier 1721-1804, daughter of Samuel and Abigail Kelley Courrier of Haverill, Mass. They lived also in Repex County, Mass. and had seven children: Edmund, John, Elizabeth, Abigail, Stephen, Samuel and Judith Worth.

STEPHEN WORTH was born in 1752, son of Edmund Worth and was fifth in line of descent. He settled in Hillsborough County, New Hampshire and had three sons: Edmund, Stephen and Samuel. These three brothers migrated to Pennsylvania about 1810 and settled on a large tract of land in Lenox Township in Susquenanna County near Cameron Corners, For a time they prospered but one Spring the high waters of the creek near their place did such great damage to their property and stock that they decided to abandon the place, dissolve their partnership and each go his own way. Samuel Worth was a taxable in Lenox Township in 1816 and Stephen Worth was a schoolteacher in Harford before 1820. Accordingly Stephen Worth went to Maine; Edmund Worth married Mary Carpenter of Harford and settled at Ararat, Pa.; and Samuel Worth located in Greenfield Township, Lackawanna County, Penna. This Genealogy is a record of his descendents.

### THE WORTH GENEALOGY

SAMUEL WORTH was born in New Hampshire on November 17, 1775, the son of Stephen Worth. Family tradition says he once attended Harvard College. He married Hannah Prentice 1781-1848 who became the mother of their seven children. About 1810 they moved from New Hampshire to Northeastern Pennsylvania, locating first in Lencx Township, Susquehanna County. In 1821 they settled on a large farm in Greenfield Township at the place later called Amasa. arrived with their family in the winter of 1821, soon built a log cabin home and brought with them the family cow which soon after their arrival freshened in a snow hut. Samuel Worth was an honest, hard-working farmer and cleared up a fine farm where his son, John Worth, later lived at Worth Church corners. He erected a substantial frame house for his family which stood near where the present barn stands. His wife, Hannah Worth died in 1848, aged 67, and was the first person interred in the Worth Family Cemetery, which was commenced on their farm. Samuel Worth died in 1869 at the advanced age of 93 Children of Samuel and Hannah Prentice Worth were: years.

HANNAH and SARAH WORTH never married. They were old maids and lived in the family home at Amasa. They were of a very retiring nature and rather eccentric in disposition. Sarah died in 1870, aged 62 and Hannah died in 1878, aged 79. They are buried in the Worth Cemetery. Their brother, Samuel Worth, never married either; he was of a roving disposition and died in 1849, at age 35. Elizabeth Worth married Tom Taylor and had four children; Their family is to be found on pages 14 and 15. John Worth married Jane Van Winkle by whom he had ten children. He inherited his father's farm. Their descendents begin on page 10. Nancy Worth married James Cowperthwaite and had eight children who will be found on page 16. Edmund Worth married Susannah Doud and settled on a farm near his father. His descendents follow. Samuel and Hannah Worth had seven children, twenty-seven grandchildren and today their descendents number over 400.

EDMUND WORTH was born April 13, 1807 in New Hampshire and came to Greenfield in 1821 with his father while the Township was still a wilderness. He married Susannah Doud 1812-1885, daughter of John and Eetsy Baker Doud of Doud Hollow, now Lennoxville. She was a granddaughter of Isaac Doud, a Soldier of the Revolution. Edmund Worth settled on a farm in Greenfield near his father on the road from Worth Church to Thorn Hill. He first built a log cabin and later a frame house where his grandson Will Worth later lived, now occupied by the Yashik family. He was an industrious farmer. They were both charter members of the Worth Baptist Church and had five children. He died in 1882, aged 75, and she in 1885, aged 73, both are buried in Worth Cemetery:

JOHN L. WORTH born in Greenfield April 26, 1832 married in 1855 by Elder James Brown to Mary M. Colvin 1834-1865 daughter of Stephen and Emerline Colvin Colvin of North Abington. They had five children. He was a farmer and insurance agent and lived in Greenfield Township at Amasa on the road from Worth Church to Thorn Hill. He built a home across the road from his father's house, where the Yashik family now live. He was a faithful member and a Deacon in the Worth Baptist Church. After the death of his first wife he married second to Fally Wells 1844-1872, daughter of Wright and Anna Baker Wells of Elkdale. She died at the age of 28 leaving no children. He married third to Esther Marvin 1848-1929, of Muhlenburg, Par. They had two children. John L. ## COWPERTHWAITE FAMILY
