

The subject of a registry law has been discusse

often, and its merits tried, and its demerits found ont. No one has yet been framed that did not prove worse than the evil it was intended to rem edy. Besides, the constitution of Kentucky fixes who shall vote, prescribes the qualifications, and the legislature have no power to add any other. You must alter the constitution of Kentucky before you can deprive a legal voter of the right of suffrage, because his name does not happen to be registered beforehand. The Know-Nothings had better read the organic law of the State before they hurry up to Frankfort to tamper with the elective franchise; for the benefit of a brokenthis State bas no power to say a man's name shall be registered before he can vote. But, if the legislature had the power, and should exercise it, it would not prevent frauds. Spurious names can be registered, and vagabonds can claim the names and vote under them. If a scoundrel can buy a escape, he can register a name for him beforehand, and find the voter to vote under it. But the editor is greatly exercised about frauds, which he says have been committed. We are satisfied that frauds were committed in this city. We do not believe that the thirty-eight hundred Know Nothing votes of Louisville were legal. There were, perhaps, frauds in other localities; but they weald not have been prevented by registry laws nor by any other expedient that we have beard suggested. The convention that framed our new constitution, exercised all their ingennity to prevent frands at elections. There was very little party feeling in the body; and the sixty days' resldence in a precinct was adopted as the best plan they could invent. No registry of votes beforehand was proposed, and it is now too late to talk of it. If a white man over twenty-one has lived two years in the State, or one year in the county, and sixty days in his precinct, there is no power in the legislature to prevent his voting, if he be a citizen of the United States. The assertion of the editor that the Democrats committed frand in this State, is like his numerous ontgivings for the last year or more, and about as much to be relied on as a thousand other things he has said. The people of Kentneky have before them the rasults, and can compare them with his positive statements, his opinions, and his predictions. He was about as well informed about political movements then as he is about frauds now; and there is inst as much truth in his assertion now as there was in his foretellings about the opicions and sentiments of the people of this country before the late election. His party will say his indement is not worth a cent about anything. When he gives out that there were tre mendone frands, they will naturally reply : so you told us there was a prodiglons number of Fillmore votes in the country. He certainly knew se much about the latter as he knows now about the former. We see nothing at all remarkable about the results of this election. The Democrats have generally carried the States they claimed with a reasonable certainty; the Know-Nothings have some out as all eool and sensible men expected; even Filimore men of any political infor matten and sagacity got all they expected, with the exception, perhaps, of Kentucky; and this State has gone as any reasonable man might have expected. They claimed Naw York, but everybody outside of the Know-Nothing party knet that Fillmore wouldn't beat anybody in that State. The Fremont party has done better than we hoped they would; but not as well as all feared they might. Their success is not at all unaccountable. They had the aid of adventitions elecum stances, that will hardly occur again in a lifetime They perpetrated frands in some localities; that is a matter that will be proved; but these were the work of political knaves, and but partial. They owe their success, not to frauds upon the ballot-box, but to the industrions propagation of false issnee; in the seal and energy with which they propagated a delusion. They have a go'd deal of material that could be worked up into political espital.

The plain fact is then, that if there were frands in some localities, they have not affected the result. It is no more than just what men familiar with the sentiments of the country expected. But what is the use of laws to protect the right

Section Eight of the Constitution of Kentucky Respecting the Legislative Department.

Every free white male citizen, of the age of twentyone year, who has resided in the State two years, or
in the county, town, or city in which he offers to vote
one year next preceding the election, shall he a
votes; but such veter shall hav been for skuy days
lext preceding the election a resident of the precinct
in which he offers to vote; and he shall cast his vote
in said precinct, and not elsewhere.

Now we should like to know if the legislature can add to or take away a single qualification here prescribed. If a man possesses the qualifiention here laid down, he shall be a veter, says the constitution. The constitution does not say his name shall be registered beforehand, nor can the legislature say it. The legislature might perhaps roquire a register to be kept fer any purpose, but the citizen, with the qualification of age and residence, could vote, whether registered or not. The constitution has not left the power to prescribe the qualifications of voters to the legislature; and the eall for a meeting of that body, to pass a registry law, is an impudent attempt to assume power that does not belong to the legislature. This desperate faction, however, would at tempt, for party advantage, to repeal the constitution itself.

ocasionally lose a erep by dronth. Flaxseed is considered a good paying crop, taking one year with another, averaging about ten bushels to the acre. There are few crops grown with less labor, and as it matures early, it is less liable to injury from drouth than many other crops. It is an excellent crop to precede wheat, leaving the ground in excellent condition for that

There is a prospect that ere long there may be a demand for the straw for manufacturing purposes. In the neighborhood of Dayton, Ohio, 110 Fourth Street, between Market and Jefferson, where immense quantities of flaxseed is produced, the straw brings from five to ten dollare per ton, depending upon condition. If ant with a soythe it is tangled like bay, and is considered less valuable than when pulled and kept in bundles. The flax straw in Dayton is passed through a series of fluted rollers in the narotted condition, and sold to the upholsters for stnfing hair cushlons, come partially rotted, then passed through rollers Some converted into tow suitable for certain descriptions of cordage, and the better qualities are rotted, broken out and sentched for the eastearn flax mills. It is now proposed to manufacture the flax, near where it is grown, into various kinds of coarse articles, to which it is adapted, and we believe that a company is now formed in this city for this purpose. We trust that many years may not pass before factories for manufacturing the flax fibre will be established in all the

flax growing districts. A hnshel of seed should be sown to the acre and the average product of straw is about one ton per acre, and seed about ten bushels. It has been demonstrated that flax is not an exhausting crop, but it should not be repeated too soon upon the same land, but should come in rotation with other crops, in which it should precede wheat. Oats is much more exhausting crop than flax.

A puliing machine has been used successfully in the State of New York, by which one horse pulls and spreads six acres of flax in a day. It is public property, the patent having expired, and it is said that the machine can be made for about eixty dollars.
