Democratic Outlook Bright.

Representative Ollie James says: "I believe we will control the Sixtysecond Congress by an overwhelming majority," he says. "We expect to gain two Democratic Congressmen in Kentucky. The Democratic party is in the finest fighting kelter and it looks to me as if nothing can beat us."

President Taft's administration has been a ponderous failure," added Mr. James. "On the eve of the approaching campaign, we find the Republican party divided as it has not been since the days of Garfield and Conkling. Broken pledges and betrayed promises confront a distracted and fleeting Republicanism on every hand. The increased cost of living is due primarily to the Payne tariff bill, together with the trusts and monopolies which are fostered by the party in power and which are enabled to rob the producer of what he has to sell and with a like brutality the consumer when he has to buy.

Committee to Meet.

Chairman Henry R. Prewitt has called the Democratic State Central Committee to meet at the Seelbach in Louisville on Thursday afternoon, July 7, at 1 o'clock.

The purpose of the meeting is to select a campaign committee to have charge of the Democratic Congressional races this fall, and to elect a chairman of that committee.

A Fraud.

Rev. Shelhorn, of the Kentucky Children's Home Society advises the newspapers that there is a woman in the field collecting funds pretendingly for the Home. He says the woman is a fraud and should be given nothing intended for the Home.

Heavy Rains.

The heavy rains Sunday night and Monday caused the highest waters for years on the creeks and put Red river over the bottoms which has destroyed crops to the extent of thousands of dollars. Hill land has been washed considerably and crops there damaged a great deal. The high waters in Clark county has also caused great damage to buildings and growing crops.

Declines to Run.

Since the question of Congressional candidates has been discussed, John M. Stevenson and A. Floyd Byrd, of Winchester have each been urged to make the race. Mr. Stevenson declines to run but Mr. Byrd says if his people want him to run he will make the race. Langley would be easy picking for such a man as Mr. Byrd.

Schools Begin.

Most of the schools of the county began Tuesday morning. Monday being the Fourth and a legal holiday the teachers will not be allowed this day as taught. Oct. 12 will be a new holiday for the public schools this year, the last Legislature having made this a law.

All Banks Called on.

Every bank, both national and State, was called on at the same time this month for a statement of its condition. The Comptroller of the Currency and the bank superintendents of every State in the union had an agreement by which the States should call for statements for the condition of State banks at the same time that the call was made for the national banks. This is the first time that the calls were ever made all at the same time. The purpose is to get an accurate statement of the condition of the banks of the whole country on a particular day.

Tracy, 1st assistant; and Mrs. Mildred Mountz, 2nd assistant. The salaries were fixed at \$75.00, \$45.00 and \$40.00 per month respectively. The school will begin Monday, August 1st.

The Bank Statement.

Promptly responding to the unexpected call of the Comptroller of the Currency the Clay City National Bank this week furnishes its patrons with a report of its condition June 30. This bank is one of the most solid institutions of its kind in eastern Kentucky.

Republican Fallacy.

The Republican party can lay no claim of fulfilling its pledges to the people in the recent admission of Arizona and New Mexico as States. Each of them could have become states years ago by going Republican. A bill was passed two years ago to admit these territories but the two were to be unreasonably joined together, and this kind of statehood did not suit the territories. At the same time it will be remembered that Indian Territory and Oklahoma were joined together for statehood for no other reason than that these territories like New Mexico and Arizona were Democratic and would give congress four more Democratic Senators instead of two. Oklahoma took her medicine however so eager was she to become a State.

The question now is why did congress ever let Arizona and New Mexico Democratic states come it. When the truth is understood it is easy to see. Arizona went Republican for the first time last time fall and the hope of its going that way again made it easy to get into the Union as a state. But did it vote Republican just to get statehood, thereby putting up a job on the Republican party or was it from real principle. It is believed that from this no the state will be as the territory was always before last year, almost solid Democratic.

Lest We Forget.

John Langley is a mountain man and it does seem that he would have some claim on the mountain voter for that if no other reason. But let's see how he regards his highland brother's intellect. In Powell county at least, during his campaign two years ago, posters were tacked

up most everywhere it was convenient reading similar to this: "Vote for Langley for Congress, he will get the Government to build turnpikes in this district, preferably in the mountain counties."

Mr. Langley knew the Government could not do this and it was the motive to try and fool the voters of this county who he thought were ignorant enough to believe such an unreasonable assertion. We may be ignorant in Powell but not this ignorant, and we will show Mr. Langley this time that we have some resentment by giving something like 200 majority against him.

Going the Limit.

The Memphis Herald is in trouble. A recent issue of that paper was suppressed by the post-office department because it contained a cartoon dealing with the Insurgent and Standpat Republicans. Every effort will be made to save the day, and it seems the government is hitting the newspapers first. There was nothing wrong with the paper but its politics which was Democratic. Several papers in Iowa have been withheld from the mails because they continued to send papers to subscribers who are more than one year in arrears. The enforcement of this law may be all right if indiscriminately applied, but when it comes to applying it to Insurgent Republican and Democratic papers only if this be the intention, we think that is a little too much politics.

Much ado has come up over the railroad bill and many wants to know what it does.

The railroad bill creates new offices of course—every Republican bill does that. This measure provides for a new court with five judges, to have especial jurisdiction of appeals made by railroads from rulings of the Interstate Commerce Commission. In four years only twenty-six such cases have arisen, but that doesn't matter—new offices for Republicans is what is wanted. Here is a fat berth for five Republican corporation lawyers—it's the usual perquisite attached to every Republican measure.

The ever-loyal Washington

Star says of President Taft's intention of speaking in the middle West in October, "Republicans should welcome it and Democrats should take it into their calculations." The effect of previous Taft speeches makes it certain that Democrats will welcome them. If Republicans are wise they will take them into their calculations.

The Republican party is composed of three classes. One has to have the pie then and there; the second holds on expecting to get it when the first class gets through; the third class is kept under subjection by being fooled all the time by the first two classes.

A Year without a Summer.

Every now and then some discover that our winter and summer seasons are not what they used to be; that the thermometer nowadays is prone to capricious reverses, and that as the rustic poet sings:

December comes in June
June comes December.

Those who deplore the passing of the old-time summer, should look up the records of the year 1816, and note what happened then. 1816 was called "the year without a summer." There was a frost ever month of the year. January and February were mild; March was blustering and raw; at the end of April snow fell abundantly and the brooks were ice imprisoned as in winter. In May the wondering buds and young pints were nipped ere they were aware and the corn was annihilated by an ice sheet that formed to the thickness of half an inch. In June snow fell three inches deep in New York and Massachusetts, and the destruction of growing things begun in May was disastrously completed. On the fifth of July ice as thick as window glass was a common phenomenon in Pennsylvania, and in August there was ice half an inch thick. Pennsylvania farmers were compelled to pay \$4 00 and \$5 00 a bushel for corn for the next spring's planting. Winter seemed to set in during the latter fortnight of September; from that time forward ice and snow were at no time lacking. —Philadelphia Ledger.

Another lesson of what can be done in this country when the proper effort is made.

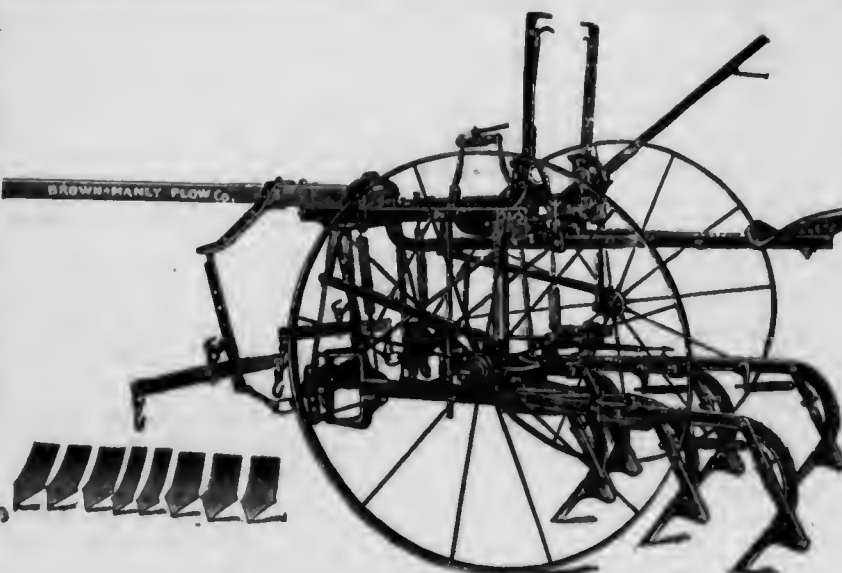

Vital Washington News.

"The whoopers-up for President Taft claimed that he was omnipotent and could force Congress to do anything he desired," declared Minority Leader Champ Clark, reviewing the session just closed in an interview with the writer.

"If that be true one thing must be admitted and that is that Mr. Taft is in favor of the reckless waste of public money."

"The total of appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1910, was \$1,044,000,000, whereas the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, are about \$1,058,000,000, an increase of \$14,000,000. Such expenditures are absolutely unjustifiable. When the President came into office he declared for economy with a great flourish of trumpets. The newspapers were full of what he was going to do in that regard to relieve the taxpayers of the land. But all such talk turned out to be thundering in the index—as the foregoing totals show.

"I have heretofore stated in the House and out of it that Senator Aldrich said a good business man can run the government just as well as it is run for \$300,000,000 per annum less than it now costs. The President himself fixed the amount which could be saved every year \$100,000,000. Other Republican big wigs, notably Senator Carter of Montana, Senator Hale of Maine, chairman of the Senate Appropriations committee and Hon. James A. Tawney, chairman of the House Appropriations committee, have talked economy; but the fact remains that their economy consists entirely of gab and that they actually increased the appropriations instead of reducing them.

"As they have large majorities in both Houses of Congress and could do as they pleased, one or two things is true; 1. They do not desire to economize; or 2. They are utterly incompetent.

"But how can President Taft expect Congress to economize when he sets the example of extravagance not only by using up the \$25,000 annual allowance for traveling expenses, but uses up several thousand dollars more? Be it remembered no President ever received this travel pay till the last part of the Roosevelt regime and Roosevelt never used all of the allowance, while his

successor uses more. How can Congress be expected to economize when the Vice-President and Speaker set the bad example by using automobiles paid for by the public money?

"I am aware that economy is an humble theme, but it is close to the hearts of the people and millions of them cannot afford to be taxed to support Republican official in their reckless extravagance."

It has become known in Washington that President Taft endeavored to have Roosevelt pay him a visit at the White House, and that the latter did not accept the invitation. This further emphasizes the story that the Taft administration has been so bad that Roosevelt will not dare to endorse it. It is said that the President's invitation was carried to Roosevelt orally by Captain Archibald Butt, and delivered on the day of Roosevelt's return. Senator Lodge of Massachusetts and Son-in-law Longworth, according to information which has leaked out, also made strenuous endeavors to have Roosevelt pay his respect at the White House, but T. R. balked.

Now comes Representative Butler Ames of Massachusetts, Republican insurgent, with the statement that the political machine of Senator Lodge of that state "is backed by all the large corporations all the state and patronage at his command," and is used to "advance the selfish financial schemes of the large railroads, banking and manufacturing interests he serves in the halls of Congress. This is hardly news to well-informed men in Washington. Lodge is one of the Aldrich group, ever ready to increase the tariff and serve the corporate interests. He stated in the Senate one day that the ultimate consumer is a myth.

Protectionists assert that high tariff rates protect American workmen. What is meant by the word "protect?" The steel industry is one of the most highly protected industries in the United States. The high rates on steel products have protected the American workmen in that industry by driving them from the mills, positions formerly filled by Americans are now occupied by the cheapest foreign labor. A report just made on conditions in the mills of the steel trust at Bethlehem, Pa. states that "4725 men, or 51 per cent. of all the employees, worked twelve hours a day; 220 workmen had a twelve-hour day except on Saturdays, 4203 employees had a workday of ten and one-half to eleven hours in length." Thus does protection protect the workingman!

"Tariff — protection — makes for monopoly," declares Alfred Henry Lewis in Pearson's magazine. But that is not all he says. "Monopoly" he declares, "is robbery arranged for by law. Anyone who would be a monopolist would be a pickpocket could be safe. The politicians in Washington have cheated and betrayed you. They owed you revision downward and paid you revision upward, promised you bread and gave you a stone."

"How can the government control the trusts when the trusts control the government?"—Senator Owen of Oklahoma.

The Democratic convention of Bertie county, N. C., indorsed Joseph W. Folk, of Missouri, for the Democratic nomination for President. His father, Henry B. Folk, of Tennessee, was a native of Bertie county, leaving there at the age of 21.
