RAILROAD STATISTICS.

We have received a report of the State Railway Commissioners for the year 1888. It is conveniently arranged, giving an explicit report of the railroads of the state of Kentucky. From it we collate the following items of interest: Total miles of road in operation in the State, 2,491.82—cost and equivalent value \$97,571.11.

Estimated value of rolling stock, \$1,000,000. These reports.

The spirit of progress now fully awakened, is pressing forward in the development of the resources of the country. The railroads of the state and as a necessary agency in this great work, railroads are being projected and built into the mining and cultural regions. Not only the cultural districts indifferent to the great benefit of securing additional transportation facilities for their products. Everywhere the spirit of progress is manifested, and the effort to extend railroad to the enterprises.

The reduced cost of building and equipping railroads now, as compared with ten years ago, enables us greatly to the encouragement of their construction.

"Another great inducement to capital to invest in Kentucky is the small earnings of the roads.

The total earnings of the roads

of the country at large and within the State, gross earnings

for the year 1887, the last

year reported amount to the sum

of \$14,100,000, an increase of

10.24 per cent. The net earnings for the same period were \$5,933,244, an increase of \$883,080, or 15.38 per cent over the year ending June 30, 1887.

The total assessment of railroads in the State, in 1887, was \$12,205,058, an increase of \$951,750, over the assessment for 1886, on this the Commissioners say:

The aggregate value of railroad property, as shown by the companies reported to the Auditor, for the present year, is \$23,950,112, while the estimates of the Commission up to the same date, amount to \$23,827,000, an increase of \$1,182,700, which makes a difference to the State of the revenue derived from the rental property of \$84,000.
