Bessemer Pigiron Will Be Produced Instead of Cast-iron.

The seventy-five ton blast furnace of Ashland Coal and Iron Railway Company has changed from the making of foundry iron, and will for the remainder of the summer produce Bessemer pigiron.

At the Norton Iron Works the company is also experimenting with a high silicon iron, such as is now made only in Europe.

If the results are satisfactory, additional impetus will be given to the already favorable conditions at all the local iron works.
