FLOODS SWEEP

Southern Kentucky Cities and State and Government Rushes Aid

The Mississippi river flood has battered down the levees at both Hickman and Columbus, Ky., causing property loss of over half million dollars.
More than 6,000 persons have been driven from their homes at Hickman and Columbus.
The Government and State are rushing tents for shelter. The food supply is getting short at all food points in Kentucky, and a call was sent out for aid.
The river is already 2 feet above flood stage and is still rising.
The Mississippi river at Columbus is forty miles wide. Thousands of farmers have been driven from their homes to higher ground.
All trains to river towns between Cairo and Memphis have been abandoned.

Real progress is not measured by the abstractions of the philosophers, but by the happiness and welfare of a people. A satisfied, happy people are usually a good people, and a good people, in turn, are usually a prosperous people.

Strip a people of their material prosperity, we do not mean luxury, and you find unhappy, disoriented people, you find progress stopped and the voice of reform stifled.

A Republican administration was in power in the nation for the ten years from 1899 until a Democratic house met in Washington in 1911 and began to disturb business conditions. Seven years of that period was under Theodore Roosevelt, the balance under William Howard Taft. In that decade the population of the country increased from 76,000,000 to 92,000,000; its wealth from \$88,000,000,000 to over \$130,000,000,000; the money in circulation from \$2,000,000,000 to \$3,100,000,000; bank clearings from \$84,000,000,000 to \$169,000,000,000; farm production from \$3,700,000,000 to \$8,900,000,000; postal receipts from one hundred and two million to two hundred and twenty-four million; annual immigration from four hundred forty-eight thousand five hundred and seventy-two to one million forty-one thousand five hundred and seventy; exports of manufactures from four hundred forty-eight million dollars to seven hundred and sixty-six million dollars; gold production from seventy-nine million dollars to ninety-six million dollars, and so on through a much longer list.

In the ten years the public debt, less cash in the treasury, decreased from one billion one hundred and seven million dollars to one billion forty-six million dollars, and per capita from fourteen dollars fifty-two cents to eleven dollars and thirty-five cents. The annual interest on the public debt decreased from thirty-three million dollars to twenty-one million dollars.

And this happened in spite of the extra expenditures for the Panama canal and the growing expenses of the Government.

Academicians may sneer at material progress and seek the millennium in abstractions, but to have real progress we must have material progress.

The history of the United States during the last decade is a history of real progress.—Commercial Tribune.

Dr. Magnus T. Hopper of New York City, who visited his brother, Mr. C. C. Hopper of Maysville, last week, gave him a sample of the "long ballot" recently voted in the New York State Primary. The sample is five feet long, but some of the ballots were fourteen feet long. That's taking a "long shot" as it were and is the limit on ballot box voting, as it takes a skyscraper in which to store the ballots after voting. All of which goes to show that we Americans are fast losing out in common sense and the simple road to the square deal. Dr. Hopper says Taft has everything his own way in the Empire State and will be renominated and reelected by an overwhelming vote.

An Eastern politician and business man of high standing said Sunday at Cincinnati, to The Commercial Tribune:

"This Roosevelt opposition has done more to strengthen President Taft than anything else. He is going to be nominated, Roosevelt, or no Roosevelt. I think the latter is a man who the country cannot trust and I believe the people of the United States think so. We have had too much of the strenuous life and the public is heartily sick of it.

The Lord only knows who the Democrats will nominate. He is the best judge of what their actions will be, for no human mind can figure it out. They may nominate Wilson who would be their strongest candidate; they may nominate Champ Clark, they may nominate Harmon and then again they may nominate Mr. Bryan. There is no telling what they will do at their Baltimore convention."

Speaking of school examinations, the Springfield (Mass.) Republican says:

All examinations of course, are unjust. They reward extravagantly one set of qualities like memory, orderliness, presence of mind, tact, and even a preference for the common place. They discriminate against equally valuable qualities like originality, eccentricity, inventiveness. They favor talent rather than genius; they mark for failure many whom Nature has marked for success.

And yet as a school process they are much depended upon, and succeed in wearing the patience out of devoted teachers. It is better in Germany, where a teacher's word is taken as to whether the boy is fit to go on to the next grade.

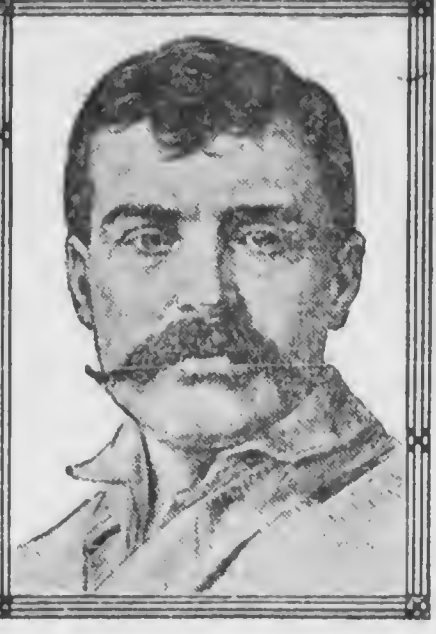

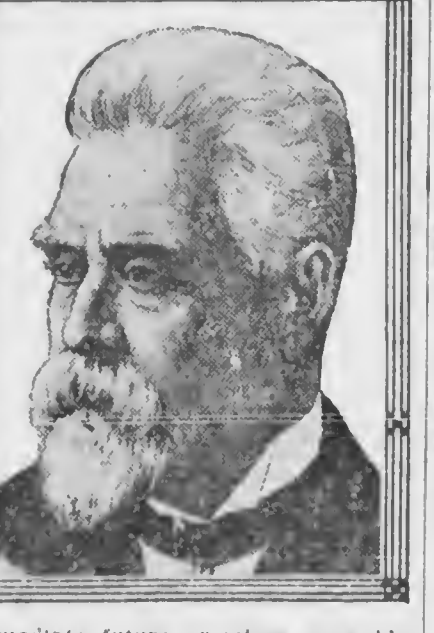
PEDDLER WHO LEADS AN ARMY



Should the rebellion inaugurated by Emiliano Zapata result in the overthrow of the Madero government, there would be added to Mexico's history a chapter that is unique in this country. Previous revolutions have received their impetus from men of high intelligence and usually of culture. Zapata's most advanced point in the social plane was that of an itinerant merchant, a peddler. Originally his name has been written on the records of his country, prior to the Madero revolution, as that of a private in the Mexican army. There is one more entry, that recording his desertion from the army. Those unacquainted with Zapata frequently make the mistake of styling him an illiterate. That is not true. He can read and write, and has the rudiments of a common school education. Added to that, he possesses a shrewdness which, combined with a stubbornness, a personal magnetism makes him a person truly formidable. Steadily his forces grew as they had during the days of Madero's revolt, until on February 1 of this year he found himself at the head of forces to such numbers as to cause the federal government to send against him a large part of the government troops.

PREDICTS ONLY THREE NATIONS

Hudson Maxim, the inventor, declares that in a very short time there will be only three countries in the world. "Some time ago, in talking with Lord Wolseley, he told me that in the future there would be only two countries in the world, and those would be China and the United States," says Mr. Maxim in an interview published recently. "Now I want to say something stronger than that. In a very short time there will be only three countries in the world, and they will be the United States of Asia (including Europe), the United States of Africa and the United States of America. "Look at the world's progress in the last 160 years. See what Japan has done in fifty years. Then imagine what is the future of the new Chinese republic, with its 400,000,000 people. In the opinion of former Senator Charles A. Towne of Minnesota, the immediate future promises some big wars. "Even our own country can't boast much of its peace proclivities," he said, "considering the way it has treated the United States of Columbia in the Panama matter. Germany and England are in exceedingly sensitive relations just now, and so are Japan and the United States. China, too, may soon fall into a state of absolute anarchy, and there are bound to be clashes if it comes to dividing China up among the powers."



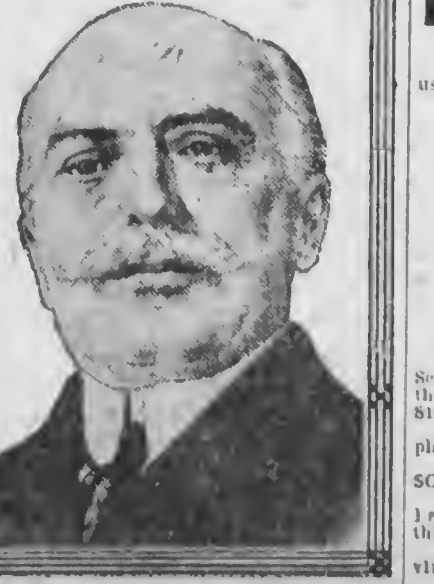
HEADS IMPORTANT CONVENTION



Rev. Herbert S. Higelow, president of the Ohio Constitutional convention now in session at Columbus, is an ordained Congregational minister. A native of Indiana, Mr. Higelow, who is forty-two years of age, has resided more than half his life in Ohio, the state of his adoption. He is a graduate of Western Reserve University at Cleveland (1894). Since 1896 he has been pastor of the Vine Street church of Cincinnati (now known as the People's Church and Town Meeting Society). For many years Mr. Higelow has been active in social reform movements. He was a loyal follower of the late Tom L. Johnson of Cleveland, and ten years ago was the unsuccessful candidate of the Democratic party for secretary of state. Mr. Higelow is an officer of the Ohio Direct Legislation league. He is a gifted platform speaker and has campaigned in the state repeatedly. That a man of Mr. Higelow's type—undoubtedly representative of a large and growing section of public opinion in his state—should be chosen to preside over such a body as the Constitutional convention, indicates that the legal profession, with its conservative traditions, no longer dominates Ohio as it formerly did. The lawyers are in a minority of the present convention. A more representative body of men could not readily be found than this convention, which began its session on January 9, 1912, to be continued probably far into the summer.—Review of Reviews.

RECORD HISTORY OF INDIANS

The American Indian is approaching, if indeed he has not already reached, the last stage of his native existence. Recent reports from Sitka, of the ravages of pulmonary diseases among the Indians of Alaska, where they are lending the lives led by their fathers, indicate that the Indian will disappear from the continent unless he adopts the white man's civilization, and adapts himself to it. In either case the records of his own civilization will be lost unless the government takes immediate steps toward aiding the Modern Historic Records' association, or some other body engaged in a similar work in preserving some records of the culture, arts, industries and domestic and social organizations, the customs, games and pastimes, work and play of the primitive settlers of America. Explorers, missionaries, settlers, Indian fighters, army officers and scientists are securing valuable volumes of information concerning the Red Men. The camera has been called into play. The series of photographs made by E. S. Currier, for J. Pierpont Morgan, stand first in the museums of America. Now photographic records are being made of the music and speech of the Indians, something never before attempted in an effort to preserve the records of a dying race. It is predicted by Alexander Knott, chairman of the executive committee of the Modern Historic Records' association, that these records may prove of invaluable worth in tracing the origin of the Indian long after he may have been annihilated or ceased to exist.

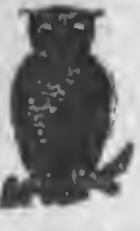

SOME LOGS

Over 500 Rafts Have Reached Catlettsburg During the Past Two Weeks
