On the 16th of August a debate took place on the decorations of the Central Hall of the Houses of Parliament:—

Mr. Schreibner called attention to its unfinished state. For twelve years the question as to the decoration of the Hall had been left in abeyance, and only one of the four panels had been filled in. He wished to ask the intention of the Government with regard to the decoration, for its present condition would not, he considered, be tolerated in any other assembly. The question was whether they were to continue this work. The House would not be surprised to hear that a proposal to vote £500 for another fresco had been negatived without a division. The cost of the panel which had been filled in was about £675, so that the three vacant panels would cost about £2,000.

Mr. Cavendish Bentinck was of opinion that the House should only vote money in the purchase of some well-known and well-established work of art recognised as such, or in encouraging British manufactures or works of art by British artists. The frescoes had been utter failures, with two exceptions—one was that by Mr. Watts, of King Alfred, and the other was the group by Gibson

in the Princes' Chamber in the House of Lords.

Mr. Shaw-Lefevre thought every one must share the opinion that the great Central Hall was one of the most beautiful parts of the House. It would not be wise, however, because mosaics had been placed in one of the panels, to hasten to complete the decoration and to fill in the empty panels without being first certain that the work would reach the standard of the highest art. The existing mosaic was inserted by Sir H. Layard in 1869, but did not give general satisfaction. Subsequently a committee of artists was called together, who recommended that the empty panels should be filled with frescoes. The House, however, refused to vote the money. He was inclined to think that, in the present unsatisfactory condition of mosaic art, it would be better to leave the panels unfilled than to complete them. Until the House should express a more unanimous desire than any which had hitherto been evinced that the work advocated by his hon. friend should be undertaken. he should not consider it his duty to ask for a vote of money for the purpose of filling the empty panels with frescoes. The motion of Mr. Schreibner was negatived.

On the 23rd of August Mr. Shaw-Lefevre stated, in answer to Sir Henry Tyler, that it was originally intended that four pictures should be painted for the decoration of the Peers' Robing Room in the Houses of Parliament, but when the second one was ordered it was expressly stipulated that there should be no future obligation to order more. The picture of Moses had hardly given satisfaction. The second picture had not been completed, and it would, therefore,

be premature to express any opinion regarding it.

The estimated extra receipts of the National Gallery are derived from the sale of Catalogues, realising about £300 per annum (paid into the Exchequer through the Stationery Office), and from Admission Fees paid by the public on Students' Days, the amount of which has been approximately estimated at £500 per annum.

The Director in his report for 1880, issued March, 1881, mentions that the following pictures were purchased during the year:—

1. "St. Sebastian," by Bernardino Cotignola, sixteenth century, £60. 2. "The Virgin and Child, with the Infant St. John and an Angel," by Leonardo da Vinci, 1452—1519, £9,000. It is thus described:—"The Virgin, kneeling in the centre of the picture, clad in a dark blue mantle, lined with gold-coloured silk, her hair falling round her neck, rests her right hand upon the Infant St. John, who kneels by her side, bearing an emblematical cross, and raises her left hand over the Infant Christ, who kneels in front, looking towards St. John, and raising His hand in the act of benediction. Behind the Infant Christ, and, supporting Him with the left hand, is a winged angel. Background of rocks, with sky and water. Figures nearly life size." This picture belonged to the Collection at Charlton Park, where it remained until 1880, when it was purchased from the Earl of Suffolk.

During 1879 eighteen pictures were purchased at an aggregate price of £5,701 12s. Eighteen pictures have been bequeathed and presented to the Gallery since the last report, afty-seven having been the number the previous year:—

"Portrait of a Man," attributed to Sir A. More (1512—1576). 16. "Portrait of Anna Maria Schurmann," by Jan Lievens (1607—1663?). 17. "A Hunting Scene," by Jan Weeninx (1644—1719). 18. "A Landscape," attributed to R. Wilson, R.A. (1714—1782).

A room in the basement floor was opened in February for the

permanent exhibition of water-colour drawings by De Wint and

Cattermole, bequeathed by the late Mr. J. Henderson.

The large Gallery, No. VI., containing most of the oil paintings executed and bequeathed by Turner, has been re-floored with oak. The inadequate lighting of this room, caused by the unfortunate mode in which its ceiling and skylight are constructed, presents a serious obstacle to the examination and study of some of Turner's masterpieces, and renders it highly advisable that the roof should be remodelled in such a manner as to admit a proper amount of light. This proposal is earnestly commended, not only in the interest of the public and students of Art, but in justice to the artist by whose generous bequest this fine collection was acquired.

In conformity with an order received from Her Majesty's Treasury, after previous correspondence with the Trustees and Director, the National Gallery was, in 1880, for the first time, kept open in October, the month usually reserved for annual cleaning and alterations. This has necessarily involved, from time to time, the closing of certain rooms in which repairs and re-hanging of pictures have been required. It has also entailed an addition to the staff of attendants, in order that each may take in turn his annual furlough.

In pursuance of further instructions from the Treasury, the general public were in December admitted to the National Gallery after twelve o'clock on students' days (Thursdays and Fridays), by payment of an entrance fee of sixpence. During the first five weeks in which this order was executed, the Gallery was visited on ten students' days by 1,946 persons, who paid £48 13s. for admission. The Gallery is now open at 11 A.M. on these days.

Considering that this attendance was in winter, when the Gallery closes at 4 P.M., it may fairly be assumed that the average attendance of visitors on students' days throughout the year will not be less than 200 per diem, in which case the annual receipts from this source may be estimated at £500 a year, a sum which will more than cover the salaries of the extra attendants necessary under the new arrangements.

The total number

The total number of pictures now contained in the public rooms of the Gallery is about 1,020, exclusive of water-colour drawings.

Eight pictures were cleaned, or repaired and varnished, and

eleven protected with glass during the year.

The number of visitors to the Gallery in 1880 has been 1,036,125 persons, showing a daily average attendance on each day (209 in

number) of 4,957, or 322 more than in 1879.

There were 365 new students entered in the books, and the total number of attendances on Thursdays and Fridays throughout the year 1880, 102 days, was 22,622. Independently of partial studies, 714 oil-colour copies of pictures have been made, viz., 390 from the works of 61 old masters, and 324 from the works of 35 modern painters. The daily average of attendances was 221; there being

165 painting in oil and 56 in water colours. The pictures most frequently copied were: "Spaniels," by Landseer, sixteen times; Greuze's "Head of a Girl," fifteen; Murillo's "Spanish Peasant Boy," fourteen; Velasquez' "Philip IX.," and Greuze's "Girl with Apple," thirteen; Romney's "Parson's Daughter," twelve; Reynolds's "Heads of Angels" and "Age of Innocence," eleven; and Reni's "Youthful Christ" ten times. These numbers are very similar to those of the previous year, when the "Spaniels" were copied sixteen, "Angels," ten, "Girl with Apple" and "Head of Girl," fifteen times each.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF STUDENTS.

Students are admitted to copy in the National Gallery on Thursdays and Fridays between 10 A.M. and 5 P.M. (or 4 P.M. in winter), subject to the following Rules:—

1. Each Applicant for admission is required to send a letter to the Keeper, together with a specimen of the Applicant's work in oil

or water-colour, signed or otherwise authenticated.

2. In cases where the Applicant has exhibited at the Royal Academy, or any other well-known exhibition of pictorial Art in London, a letter giving the title of the picture and the date of the exhibition will suffice.

3. In cases where the Applicant is a Student of the Royal Academy, or any other well-known School of Art in London, a letter of recommendation from a Royal Academician or from the Master of such School will suffice, and should be enclosed in the letter of application.

4. A card of admission once issued will be always available for the admission of the holder, unless it should be for any special

reason withdrawn by authority.

5. Students attending at the Gallery on Thursdays and Fridays are required to sign their names in a book kept for that purpose in the Entrance Hall.

6. In order to prevent inconvenient crowding, not more than two Students are permitted to copy from one picture at the same

time.

7. Students desiring to copy from a picture, the places before which are already occupied, should leave their names with the Curator in charge, who will assign them places in order of the date

of their application.

8. Any Student engaged in copying a picture, and being absent for an entire day without having given notice in writing to the Keeper before the end of the day, will forfeit his or her place, it another application be made for it meanwhile, and must in such case await the next vacancy. In such notice the title of the picture and number of the room should be distinctly stated.

9. Students wishing to have the glass removed from glazed

pictures, when finishing their copies, should apply (a week previously) to the Curator in charge, who will communicate such request to the Keeper, without whose sanction no glass is to be removed.

10. Any lady Student desiring to be accompanied by a relation or friend during her studies must give notice to that effect in a

letter to the Keeper.

11. Students will be required to keep their chairs, easels, canvases, sketch-books, and brushes outside the rail fixed for the protection of pictures, or where there is no rail, at such a reasonable distance as may preclude the chance of accidents. In no case is

the surface of the picture to be touched.

12. A scrupulous attention to order and cleanliness will be expected from Students. Palettes and brushes are not to be washed in the Lavatories; separate accommodation being provided for that purpose. Students requiring information on this and similar matters should apply to the Curators.

The following questions were asked in the House of Commons respecting the National Gallery:—

May 13th.—Mr. Coope asked whether the Government was prepared to carry out the further extension of the buildings of the National Gallery, for which plans were prepared some years since by Mr. Barry, so as to provide sufficient space not only for those paintings already in the possession of the nation, but also for such additions as might be made from time to time by gift or bequest.

Lord F. Cavendish said it was not intended to propose any

extension of the National Gallery.

Aug. 17th.—On the vote of £13,273 for the National Gallery, Mr. G. Howard stated, in reply to Mr. D. Grant, that the trustees would be quite ready to consider a proposal for throwing open the Gallery during certain evenings of the week for the benefit of the working classes. At the same time there were difficulties in the way, such as those of lighting and increased expenditure.

The Museum is now open every day. On Monday and Saturday all the galleries are thrown open; on Tuesday and Thursday all except the natural history collections, (then reserved for students); on Wednesday and Friday all except the antiquities on the upper floor and the rest of the department of Greek and Roman antiquities (set apart on those days

for fine-art students). The hours of admission are from 10 (Saturday 12) all the year round, in January, February, November, December, till 4; March, April, September, October, till 5; and May to August till 6. On Monday and Saturday from May 8 till the middle of July till 8, and onwards till the end of August till 7. Admission to the Reading Room, which is open during the winter months until 7 P.M. (for study and copying), to the Sculpture Galleries (to draw from statues and busts), to the Coin and Medal Room (for study), is granted, under certain regulations, on application to the Principal Librarian.

The departments of Geology, Mineralogy, and Botany have been removed to the new building in Cromwell Road, South Kensington, which still forms part of the British Museum, and is designated "British Museum (Natural History)."

REGULATIONS OF THE PRINT ROOM.

I. The use of the Print Room is restricted to the purposes of study, reference, or research. For those purposes the Print Room shall be kept open on every day of the week except Sunday, and except Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Christmas Day, and any Fast or Thanksgiving Day appointed by authority; except also from the 1st to the 7th of February, the 1st to the 7th of May, and the 1st to the 7th of October, inclusive.

2. The hours are from 10 A.M. in January, February, and March, till 4; in April, May, June, and July, till 5; and from the beginning

of August to the end of December, till 4 P.M.

3. No person under eighteen years of age shall be admissible, except under a special order from the Trustees.

4. No more persons shall be admitted into the Print Room at the

same time than the Keeper shall see fit.

5. No person shall trace from any drawing or print, nor make any mark whatsoever thereupon.

6. Upon no excuse whatever shall a visitor place his or her hand or finger on the surface of a print or drawing; or, if the specimen

be mounted, touch it at all.

7. No visitor shall be allowed to compare prints or drawings with those in the department, except with the permission of the Keeper, and in his presence, or that of an Assistant officiating for him; or, in the absence of the Keeper, except with the permission and in the presence of the Acting Assistant-Keeper.

8. Persons desiring to be admitted to the Print Room must apply in writing to the Principal Librarian, specifying their profession or

business, and their place of abode.

9. Every such application must be made two days, at least, before admission is required, and must be accompanied by a written recommendation from a householder or a person of known position, mentioning in full his, or her, name and address, and stating that he, or she, possesses a personal knowledge of the applicant, and ot his, or her, intention to make proper use of the Print Room.

10. If such application or recommendation be unsatisfactory, the Principal Librarian shall either refuse admission, or submit the

case to the Trustees for their decision.

11. Members of the Royal Academy may, without recommendation, obtain permission by applying to the Principal Librarian, as directed by Rule 8.

12. The Tickets of Admission shall be renewable at the discretion

of the Principal Librarian.

13. The Tickets of Admission must be produced if required, and

shall not be transferable.

14. All communications respecting the use of the Print Roommust be addressed to the Principal Librarian, British Museum.

The British Museum accounts, presented to the House of Commons, show that, during 1880, 655,688 persons were admitted to view the general collections, a considerable increase over the numbers admitted in previous years; for in 1874 there were 461,059; in 1875, 523,317; in 1876, 563,535; in 1877, 539,281; in 1878, 448,516; and in 1879, 606,394.

Mr. Edward A. Bond, the Librarian, reports many changes in the arrangements of the exhibits since the commencement of the removal of the Natural History Department to South

Kensington.

The following question was asked in the House of Commons:—

June 1st.—Mr. Magniac asked the right honourable member for Cambridge University whether it was the case that by reason of the Acts constituting the British Museum it was impossible to remove, even temporarily, objects of art therein deposited to any other National Museum; and, if so, whether this prevented the formation of exhibitions of classified objects which had conduced materially to the amusement and instruction of the nation; and, whether any remedy short of an Act of Parliament could be applied.

Mr. Walpole said the trustees were bound to keep all these objects within the Museum. An Act of Parliament would be

required.

The Art Library of the Museum contains upwards of 52,000 volumes, 17,000 drawings, 45,000 engravings, and 52,000 photographs relating to Art.

The Educational Library 1 is now situated in temporary buildings at the end of the Furniture Corridor of the Museum: it contains nearly 40,000 volumes, chiefly on educational subjects. It is open under the same regulations as the Art Library, and was attended by 23,497 readers in 1880.

Regulations for Copying .- Any person may, at any time when the Museum is open to the public, sketch or make notes of any objects in the Museum (see exceptions below), provided such copying do not necessitate his or her using an easel or extra seat, or otherwise obstructing the circulation of visitors. Any person wishing to copy by using an easel can do so on any students' day, under proper arrangements to prevent inconvenience to the public. The following are the exceptions referred to: (a) The paintings in water-colours, to copy which no permission is granted. (b) Objects on loan can only be copied on the production of the written permission of the owners, which will be retained by the department. (c) Pictures in the Sheepshanks Gallery, to copy which special permission must be obtained, in accordance with the following conditions: Forms of application for permission to copy are supplied by the attendant in the gallery, or will be sent in reply to a letter addressed to the Director, South Kensington Museum, London. No application to copy the works of any living artist can be entertained unless it be accompanied by the written permission of such artist. Such permission will only allow of works being copied by means of water-colours, or on porcelain, or by drawing or engraving, copying in oil not being permitted. Applicants must, if required, send

specimens of their competency. No copying can be permitted except on the days devoted to study; and not more than four persons can be admitted at the same time to work in any apartment. No work can be removed from the walls for the purpose of copying.

THE INDIA MUSEUM.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1880-81.

The following are extracts:-

New Buildings.—Sir Philip Cunliffe Owen, the Director of the Museum, states that fair progress has been made in these during the past year, but the limited sum annually assigned for the purpose does not permit of so speedy a completion of the work as the needs of the Museum render desirable. Some addition has been made to the offices of the staff of the Department.

Visitors.—The total number of visitors to the Museum in all its departments in 1880 was 981,963, an increase of 102,568 over the previous year, and of 97,461 over 1878. The amount of receipts repayable to the Exchequer was £2,222, being £177 more than in

1879, and £223 less than in 1878.

Lighting of the Museum.—Sir Frederick Leighton, P.R.A., having expressed his fears that the mural painting recently executed by him in the Lord President's Court might be injured by the gas, it was decided to try to light this court by the electric light; and a dynamo-electric machine and eight lamps on the "Brush" system were therefore purchased to light up the eastern half of the court. The light is on the whole satisfactory, though it is not so steady as could be wished, and a slight increase in quantity of light would perhaps be desirable. The gas fittings have been removed, as this apparently may now be done with safety as the electric lights have worked without any accident for so long. The saving by the use of the electric light in place of gas is about 42 per cent. per annum, or at the rate of £420 each year. It is proposed to try lamps in some of the Picture Galleries and in the Art Schools.

Lectures.—The lectures given in the Lecture Theatre of the South Kensington Museum by Dr. Zerffi on the History of Ornament, and by Mr. Bellamy on the Anatomy of the Human Form,

were attended by 3,495 and 1,207 persons respectively.

THE ART COLLECTIONS.

Mr. G. Wallis, the Keeper, reports as follows:-

The number of objects acquired by purchase, gift, or bequest during 1880 was 554, as against 333 in 1879. The most important purchases were the second and concluding portions of the Robinson Collection of Spanish Art objects, £3,000; a Japanese bronze group and vases, £250; a small collection of Spanish objects, £336; a carved ivory Moorish casket of the 10th century, £600; a collection of objects from Damascus, £608; the internal structure and fittings of a room from Damascus, £850; and a collection of objects for the Indian section, £200.

The most important presentations during the year were a fine collection of silk and velvet fabrics of the 18th and 19th centuries, by the Chamber of Commerce of Lyons, France; and four studies

of heads in oil, by Mons. Legros.

The various contributions on loan have been kept up to the usual standard, as on any withdrawal by the owners of collections the space is immediately filled up by other loans, the offers being always in excess of the space available for exhibition. The withdrawal of the Schliemann Collection at the end of the year will facilitate the renewal of the Special Loan Exhibitions which have proved so valuable in past years.

The former Director for Art, Mr. E. J. Poynter. R.A., reports:—

The paintings under my charge continue to be in a satisfactory condition, every care being taken to prevent any tendency to decay or accidental injury while open for study and inspection by the

public.

The historical collection of oil paintings has been enriched by the purchase of two important landscapes by William Hodges, R.A., and John Glover, hitherto unrepresented in the gallery. The purchases of water-colour drawings, with the exception of three representative works of Richard Doyle, have been confined almost entirely to examples for circulation.

Three valuable oil pictures, and a number of interesting watercolour drawings, by foreign artists, but representing scenes of English history or English life, have been presented to the Museum by Mr. F. R. Bryan; and Mons. A. Legros has added four more studies, portraits of distinguished men, to those he has already

given.

The additions during the past year have been: gifts—11 oil paintings and 17 water-colours; purchases—4 oil paintings and 15 water-colours; in all 47, as against 27 in 1879, and 97 in 1878.

THE ART LIBRARY.

Mr. R. H. Soden Smith, the Keeper, reports:-

The attendance in the Art Library has increased considerably during the past year, the numbers being 27,339, against 25,453 in 1879, and 23,821 in 1878. The number of subscribers has been 7,460, compared with 7,447 in 1879, and 7,979 in 1878; of students, 19,879, against 18,006 in the previous year, and 15,842 in 1878.

This increase is the more remarkable as there is no means of accommodating the readers in the evenings when the attendance is usually at its greatest; many are obliged to stand and make shift as well as they can while using the books they come to consult; that the attendance should increase under circumstances so unfavourable would alone prove that the Library supplies a felt and acknowledged want. It is therefore reasonable to expect that when fitting accommodation is at length provided, the use made of the valuable collections will amply justify the claim which it has been my duty to urge year after year for a building suitable to the extent of the Library and the needs of the readers.

The building which was commenced in May, 1878, has made slow progress, the grants of money not having been sufficient to carry out the original contract within the specified time.

The system of classification of books on the shelves has been much interfered with owing to the crowded condition of the library shelves, but it is still carried out as far as practicable.

The number of acquisitions have been:—Books, 3,656; original drawings, designs, and sketches, 2,872; engravings, 4,719; photographs, 2,304. Of the books, 725 were presented; of the drawings, 2,490; of the engravings, 173; and of the photographs, 22.

Dyce and Forster Reading Room.—During the past year the number of visits paid to this room amounted to 2,558, and the issues of books, &c., to visitors to 4,066. Compared with the year 1879, these figures show an increase of 13 visits, and a decrease of 210 issues. 29 drawings and prints were also issued from the Dyce collection. An illustrated handbook to the two collections has been published. A catalogue of the Forster collection is in preparation.

REPRODUCTIONS.

The art of reproduction by electrotype and other processes is being carried out with increased activity, due not only to the growing demand for examples for loan to provincial institutions which cannot be adequately met by original objects alone, but also to the great facilities afforded to the department by the owners of decorative plate at home and abroad. Sir Philip Cunliffe Owen reports the results of a visit paid by him to Russia in order to select examples for reproduction from the large collections opened to him by the Emperor and by various ecclesiastical bodies and private persons.

The courteous permission and assistance of the authorities of the Colleges of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, of Trinity College, Dublin, of the City of London Livery Companies, and of other owners of rare ornamental plate, have afforded a wide scope for selection, from which numerous specimens are being reproduced. It is hoped that a complete set of these reproductions, illustrating the work of English gold and silver smiths for the last 500 years, will shortly be ready for exhibition in the Museum.

Advantage was taken of an exhibition of ancient gold and silver plate held at Amsterdam during the summer months, and permission obtained, through the courtesy and liberality of the owners, to mould 35 examples, which are now in course of repro-

duction.

CIRCULATION OF ART OBJECTS.

This branch of the operations of the Science and Art Department becomes every year more important, and increasing efforts are made to meet the demands upon it. Some interesting details concerning

it will be found in *The Year's Art*, 1881, p. 25.

On the 17th June, 1880, the system of loans from the South Kensington Museum, hitherto confined to museums and other institutions connected with Schools of Art, was extended to Corporation Museums.

The Museum, as a general storehouse for objects which can be sent to schools of Science and Art and museums, has, under the term "circulation," three distinct classes of objects, which are dis-

tributed under the following heads:-

I. Examples, paintings, water-colour drawings, books, &c., from the Art Library, furnished on application to schools for stated periods for the purpose of study.

2. Original art objects, paintings, water-colour drawings, electrotype reproductions of objects from foreign museums and private

collections.

3. Circulation or distribution of works specially prepared from the original art objects reproduced by means of chromo-lithography, photography, etching, and electrotyping; these are sent on deposit loan, to be retained by the schools for a period of one or more years. The assistance thus given to Schools of Art, provincial museums, and local exhibitions has been as extensive as in most years, and through increased means the contributions have generally kept pace with the demands made for them. It has been found absolutely necessary to respond to urgent requests for a higher Art Standard in the objects selected. The increased and increasing taste of the people can now only be met by selections of examples of Industrial Art of a high class, and great satisfaction has been expressed in important localities by the contributions sent out during the past year. Mediocre works are worse than useless as lessons in Industrial Art. They may amuse the masses, but cannot

possibly instruct the manufacturer, the designer, the art workman,

or the student, or elevate the general taste of the people.

Applications for circulating collections for exhibition during any year must be made on or before the 31st March of each year, and the Committee of the Institution must be prepared to furnish the department with full information, when asked for, as to the nature of the building in which the exhibition is to be held, provision of the safety of the objects from fire, police arrangements, the admission of the public, especially artisans, the dates of opening and closing the exhibition, and on such other points as may be deemed necessary.

Schools of art are entitled to borrow from the South Kensington Museum and Library, objects of decorative art, drawings, oil paintings, prints, books, &c., for exhibition and for use as examples under

certain regulations.

The Department also issue such works, reproductions, &c., as may appear suitable to be retained as deposit loans for longer

periods.

Collections have been lent to 21 permanent museums and public exhibitions, and to 14 local institutions, as detailed in the following table:—

N.B.—The foregoing refer to the *Calendar* year ending 31st December, 1880, and not to the *Financial* year, which extends from 1st April to 31st March in the succeeding year.

The following discussion took place in the House of Commons on the 9th August, respecting the circulation of Art Objects:—

Mr. Jesse Collings moved as an amendment to the motion to go into committee of supply, "That in the opinion of this House grants in aid of Art and Industrial Museums should not be confined to London, Edinburgh, and Dublin." In provincial centres, such institutions, so necessary for maintaining our manufacturing supremacy, were much needed.

Mr. Slagg seconded and Mr. Ecroyd supported the amendment. Mr. Story Maskelyne did not underrate the smaller collections throughout the country, but wished to know where the hon. member would stop in his proposition. Would he give them a schedule of the towns to which his motion applied, stating the limits of the

sums required?

Mr. Caine supported the amendment. There were, he said, hundreds, if not thousands, of Turner's water-colour drawings and sketches hidden away in the garrets of the National Gallery, and if there was not room for them in the halls of the institution, he thought they could not do better than either give them or lend them to provincial museums for exhibition.

Mr. Geo. Howard suggested that casts of specimens should be

sent from South Kensington to museums in the country.

Mr. Wiggin and Mr. Magniac also spoke to the amendment.

Mr. Mundella fully recognised the importance of this subject. Great original objects could not, however, be given from the central museums to provincial museums. They were too rare and costly. But even located in London they were available for the advantage of the provinces. Indeed, South Kensington Museum, for which alone he was responsible, existed far more for the provinces than for London. In the training of teachers for the provinces, in the circulation of Art objects throughout the country, and in many other ways, South Kensington was doing most efficient work. No country of Europe was, in fact, doing as much for Art connected with industry as England was at present doing through the medium of South Kensington. There now appeared on the votes, for the first time, an item of £1,500 for the reproduction of Art objects, and these reproductions would be furnished to the provinces at half price. It had been resolved to set on foot a gallery of casts at South Kensington, and from this the provinces would be supplied by means of this vote. But the best way for the provinces to obtain museums was to help themselves. He believed they ought not to be fettered down to a libraries' and museums' rate of only 1d. in the pound. He hoped a good deal from individual liberality in the provincial towns. It was not by State help that the great museums were built up during the Middle Ages on the Continent.

Sir J. Lubbock pointed out that the trustees of the British Museum had no power to hand over any of their collections for circulation throughout the provinces. The trustees were strictly tied

down by Acts of Parliament.

After remarks from Mr. Illingworth, Mr. Anderson, Mr. Guest, and Mr. Woodall, the House divided. For the amendment, 48; against, 85; majority against, 37.

Open free every day excepting Friday, when it is closed for cleaning—summer, 10 to 6; winter, 10 to 4.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Report (July, 1881) mentions that since the last Report five works have been added to the collection by donation and eight by purchase. These include portraits of Lord Clyde, Thackeray, Dr. Johnson, Lord Bexley, Mrs. Siddons, Gay, Queen Anne, Samuel Lover; also a number of engraved portraits. Thirty-eight pictures have been protected by glass. A large number of autograph letters have been added to the collection commenced in 1879.

The Report states that :--

The number of visitors has been 76,109 during 1880. The catalogue has now been completed and published. Whilst operations of improvement were being carried on in one direction, a serious mischief was gaining ground in another. At the southwest corner, where the Trustees had on former occasions pointed out a danger of fire owing to the nearness of a brick flue to a wooden platform and a spiral staircase of wood in connection with it and the picture galleries above, their worst apprehensions were

very nearly fulfilled. Early on the morning of Friday, the 28th of January, when a considerable accession of heat had been required, a flue became red hot and set fire to inflammable materials accumulated round the base of it, in communication with a wooden platform that extended to the flooring of the lower western gallery and the foot of a spiral staircase before mentioned. Happily the watchman gave alarm, and by the prompt assistance of the Museum officials the fire was checked. But the possibility of such a calamity has been made the more manifest, and the Trustees feel it their duty to urge that the chimney shaft and furnace used to heat the water for warming the entire length of building, not only for the National Portrait Gallery, but for the numerous portions occupied by other collections, should be placed apart from the building itself.

This Institution is quite distinct from the South Kensington Museum. Like the National Gallery, it is directly under the Treasury, and may ultimately occupy an independent building. No pictures are received on loan. The collection is composed solely of gifts and purchases. Copying in oil is not permitted; but artists are encouraged to make notes and pencil sketches in portable books at all times, and for this no special permission is required.

The following portraits have been presented during 1881: Duke of Kent, Duke of Sussex, Peg Woffington, R. B. Sheridan, John Rennie.

In the House of Lords the following discussion took place, August 17:-

Lord Lamington called attention to the report of the trustees of

the National Portrait Gallery.

Lord Hardinge hoped that some assurance would be given that means would be taken without further delay for the improvement of the building.

The Earl of Morley agreed that it was desirable to place these portraits in some building where they would be safe from fire.

Lord Bury hoped the discreditable sheds on the western side of

Prince's Gate would be removed.

Earl Stanhope trusted some alteration would be made in the National Portrait Gallery.

Assistant Resident Keeper-B. WORSNOP.

This Museum, opened June 24, 1872, is a branch of the South Kensington Museum, and is under the same regulations. The officers in charge are under South Kensington, and are frequently changed.

Admission is free every day except Wednesday, when a charge of sixpence is made.

From the returns of visitors it would appear that this Museum is not nearly so popular as it was in the first years of its existence. The numbers show a regular decrease. It may be expected, however, that the recent transfer of modern examples of Art manufacture from South Kensington will serve to increase the attendance, as is explained in the report which follows.

The total number of visitors in 1880 was 424,409, in 1879 it was 444,021, in 1878, 449,381; in 1877, 670,214; and in 1876, 938,794. The returns of admission fees also display a remarkable decrease, but the pay days are not always strictly

adhered to. In 1880, the sum of £33 was taken; in 1879, £50; in 1878, £130; in 1877, £449; and in 1876, £624. The Assistant Resident Keeper in his Report mentions that:—

The paintings and drawings on loan in the Fine Art Division are highly popular with the artisan classes, and the increasing use of the Museum by these visitors shows the force of the reasons for establishing district museums urged from the first by the promoters.

The Ornamental Art Division of the Museum has been greatly increased since September, 1880, by the temporary transfer from South Kensington of all modern examples of Art manufacture in the Museum of the second half of the nineteenth century, covering the period of thirty years, from the Exhibition of 1851 to the present time. The immediate result has been a considerable increase of visitors, 97,983 for the last eleven weeks of 1880 against 83,419 for the corresponding period in 1879, an increase in favour of 1880 of 14,564 visitors. This, perhaps, more clearly than words can tell, shows that the working men will appreciate and utilise any opportunity of seeing examples of Ornamental Art bearing on their daily work, and of learning what the working men of other trades or nations have produced within the memory of most of them.

The appreciation of these modern Art manufactures is not only shown by the careful examination of the objects and by the often expressed approbation of the visitors, but also by the number of

sketches or memoranda made in note-books.

It is now demonstrated by incontrovertible facts, that if this great manufacturing country is to hold her own in the commerce of the world, we must give our artisans the same opportunities of improvement in matters of taste and applied science as are enjoyed by other nations. Let our artisans only start fair with equal advantages of education, and we fear no rivalry in the Arts either with France, Germany, or any other nation.

THE INDIA MUSEUM.

This Museum having formally been handed over to the Science and Art authorities at South Kensington, is now incorporated in the collection there, and will not in future be reported on separately, but will be found under the heading "South Kensington Museum."

Mr. Richard A. Thompson, the Assistant Director for Arrangement, reports as follows:—

The transfer, by the Secretary of State for India in Council, of certain portions of the collections forming the India Museum to the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education, to form an Indian section to the South Kensington Museum, was arranged towards the close of 1879, and the custody of the India Museum formally handed over to the officers of this Department.

Immediate steps were taken to prepare an inventory of the specimens, which was completed in January, 1880, and contained

descriptions of over 20,000 objects.

On the removal of the ancient sculptures and the specimens of natural history to the British Museum, and the botanical specimens to the Royal Gardens, Kew, the Indian collection from the South Kensington Museum was amalgamated with the new collection, and the whole re-arranged in the galleries of the Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851 known as the India Museum.

The collection was enriched by loans of many beautiful objects from Her Majesty and the Duke of Edinburgh, Lord Lytton and other gentlemen, and further by a large and interesting series of water-colour drawings made in India by Mr. W. Carpenter.

The building was officially handed over to the Science and Art Department on the 1st of January, and the collection re-classified and arranged by the 15th of May, when it was opened to the public

by Her Majesty in person.

Mr. C. Purdon Clarke, who is professionally attached to this section, has, at the request of their Lordships, and with the concurrence and co-operation of the Secretary of State for India, proceeded to that country in order to acquire additional illustrations of the Art manufactures of various parts of the empire. His Excellency the Viceroy has aided him in his mission in every possible manner, and the success he has already met with gives good reason to hope that the collection will be largely increased, and the modern manufactures of India made more widely known and appreciated in this country.

ART GALLERIES AND EXHIBITIONS IN LONDON.

THE ROYAL ACADEMY OF ARTS,

Burlington House, Piccadilly,

Was founded by George III. in 1768 under certain laws and regulations called the "Instrument of the Foundation." The governing body of the Council is composed of ten Academicians, who succeed by rotation from the forty, five retiring every year, the President, the Keeper, and the Treasurer being ex-officio members. Any addition to, or alteration in, the laws made by the Council must be sanctioned by the General Assembly of all the Academicians, and subsequently be approved by the Queen, the head of the Institution, before becoming law.

Academicians and Associates are elected by Academicians and Associates together. There is no fixed date for elections. For the Associateships any member may put down the name of any Artist he thinks deserving of the honour; from the list thus made up Associates are elected. Academicians must deposit within six months of their election a diploma work, to be approved by the Council. Their election must be ratified by the Queen, who signs the diplomas.

The regulations for exhibiting at the Royal Academy are as follows for 1882:—

(1) Time for sending in Works.—All works must be punctually sent in on one of the days announced for their reception. These days will be, for paintings and drawings, Monday and Tuesday, 27th and 28th of March; for sculpture, Wednesday, March 29.

All works sent from the country or from abroad must be consigned to an Agent in London for delivery at the Academy, unpacked, on one of the appointed days. No works in cases will be received; nor will the expenses of carriage be defrayed by the Academy. The attention of Foreign Artists and of English Artists residing in the country and abroad is especially called to this

regulation.

(2) Mode of describing. Works.—They must be addressed to the Secretary, and be accompanied with a note (written only on the first and third pages), describing them as they are meant to be inserted in the Catalogue. No advertisement, unnecessary quotation or narrative, can be admitted. At the back of each frame must be written the name and address of the Artist, with a title or description of the picture, and the number (if there be more than one) to which it refers in his List. This information must also be repeated, with great distinctness and accuracy, on a label attached by a string to the top of each frame, and made to hang over in front, as also to each piece of sculpture. It is necessary that these regulations, more especially the last, should be strictly complied with, in order to avoid delay and inconvenience, as well as inaccuracy in the Catalogue. The forms and labels can be procured from the leading frame-makers, or from the Academy on receipt of a stamped and directed envelope.

(3) Number of Works allowed.—No Artist is allowed to send or

exhibit more than eight different works.

(4) Size of Franes, Margins, &-c.—Each picture, or drawing, must be in a separate frame, except very small miniatures or sculptured gems, any number of which may be placed in a frame not exceeding six by five, or thirty square inches, and shall be considered as one Picture; or, if a series of designs from one story be at any time admitted in the same frame, they must be enumerated as distinct pieces.

All pictures and drawings must be in gilt frames. Oil paintings under glass and drawings with wide margins are inadmissible. Excessive breadth in frames as well as projecting mouldings may prevent pictures obtaining the situation they otherwise merit; and oval frames should be avoided, as they are difficult of arrangement.

The frames of miniatures whose greatest dimension is six inches must not exceed two inches in width and one inch in depth, and in no instance must exceed two inches and a half in width and one inch in depth. No miniatures will be admitted in outer cases, unless they are made to fit close to the gilt frames; and gold mountings, arched tops, and coloured borderings of every description are inadmissible.

(5) Works Inadmissible.—No works which have been already publicly exhibited in London; no copies of any kind (excepting paintings in enamel, and impressions from unpublished medals, in which case the name of the original designer must be specified); no mere transcripts of the objects of natural history; no vignette portraits, nor any drawings without backgrounds (excepting architectural designs); and no engravings or etchings already published can be received.

(6) Selection of Works.—All works sent for exhibition are submitted to the judgment of the Council, whose decision is final, and

is officially communicated by letter to every contributor.

(7) Sale of Works.—The prices of works to be disposed of may be communicated to the Secretary, and will be entered in the Price Catalogues placed on a table in one of the Galleries. All purchases will be registered, but the Academy can undertake no responsibility

with regard to the payment for the works purchased.

(8) Close of the Exhibition.—Delivery of Works.—Before the closing of the Exhibition every exhibitor will receive a separate printed order for the delivery of each one of his works. These must be properly filled in and signed by the Artist, and presented by the person sent to claim the work, who must sign a receipt for it in a book provided for the purpose. No work will be delivered up without the production of the order. The Academy will not undertake to pack or forward any Work.

All works must be removed within ten days from the closing of

the Exhibition.

(9) Privileges of Exhibitors.—Each Exhibitor is entitled to a ticket of admission to the Exhibition, as also to the ensuing Winter Lectures and Winter Exhibition of Old Masters. They may be obtained by personal application at the Royal Academy. When works are described as the *joint* performance of several Artists, the first mentioned in the description will alone be entitled to the above tickets.

*** Every possible care will be taken of works sent for exhibition; but the Royal Academy will not hold itself accountable in any case of injury or loss by carriers.

Two Exhibitions were held, one commencing December, 1880, and closing March, 1881, at which 316 drawings were hung; and the other commencing April, and closing August, 1881, at which 215 drawings were hung.

THE GROSVENOR GALLERY.

The Grosvenor Gallery, which is the property of Sir Coutts Lindsay, was established in the year 1877 "with the intention of giving special advantages of exhibition to artists of established reputation, some of whom had previously been imperfectly known to the public." Pictures are admitted by the invitation of the Directors, and the number of works exhibited is so far limited as to allow of a more select system of arrangement than has commonly been adopted in galleries appropriated to the display of contemporary work.

Two exhibitions are held in each year. The Summer Exhibition opens on the 1st of May, and is devoted to the work of living painters in oil and water-colour.

In the Winter Exhibition, which opens on the 2nd of

January, a Collection of Water-Colour Drawings is combined with some special feature varying from year to year. The first and second of these Winter Exhibitions consisted of a Collection of Water-Colour Drawings illustrating the growth and history of this branch of Art in England, and an important series of drawings and studies by ancient masters. In the third Winter Exhibition, Modern Water-Colours were combined with Decorative Designs, and in the Exhibition of 1882 the special feature will consist of a series of the representative works of G. F. Watts, R.A.

THE SOCIETY OF BRITISH ARTISTS,

Suffolk-street, Pall Mall East.

Secretary-THOMAS ROBERTS. -

This Society was founded in 1823 and incorporated in 1847, and is governed by a committee of six. The members are fifty-nine in number, and have a preference in hanging. At the Fifty-eighth Annual Exhibition, of 787 works hung, 161 were those of members.

There are two Exhibitions—one in the spring and one in the winter. The former opens in March and closes on the Bank Holiday in August, the latter opens in November and closes early in February. Messrs. Walter S. Stacey, figure painter, and S. J. Hodson, water-colour painter, were elected members during 1881.

The galleries were opened free on two Sundays, from 4 to 6.30.

The rules for exhibitors are the usual ones, but at the Spring Exhibitions drawings must be framed close or with gilt mounts, whilst at the Winter Exhibitions white mounts are admissible. Ten per cent. is charged on works sold.

Sending-in days, first Monday and Tuesday in March and November.

THE GENERAL EXHIBITION OF WATER-COLOUR DRAWINGS,

OR

THE DUDLEY GALLERY,

Egyptian Hall, Piccadilly.

Secretary-R. F. McNAIR.

This Exhibition was formed about sixteen years ago by certain Artists and Amateurs who considered that no sufficient opportunity was afforded for the exhibition of drawings by Artists who were not members of either of the older Watercolour Societies.

In the course of two or three years it was felt that the expenses of the Water-colour Exhibition might be better borne if others could be held, so that the Gallery might be filled throughout the year. Accordingly a Winter Exhibition of Cabinet Pictures was started, and some time later one of works in Black and White. These latter are under the control of different committees to that of the parent Exhibition.

The Exhibition is curiously enough more generally known as "The Dudley Gallery" than by its original name. That cognomen attached to it in consequence of the Old Masters belonging to Lord Ward having been exhibited there previously to its present tenure.

The success which has from the first attended this venture shows the need it supplies.

At the Exhibition, which opened in February and closed in May, 679 Drawings were hung.

At the Eighth Black and White Exhibition, which opened in June and closed in August, 636 works were hung.

The Fifteenth Winter Exhibition of Cabinet Pictures in Oil opened in November.

The rules for admission of works are the usual ones, save that at the Water-Colour Exhibition the frame must be gilt, and for drawings measuring thirty inches or more either way the frame and margin must not exceed five inches; between thirty and eighteen, four inches; and less than eighteen, three inches. Not more than five works by any person will be received.

At the Black and White Exhibition the examples admitted are:—Charcoal, crayon, Indian ink, pen and ink, pencil, and sepia drawings, etchings, drawings on the block, engravings by living engravers, proofs of original lithographs and woodcuts. The margins allowable are the same as for water-colours. There is no limit of number as to the drawings which may be sent.

At the Exhibition of Cabinet Pictures in Oil, if their canvas size is under eighteen inches, three may be sent; if over that size, only two.

The commission on sales at the Black and White Exhibition is 10 per cent.; at the others, $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

THE SOCIETY OF LADY ARTISTS,

48, Great Marlborough-street.

Honorary Secretary-Miss M. Atkinson.

This Society was reorganized in 1865. It consists, at present, of twenty professional members, nine Associates, and twelve honorary members. Its affairs are managed by the professional members, who are elected from the Associates. Associates are chosen by merit, professionals alone being eligible.

Pictures and drawings by non-members are hung at the Annual Exhibition, which opens in March, subject to the approval of the Hanging Committee. Should, however, exhibitors be non-professional, a fee of 10s. 6d. or 21s. is charged, according to the number of pictures hung. Commission on sales, 10 per cent.

SOCIETY OF PAINTER-ETCHERS.

Honorary Secretary-SIR WILLIAM R. DRAKE, F.S.A.

The Society, as indicated by its name, is an Association of *Original* Etchers. It was formed in 1880, the first Fellows being selected from the exhibitors at an Exhibition held in May, 1881, at the Hanover Gallery, Bond Street. The Exhibition consisted of about 500 etchings, contributed by 136 artists. The number of Fellows elected up to the present time is 73, including the members of the Council.

THE CITY OF LONDON SOCIETY OF ARTISTS.

Secretary-E. W. PARKES, 12, Mansion House Buildings, Queen Victoria-street.

Formed in 1880 for the purpose of holding Exhibitions of Paintings and Sculpture in the *City* of London. The second exhibition was held in the Hall belonging to the Company of Skinners, and was opened by the Lord Mayor. The Society hopes ultimately to have an exhibition-room of its own.

SIR JOHN SOANE'S MUSEUM,

13, Lincoln's Inn Fields.

In the year 1833 Sir John Soane obtained an Act of Parliament for settling his Museum, Library, and Works of Art in Lincoln's Inn Fields for the benefit of the public, and for establishing an endowment for their maintenance.

The property and funds of the Museum are vested in Life Trustees, who control all its financial business, and send to Parliament annually a detailed statement of the funds of the Museum, and of all receipts and payments of the preceding year.

The Trustees, carrying into effect the provisions of the trust to the fullest extent which the funds placed at their disposal by the founder will admit, have decided the hours of admission to the Museum to be on Tuesdays and Thursdays in February and March, and on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays in April, May, June, July, and August, from 11 to 5 o'clock.

Persons desirous of obtaining admission to the Museum can apply either to a Trustee, or by letter to the Curator, Mr. J. W. Wild, or personally at the Museum.

Access to the books, drawings, MSS., or permission to copy pictures or other works of Art, is to be obtained by special application to the Trustees or the Curator.

The principal objects of interest in the Museum are:-

Rare editions of architectural and other works, engravings and drawings—a curious folio of the original drawings by J. Thorpe of mansions erected by him in the times of Elizabeth and James I. A collection of more than forty folio volumes of coloured drawings by the architects, Robert and James Adam. A copy in six vols. folio of Pennant's London, copiously illustrated with rare prints and original water-colour drawings. Among the illuminated MSS. is a very choice example by Giulio Clovio. Sculpture, antique busts, bas-reliefs, vases, cinerary urns, figures in bronze, and the celebrated sarcophagus brought by Belzoni from Thebes. Pictures by Turner, Ruysdael, Watteau, Canaletti, Callcott, and specially twelve pictures by Hogarth.

THE DULWICH GALLERY.

Clerk to the Governors-J. WATCHURST.

The greater portion of the pictures here exhibited were collected before 1807, by the picture-dealer, Noel Joseph Desenfans, for Stanislaus, King of Poland. They were originally intended for a National Gallery at Warsaw; but the subsequent

misfortunes of the king, which ended in the dismemberment of the Polish kingdom, prevented the furtherance of the design, and, after his death in 1798, the pictures were left in possession of the collector.

Desenfans, at his death, which took place in July, 1807, left the whole of his pictures to Sir Peter Francis Bourgeois, who, acting on a suggestion made to him by John Philip Kemble, made a will in 1810, by which he directed that his pictures should become the property of the Master, Warden, and Fellows of Dulwich College. He further left two sums of £10,000 and £2,000 for the care of the pictures, and for the purpose of extending the west wing of the old College to provide for their reception.

With a view to the due preservation of the pictures, his chief executrix, Mrs. Desenfans, left £500, out of the interest of which an annual dinner was to be provided for the President and Council of the Royal Academy on the occasion of their official visit to the Gallery. She also left plate and linen for use on the same occasions.

The Gallery was commenced in 1812, Sir John Soane being the architect; it was finished in 1814; and in September of that year the pictures were removed to the new Gallery at Dulwich. In March, 1815, the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Desenfans and Sir P. F. Bourgeois were placed in the mausoleum attached to the Gallery, in accordance with their wishes.

Photographs of the leading pictures are now sold at the Gallery, price 1s. each.

The Collection is open to the public every day, except Sunday, from 10 till 4 in winter, and 10 till 5 in summer.

Students are allowed, under certain restrictions, to copy the pictures. Application must be made to the Governors of Dulwich College.

THE ROYAL ARCHITECTURAL MUSEUM,

18, Tufton-street, Dean's-yard, Westminster.

Honorary Secretaries { John P. Seddon. MAURICE B. ADAMS. Curator—RANDALL DRUCE.

This Museum was founded in 1851 in Canon Row, Westminster, and was afterwards at the South Kensington Museum for several years. In 1866 the present building was erected and the collection removed. It is supported by voluntary contributions from architects and others. Open free daily from 10 till 4, Saturdays till 6; and also on the evenings of Monday, Wednesday, and Friday (6 till 9). The object of the Museum is to give architects, carvers, and Art workmen generally the means of studying Architectural Ornament. There are 4,500 casts and original carvings ranging from Grecian work to that of the present day. The privilege of sketching belongs to subscribers, those introduced by subscribers, and the members of the sketching-club who pay 5s. vearly.

The drawings of the sketching-club sent in in competition for the annual 5 guinea prize, and the photographs illustrating the annual excursion of the Archæological Association, are exhibited during October.

A School of Art in connection with the Science and Art Department is attached to the Museum.

THE FLAXMAN GALLERY,

University College, Gower-street.

The hall under the dome of the College, the adjacent apartments, and the staircase are adorned with works by the late John Flaxman, the first Professor of Sculpture in the Royal Academy. These consist principally of the casts in plaster, from the original clay models of groups of figures, statues and compositions in alto- and basso-relievo.

A large number of drawings by Flaxman, selected by the late Mr. J. A. Foley, R.A., from the contents of the sculptor's cabinet, was added to the Gallery in 1862.

The public are admitted to the Gallery on Saturdays during the months of May, June, July, and August, from 10 till 4. But persons properly introduced to the Secretary may obtain admission at any time throughout the year between 10 A.M. and 4 P.M.

THE DIPLOMA AND GIBSON GALLERY, ROYAL ACADEMY OF ARTS,

Burlington House.

Open free daily from 11 A.M. to 4 P.M. It contains diploma works of Academicians, pictures that have been bequeathed, and the Gibson bequest of statues and models.

The diploma works date from the commencement of the Academy, and comprise fine specimens by the majority of the Academicians, living and deceased.

One of the rooms contains the original Cartoon for the picture by Maclise of the Meeting of Wellington and Blucher, a good copy of the Last Supper by Lionardo da Vinci, an altorelievo by Michael Angelo, and a painting by Giorgione.

Students are only permitted to copy on obtaining a special order from the Council of the Academy.

THE CRYSTAL PALACE PICTURE GALLERY.

Manager-S. FLOOD PAGE.

This Exhibition is again open, under the same conditions as formerly, and is a market for artists, English and foreign, as well as an addition to the attractions of the Palace. It differs from other exhibitions in that it is open throughout the year; pictures can be received at any time, and when sold may be removed at once. If, however, any picture has been

six months in the Gallery, the directors may request that it be removed. Pictures must be delivered, carriage paid, to the Palace, addressed to the Manager. Commission on works sold, 10 per cent.

THE ROYAL SOCIETY OF ARTISTS,

Birmingham.

Honorary Secretary-A. E. EVERITT.

This Society consists of a self-elected body of Artists, sixteen in number, who must be resident in Birmingham. Their President is elected annually, and for 1881 was J. E. Millais, R.A. The last elections were Mr. E. R. Taylor, and, as an honorary member, Mrs. J. G. Whitfield. The profits of the Society must be utilised for the advancement of Art in Birmingham. The Society at present maintains Professors of Literature, Sculpture, Anatomy, and Architecture, as well as Life Schools.

Two annual exhibitions are held. A Spring Exhibition.—The Sixteenth Exhibition opened in March and closed in June, and contained 566 drawings, 273 cabinet pictures in oil, and 77 black and white studies. An Autumn Exhibition of Pictures.—At that which opened in August 910 paintings were exhibited.

The Spring Exhibition of 1882 will include Water-Colours, Cabinet Pictures in Oil, and Black and White, and will open in March and close in June. The Autumn Exhibition of Works in Oil will open at the end of August.

BRADFORD PUBLIC ART MUSEUM,

Free Library Buildings.

Secretary-Charles G. Virgo.

Inaugurated in May, 1879, with a special Exhibition of Paintings and other Works of Art. The Museum is open free, daily, from 10 o'clock A.M. until dusk. Numerous valuable paintings and objects of Art from private sources have, from time to time, been lent for various periods; artists have also sent works for sale. The Art Museum committee contemplate holding exhibitions to consist solely of works by living artists, as as also other special exhibitions. The regulations for exhibitors, as regards sales, are the usual ones—5 per cent. commission. 211,498 visitors were admitted during 1881.

BRIGHTON FINE ART EXHIBITIONS.

Curator and Acting Secretary-Benjamin Loman, C.E.

Two Exhibitions are held yearly in the Royal Pavilion, under the management of the Corporation, with the advice of a local sub-committee; in April for Modern Water-Colour Drawings, the sending-in day being early in March; and in September for Modern Pictures in Oil, the sending-in day being early in August.

Five hundred and ninety-five drawings were exhibited in the Exhibition which opened on the 14th of April, 1881; 536 pictures in that which opened on the 22nd of September.

THE BRISTOL ACADEMY FOR THE PROMOTION OF FINE ARTS.

Honorary Secretary—R. F. MILES. Assistant Secretary—J. WOODBERRY.

The objects of this Society are the advancement of the art of painting in oil, in fresco, and in water-colours; of drawing in chalk; and of the study of sculpture and architecture.

The government is vested in 8 trustees, 6 members, and 5 artist members. The members consist at present of 23 professional members, 12 associates, and 27 students. Elections are held in January and June, and each candidate must receive the votes of two-thirds of the members present.

Two exhibitions have been held during the year 1881. At the Thirty-fourth Annual Exhibition of Works of Modern Artists, which opened in March and closed in June, 775 pictures, &c., were hung. Of these nearly 200 were sold.

During October, November, and December, the pictures, the property of the Academy, were on view free to the public.

At the Spring Exhibition, after the works of the members and of invited artists have been hung, there is usually but little room for other works. Commission charged, 5 per cent.

An Art Union is attached to the Spring Exhibition. See p. 144.

BURY SOCIETY OF FINE ARTS.

Honorary Secretary-John Shuttleworth.

A local Society of Professional and Amateur Artists, formed in 1876, for the encouragement and practice of the Fine Arts in Bury and the neighbourhood. Holds an Annual Exhibition of the Works of its members in the spring.

THE FITZWILLIAM MUSEUM,

Cambridge University.

Director-PROF. SIDNEY COLVIN.

Richard, Viscount Fitzwilliam, who died February 5th, 1816, bequeathed to the University his collection of paintings, engravings, books, and illuminated MSS., together with dividends for the erection of a Museum. This building was commenced in 1837, but is not yet finished, the work having been stopped in 1847 for want of funds. Since then the entrance hall has been decorated at a cost of £20,000. The chief attractions are pictures by Rembrandt, Titian, Veronese, and other old masters. Twenty-five drawings by Turner, presented by Mr. Ruskin, are also on exhibition.

Open free to the public daily, except Fridays, from 10 to 4 in the winter and 6 in the summer.

CANTERBURY MUSEUM.

Honorary Secretary-W. WELBY.

The principal attraction is the Sidney Cooper Gallery, built and furnished by Mr. Sidney Cooper in 1871. It contains a number of pictures and drawings. An Exhibition of Local Art was held in the autumn of 1881, and, having proved successful, will be repeated in 1882.

DEVON AND EXETER ALBERT MEMORIAL MUSEUM,

Queen-street, Exeter.

Curator-W. S. M. D'URBAN.

This Institution contains a Free Library and Art School, in addition to the Museum. It has not yet a Picture Gallery, but possesses a few pictures, amongst which is the "Burial of the two Sons of Edward IV. in the Tower, 1483," painted by John Cross, of Tiverton, a deaf and dumb artist who died in 1861.

In August and September, 1881, an Exhibition of Amateur Works of Art by residents in Devon was held, and over £80 was distributed in prizes. A similar Exhibition will be held at the same time in 1882.

The Museum is open on week days from 10 A.M. to 8 P.M. in summer, and till dusk in winter; the Reading Rooms from 10 A.M. to 10 P.M. Thursday the building is not opened until 6 P.M.

NORTH STAFFORDSHIRE MUSEUM,

At the Potteries Mechanics' Institution, Hanley, Staffordshire.

Secretary and Curator-E. BRUNT.

Comprises a collection of Pottery and of Works of Art, lent by South Kensington Museum. Open from 9 A.M. to 10 P.M. every week day, students of the School of Art and members of the Mechanics' Institution being admitted free, while a small charge, which also gives access to a reading-room, is made to other persons.

The number of visitors during 1880 exceeded 37,000: up to the end of September, 1881, the number was upwards of 27,000.

THE IPSWICH FINE ART CLUB.

Established 1874.

Honorary Secretary-E. PACKARD, JUN.

Objects.—To encourage Art and to excite interest in its study. The club now consists of 70 members.

At the Seventh Exhibition, which opened in March, sales amounting to £750 were effected. The profits are devoted to the Building Fund of the Gallery. In the hope that encouragement may thereby be given to local Art, the exhibits at the Annual Exhibition are confined to the works of artists connected with the county of Suffolk by birth or education. A second Exhibition was opened in the summer, of Designs for House Decoration and Examples of Decorative Work by Artisans, which was well attended, and it is believed resulted in much good, being a means of showing artisans that better individual work is now looked for than was formerly the case.

The receiving day for the next Exhibition will be Monday, January 9th, 1882.

YORKSHIRE FINE ART SOCIETY,

Leeds.

Assistant Secretary-James Dallas.

This Society was established at Leeds during 1880. Its first Exhibition was opened in May with a mixed collection of works for sale and of works lent by collectors, chiefly in the West Riding of Yorkshire. It is supported partly by annual

subscriptions of members, numbering at present about 430, and partly by admission fees of the public. The committee contemplate holding three exhibitions annually; that in the summer (opening early in June) to consist of works sent for sale by artists; that in the autumn to be a Loan Exhibition, to vary in character in the discretion of the committee, and that in the winter to have some relation to Art Manufactures. In 1881 the Autumn Exhibition opened on the 28th of October with a collection of pictures by Old Masters, engravings, etchings, and enamels.

Liverpool.

Honorary Secretary—J. RAYNER, Town Clerk. Curator—CHARLES DYALL.

The Walker Art Gallery is a department of the Corporation, and is supported, with the Library and Museum, by a special rate of 1d. in the £, which produces about £12,000 a year.

The Art Gallery was erected in 1877 by the munificence of Sir A. B. Walker, as to which see *The Year's Art*, 1880, p. 55.

The nucleus of a fine collection of works of Art has already been gathered together, and numbers 283. It is open to the public every day except Friday, which is a student's day. The following pictures, &c., were acquired in 1880-81.

Royal Institution, Colquitt-street.

Honorary Secretary—John Pedder. Acting Secretary—E. Landseer Grundy.

This Society was formed in 1872, and has held ten Exhibitions. It consists of honorary members, members, and associates. The government of the Society is vested in the Council, which now numbers twenty-five. The Exhibition is exclusively confined to members, and opens each year on the second Monday in May. The elections, which are by ballot, take place a fortnight previously. A written application and three framed drawings are required to be submitted by candidates. Entrance fee, three guineas.

THE ROYAL MANCHESTER INSTITUTION.

Honorary Secretary-E. Solomons, F.R.I.B.A. Assistant Secretary-E. W. Marshall.

The object of the Institution is the advancement of Literature, Science, and the Arts. It is governed by a Council of twenty-four.

A proposal was recently made to transfer the Institution, including the entire landed property, pictures, statuary, &c., and building in Mosley Street, to the Corporation of the city of Manchester as a permanent Art Gallery for the city; and this proposition is now being carried into effect, but it will take some little time to accomplish. The reasons for this step are stated in a circular which was issued by the Council, and which is given at length in *The Year's Art*, 1881, p. 54.

The Annual Exhibition is held in August and following months, and continues open until the end of December; 1497 works were hung or placed in the last (Sixty-first) Annual Exhibition in 1881. The *Heywood Gold Medal*, to the artist of the most meritorious work of Art, was awarded to Carl Gusson for "The Architect."

The regulations for exhibition are the usual ones. Commissions on sales, 5 per cent. London agent, W. A. Smith, 22, Mortimer-street.

THE MANCHESTER ACADEMY OF FINE ARTS.

President-ROBERT CROZIER.

Honorary Secretary-H. H. HADFIELD.

Was instituted in 1859, and consists of an unlimited number of members, associates, and lady exhibitors. It is governed by a Council, elected annually by the members. The present constitution of the Academy consists of 12 honorary and 47 ordinary members, 27 associates, and 14 lady exhibitors.

Its last Spring Exhibition, confined entirely to the works of its several members, associates, lady exhibitors, and students, contained over 500 examples of Art. The next Exhibition will be held in February.

NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE ARTS ASSOCIATION.

Secretary-T. R. Spence.

Formed in the autumn of 1878. Its objects are to promote a taste for Art generally, the development of local Art, the foundation of a school of artists, and the establishment of a permanent Art Gallery for the town, wherein works of Art

can be placed which may be presented or bequeathed. The annual subscription is one guinea. The exhibitions have been of a high and gradually increasing character, and, notwith-standing the unexampled commercial depression, the sales have been of a highly satisfactory character.

Hitherto two Exhibitions have been held in each year: that in the spring being a loan collection of pictures, bric-à-brac, &c., lent by the possessors in Northumberland and the neighbouring counties; the Autumn Exhibition being confined to works contributed by artists for sale. The Exhibition which opened on the 26th of August and closed October 29th contained nearly 800 works in oil, water-colour, etchings, &c.; the sales realising a sum of £3,000.

ASHMOLEAN MUSEUM, OXFORD.

Keeper-John Henry Parker, C.B. Assistant Keeper-Edward Evans.

Open free every day of the week from 11 A.M. to 4 P.M.

The building known by this name was erected at the charge of the University, partly for the reception of the collection of curiosities which Elias Ashmole, Esq., gave on that condition. It was begun in 1679 and finished in 1683. Ashmole's collection consisted chiefly of the curiosities collected by the two Tradescants, father and son, which were long a popular exhibition in London under the name of "Tradescant's Ark," in the seventeenth century. It was a medley of curiosities of all kinds, including a large proportion of stuffed birds and beasts; but all these, together with more recently acquired specimens, were separated and removed to the New University

Museum in the Park, on the north side of Oxford, about 1860. The Ashmole collection now consists entirely of the works of human hands; the New Museum, of created works only. It may be considered as a collection of objects of ancient Art, beginning with Egyptian, of which there are good examples, including one of the earliest monuments that is known; part of the Arundel marbles, which are chiefly Greek and Roman inscriptions; also a series of Roman brick stamps, the only one in England; some fine examples of mediæval art, especially the celebrated Alfred's jewel, an excellent specimen of Anglo-Saxon jewellery, and a very beautiful picture in translucent enamel.

MIDLAND COUNTIES ART MUSEUM,

Nottingham Castle.

Assistant Director and Curator-G. H. WALLIS.

The Museum is under the control of the Corporation of Nottingham, and was inaugurated in 1872 in the Exchange Rooms, where it was located for six years. Through the energy of the late Mr. Ward, the Mayor, the Town Council decided to adapt Nottingham Castle for a permanent Museum of Art. The cost of this undertaking was £30,000, £12,000 of which was obtained by private subscription, the remainder being provided by the Corporation. The work of restoration, which extended over three years, was completed in 1878, when a loan collection of pictures and objects illustrating Industrial Art was brought together. The Museum was opened on the 3rd July, 1878, by the Prince and Princess of Wales.

The galleries are six in number, and are devoted to works in oil and water-colours, over 1,000 in number, and to sculpture. On the ground floor are seven rooms, in which are exhibited various collections of Art objects. The Museum is open from 10 A.M. to 9 P.M. every day, and 751,280 persons have visited it during the last three years. The price of admission is one penny four days in the week, and sixpence the other two.

There is also an Annual Exhibition of works by artists living in Nottingham and the immediate neighbourhood, and an Autumn Exhibition of modern pictures, opening early in September.

ART MUSEUM, RUGBY.

Curator-THOMAS M. LINDSAY.

Contains a permanent collection of artistic work. During each term there are special loan exhibitions. In the Spring term of the present year the Exhibition consisted of a collection of water-colour drawings, studies, and sketches, by the late John Burges; during the Summer term a collection of water-colour drawings illustrating the progress of the Art; in addition to which there was an Exhibition of enamels. During the Winter term there was displayed a collection of drawings by the Old Masters, which has been presented to the Museum by H. Bloxam, F.S.A.

THE LANGWORTHY GALLERY OF ART,

Peel Park, Salford.

Curator-John Plant.

The Langworthy Gallery is the latest addition to the Royal Museum and Free Libraries, Peel Park, established in 1849. This Gallery was built by the liberality of the late E. R. Langworthy, who gave £10,000 for the purpose. In 1878 it was inaugurated with an Exhibition of paintings by the members of the Manchester Academy, augmented by a number of paintings, on loan, by living artists. In the summers of 1879, 1880, 1881, special Exhibitions of paintings and Art objects, on loan, have been held. Similar Exhibitions will be held in future years. A limited number of paintings are allowed to be exhibited for sale without charge to the artist. The Gallery possesses a collection of portraits, and some modern paintings and sculp-

tures. Amongst the noticeable paintings are E. M. Ward's "Last Sleep of Argyle," and "Execution of Montrose;" K. Halswelle's "Il Madonnjo;" G. F. Watts' "Jacob and Esau," and J. R. Herbert's "Liberty of Conscience."

Students are allowed to copy from the sculptures, paintings, and drawings, the property of the Committee. The Gallery and Museum are open free to the public on five days in the week, the average yearly attendance of visitors being nearly 600,000.

SALISBURY AND SOUTH WILTS AND BLACKMORE MUSEUMS.

Secretary-F. W. ZILLWOOD, Devizes-road, Salisbury.

These Museums (established 1860) contain a collection of artistic work, both ancient and modern, and are open to the public daily. The expenses are defrayed by private subscription.

THE SHEFFIELD SOCIETY OF ARTISTS.

Secretary-J. Horace Mudford.

Founded in 1874, to encourage Art in Sheffield, and to promote the development of local talent. Consists of 22 members, paying one guinea yearly, who must be artists by profession, and of 26 associates, paying half a guinea, consisting of artists and amateurs, whose works entitle them to be elected. The Exhibition is held annually at the Sheffield School of Art in July and August; at the last one 360 oil paintings, drawings, and sculptures were exhibited.

SHEFFIELD PUBLIC MUSEUM,

Weston Park.

Curator-E. HOWARTH.

Comprises pictures, Art metal-work, cutlery, pottery, and many objects of ethnology, natural history, and archæology. It

is open free, from ten to nine, on Monday, Tuesday, and Saturday; and from ten until dusk on Wednesday and Thursday. On Friday the Museum is closed, but is open to students by permission of the Curator.

ST. GEORGE'S MUSEUM

(MR. RUSKIN'S),

Upper Walkley, Sheffield.

Curator-Henry Swan.

In course of formation only, so all arrangements must be regarded as provisional. At present there is much material which it is impossible either to use or show for want of space.

Open free every day of the week except Thursday, from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M., on entering name and address in visitors' book. Students' tickets are also given free, on personal application to the Curator; these tickets are available from 9 A.M. to 9 P.M., and enable students to draw from the objects, use the books, and study the minerals, coins, &c.

THE ATKINSON ART GALLERY,

Southport.

Honorary Secretaries-Messes. Hobson and Booth.

This Gallery, presented to the town of Southport through the munificence of Mr. William Atkinson, opened its Third Exhibition on the 14th of March, 1881. Works to the number of 932 were exhibited. The Exhibitions, which are in connection with a Free Library, are managed by a Committee elected annually from the Town Council; the profits being retained for the purchase of works from the Exhibitions in order to form a permanent Gallery of Art.

Works intended for the next Exhibition are received in London at Jennings', 16, Duke-street, Manchester-square, and in Southport at the Art Gallery (receiving days) from February 11th to 25th. The carriage of the pictures of invited artists is paid. The regulations for exhibition are the usual ones. Commission on sales, $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

THE YORKSHIRE FINE ART EXHIBITION,

Vork.

A Council for the management of the permanent Art Institution hold annual exhibitions of painting, &c., by modern artists. The second of these exhibitions was opened on the 2nd of May, 1881, and closed in September. Five per cent. is charged on sales. Besides these annual exhibition of pictures, there are special exhibitions, relating to science and industry, held at intervals. In September, 1881, the Prince of Wales' Indian collection was shown, and also a number of pictures by Old Masters.

Open to the public Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Saturday, free. Thursday and Friday are set apart for artists and others copying the pictures, but the public are admitted on paying sixpence each. Hours—Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Saturday, 10 to 4, from 1st October to 31st January (November excepted), and from 10 to 5 from 1st February to 30th September; Saturday evening, 7 to 9 free. Thursday and Friday, 10 to 4 all the year round (November excepted, when the Gallery is entirely closed for cleaning and arrangement).

The Scottish National Collection was formed by the Royal Institution for the Encouragement of the Fine Arts, a body founded in 1819 (see p. 74). The building within which it is placed was erected in 1850-58 by the Board of Trustees for Manufactures in Scotland out of funds at their disposal, aided by a grant from Parliament. The Board, which owes its origin to the Treaty of Union, has, by Act of Parliament, been vested in perpetuity with the trust of the building, which is especially destined for receiving and exhibiting a National Collection of Works of Art—for the Exhibition of the Royal

Scottish Academy—and for the extension of the Board's School of Art.

The Collection now exhibited consists of—(1) Pictures acquired for the National Gallery either by gift or bequest. (2) The pictures collected by the Directors of the Royal Institution. (3) The Collection of Ancient and Modern Works commenced in 1829 by the Royal Scottish Academy. (4) The pictures, bronzes, &c., bequeathed by Sir James Erskine of Torrie to the College of Edinburgh. (5) Modern Works purchased by the Royal Association for the Promotion of the Fine Arts (see p. 144). (6) Pictures deposited on loan.

The extension of this Collection depends on the public spirit and liberality of individuals, there being no fixed revenue or public funds available for the purchase of pictures.

The Collection consists of between five and six hundred paintings, busts and other pieces of sculpture. The principal are:—Gainsborough's celebrated full length of the Hon. Mrs. Graham, five works by Etty, Michael Angelo's original models in wax for the statues of the Medici tombs in Florence, and a Madonna; some fine examples of Vandyke, Titian, Greuze, and Watteau, and a choice collection of works by present and former Scottish artists.

The Royal Charter, given on the 13th of August, 1838, for the incorporation of this Academy, states that in 1826 several of the petitioners for the Charter had formed an Academy on the plan of the Royal Academy of London, and had modified it to suit local and other circumstances, for promoting the advancement of the Fine Arts in Scotland, and for affording facilities in the prosecution of the studies of Painting, Sculpture, and Architecture, and other branches connected therewith.

The President, Secretary, and Treasurer are elected annually, but it has been customary to re-elect those officers during their life-time, so that they are usually considered as elected for life.

The declaration of the new Council and the election of Office-Bearers takes place on the second Wednesday in November. The Annual General Meeting is also generally held on the same day. At the last meeting George Hay was elected Secretary in the stead of the late W. Brodie.

All vacancies of Academicians happening on or before the roth of November are filled up on the roth of February following. Academicians can only be chosen from among the Associates. Every Academician "elect" must deposit a specimen of his abilities before the 1st of October next ensuing his election. Academicians and Associates require to be men of high reputation, settled or resident in Scotland at the time of their election.

All vacancies for Associates occurring before the 1st of August must be filled up on the second Wednesday in November. Associates must be twenty-one years of age, and not apprentices, and require to be elected from among Exhibitors in the Annual Exhibition. Candidates must sign their names on a paper left for that purpose in the Academy's rooms during the month of March each year. Mr. David Murray was elected in November, 1881.

There is a Pension Fund in connection with the Academy.

Instructions to Exhibitors.—The receiving day for pictures is February 1st, for 1882. Works in Sculpture a few days later. No member can exhibit more than seven works: non-

later. No member can exhibit more than seven works; nonmembers are limited to five. No engravings nor prints of any kind are allowed to be exhibited except those by members who are Engravers. Excessive breadth of frame or mount may subject works to rejection. Purchasers of works pay artists direct.

This Museum was founded in 1855, and the building in which it is now contained was partially opened in 1866. It is still unfinished, but hopes are entertained that the Treasury will this year make a final grant for its completion. The foundation stone was laid on October 23rd, 1861, by the late Prince Consort. The collection comprises specimens of almost every kind of Art workmanship, and the series of birds and minerals are more than usually complete.

Free tickets of admission are granted to Art Students, as explained on p. 15.

The Report of the Director for the year 1880 says:-

During the past year a considerable amount of work has been done in preparing and arranging specimens in different sections of the Museum.

In one important respect the attendance during the year has been most satisfactory, that is of students who use the Museum for educational purposes. In 1867, when the Natural History Museum was transferred from the University to this building, the total number of students' visits for the whole year was 322, whereas 11,129 signed the students' entrance book in 1880.

STATUE GALLERY,

Royal Institution, Edinburgh.

The Collection of Casts in this Gallery was commenced in the year 1798, when the Board of Trustees for Encouragement of Manufactures in Scotland expended a sum of £50 in the purchase of Casts to increase the examples in. Fine Art in the Drawing Academy, which the Board had formed in 1760 for the Promotion of Taste in Manufacturing Designs. Since that date the collection has been progressively augmented by valuable additions, and now comprises 239 examples of Sculpture from the age of Pericles (400 B.C.) downwards. The Casts were arranged in the present Gallery in 1827.

The Gallery is open to the public on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Saturday free; on Thursday and Friday admission 6d.; hours, 10 to 4. Copyists are permitted to work daily without charge.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR MANUFACTURES.

STATE AID £2,100.1

Secretary-Hon. B. F. PRIMROSE, C.B., Royal Institution, Edinburgh.

This Board, founded upon the Treaty of Union, dates from 1727; it was originally formed for encouraging the manufactures and fisheries of Scotland. The sum of £2,000 annually was thus disposed of until 1809, when a separate Fishery Board was established, and since then the grant has been appropriated to the School of Art, to the National Gallery, and to the Museum of Antiquities.

MUSEUM OF NATIONAL ANTIQUITIES,

Royal Institution, Edinburgh.

Assistant Secretary-J. Anderson.

This Museum illustrates the progress of culture and civilisation in Scotland from the earliest times. It contains a series of the decorative work peculiar to the Scottish Highlands; of brooches and personal ornaments of the Celtic period; of sculptured monuments in Celtic style of early Christian period; of specimens of Norwegian Art found in Scotland; of relics of Industry and Art from the Round Towers peculiar to Scotland; and a number of specimens of Late Celtic, sepulchral pottery and bronze and stone implements, as well as relics from the Lake dwellings of Scotland and the Roman occupation. There are also a number of historical portraits.

Open Tuesday, Wednesday, and Saturday, 10 to 4, and Saturday Evenings 7 to 9—free; Monday, shut; Thursday and Friday 10 to 4—admission sixpence.

Incorporated by Royal Charter, 1827. In 1819 a number of gentlemen interested in Scottish Art each gave a sum of £25 towards establishing a fund for holding exhibitions and purchasing pictures. These purchases, together with others bought with profits of exhibitions, formed the nucleus of the Scottish National Gallery, they having been presented by the directors to the nation.

Several exhibitions were held from 1819 till 1829, and a number of painters were entered as associate artists of this Institution. The diploma works of these artists also formed part of the directors' gift.

The purpose for which this Institution was formed may be said to be served. The Institution, however, still exists, as the directors of the Institution are Trustees of the Spalding Fund. (See Art Charities, page 148.)

THE CORPORATION GALLERIES OF ART, GLASGOW.

Curator-James Paton.

The nucleus of this collection was formed, and the galleries were erected, by Mr. Archibald McLellan, at one time a magistrate of Glasgow. On his death, the structure and Art property were acquired and held by the Town Council under powers conferred on them by special Act of Parliament. Mr. McLellan's collection still forms the major portion of the exhibits, but many additions have been made, principally by donation and bequest. The most notable have been the pictures of the late Mr. W. Euing, and the collection formed by John Graham Gilbert, R.S.A., and bequeathed by his widow.

It comprises examples of Flemish and Early Italian Art. A masterpiece of John Linnell, sen., "A Coming Storm," was bequeathed to the Galleries by John MacGavin in 1881.

The Galleries contain a collection of sculpture, including busts of local celebrities and the statue of Pitt, executed in 1812, for the citizens of Glasgow, by Flaxman.

GLASGOW INSTITUTE OF THE FINE ARTS.

Acting Secretary-Robert Walker.

Object—to diffuse among all classes a taste for Art generally, and more especially for contemporary Art. Towards carrying out this object annual exhibitions of paintings, sculpture, drawings, and other works of Art have been held since 1861. Financially and otherwise the Institute has been a success. New galleries have been lately erected, which are very commodious.

1007 works (pictures, drawings, and statuary) were exhibited in the Twentieth Spring Exhibition, which opened in February, 1881.

The Autumn Exhibition (1881) comprised works in black and white (to the number of 1144) and works by members of the Scottish Water-Colour Society.

The regulations for exhibitors in the Spring Exhibition (which will open on Feb. 7 and close May 6, 1882) contain the following special clauses. Invited artists may send four works of Art; uninvited artists not more than two. Commission on sales, 5 per cent. on British, and 10 per cent. on foreign. Agents—London, Bourlet, 17, Nassau-street (receiving day, Jan. 2); Edinburgh, Doig and Co. (receiving day, Jan. 4); Glasgow receiving day, Jan. 9. (See Advt.)

HUNTERIAN MUSEUM,

The University, Glasgow.

This Museum contains some fine portraits and a collection of engravings. There are also several works in sculpture.

THE SCOTTISH SOCIETY OF WATER-COLOUR PAINTERS.

Office, 61, West Regent-street, Glasgow.

Secretary-William Smith.

This Society was instituted in 1878, and holds exhibitions annually. At the Winter Exhibition in 1881, 153 pictures were hung, of which thirty were sold for £707. The Fourth Exhibition was opened in September in the galleries of the Glasgow Institute of the Fine Arts, being held in conjunction with the Black and White Exhibition. The number of works hung was 257.

The object of the Society is to promote the development of Water-colour Art in Scotland, principally through the medium

of annual exhibitions.

The membership is limited to forty, with twenty associates, the present numbers being thirty-six members and eleven associates. Applicants for the associateship must be proposed and seconded by a member, and submit two of their drawings for inspection. The election is by ballot. Ladies are eligible as associates only. Members are elected from the ranks of the associates, also by ballot. Candidates for associateship must have their names entered in proposal book kept by the Secretary before the close of the exhibition, and the election takes place in January. The entrance fee is \pounds_5 , and annual subscription \pounds_3 for members and associates.

DUNDEE FINE ART EXHIBITION.

Honorary Secretary-J. MACLAUCHLAN.

An Exhibition is held annually in the Albert Institute under the management of a large committee. Besides pictures, drawings and statuary, painting on china, enamels, etchings, and works in black and white are admitted. There is an Art Union attached to the Exhibition, for which see page 145.

At the Fifth Exhibition, which was open from October to December, a large number of works were shown. The sales amounted to £5,000.

The next Exhibition will open early in October, 1882.

The regulations for exhibitors are the usual ones. Certain artists are invited. Commission on sales, 5 per cent. Works of those invited received in London at Bourlet's, 17, Nassaustreet; Edinburgh, Doig and Co., 90, George-street; Glasgow, M'Clure, 90, St. Vincent-street.

KIRKCALDY FINE ART ASSOCIATION.

Honorary Secretary-DAVID STORRAR.

This Association was formed in 1872 with the object of fostering a taste for Art in the neighbourhood by instituting an Annual Exhibition. It now consists of 661 members, an increase of 43 on the year 1880-81.

The Tenth Annual Exhibition was opened the 7th September, and closed on 7th November. It contained 889 works of Art. The attendances and sales were satisfactory. The success of the Institution shows what can be effected in a provincial town numbering not more than 25,000 inhabitants.

Kirkcaldy also boasts of an Art Club numbering nearly forty members, with well-appointed club rooms containing a good selection of casts and other objects of study. An Art Union is attached to the Exhibition; for which see page 145.

Contributions to the Exhibition are principally the result of invitations. Other works must be delivered free of cost at the Exhibition Rooms, Kirkcaldy, not later than the 12th August. A perusal of list of sales seems to point to low-priced works obtaining the best market.

GREENOCK MUSEUM.

Honorary Secretary-GEO, R. M'DOUGALL.

This Museum forms part of the Watt Institution, and was erected in 1876 by Mr. James McLean, a merchant in Greenock, who also liberally endowed it. Attached to the Museum is a lecture hall, in which a permanent collection of pictures is being formed, and in which occasional exhibitions of paintings are held.

THE PAISLEY ART INSTITUTE.

Secretary-WILLIAM McGHIE, High-street.

The members number 262. An Annual Exhibition is held; at that in the spring of 1881 a collection of 256 works lent and for sale were shown, the sales being nearly £400. A picture and sculpture gallery will be opened early in 1882.

MONTROSE MUSEUM.

Honorary Secretary-ROBERT BARCLAY.

Instituted 1836. The collection in this building is now extensive in gems, coins, minerals, natural history, and antiquarian objects of general and local interest.

OTHER PERMANENT MUSEUMS IN SCOTLAND.

Museums are also established at Dundee, Peebles, and Stirling (the Smith Institute).

OTHER EXHIBITIONS IN SCOTLAND, OPEN IN 1881.

Aberdeen.—During July a collection of works by living and deceased Aberdeen painters, principally those of John Phillip, R.A.

Glasgow.—During the spring a collection of Oriental Art in the Corporation Galleries. During the autumn, collection of Drawings by Turner and T. Fairbairn.

Inverness.—Exhibition of Pictures and Artistic Work, opened on October 11th.

Stonehaven.—During August a collection of pictures and Art workmanship.

The National Gallery is intended to contain not only a Gallery of Paintings by the Old Masters (and such Works of Modern Schools as may be suitable for a National Collection), but also a Gallery of Sculpture, a collection of drawings and engravings, and books relating to the Fine Arts.

The Gallery (opened 1st of Feb., 1864) is open on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, from noon to dusk (or 6 o'clock P.M.); and on Sunday from 2 P.M. to dusk (or 5 o'clock P.M.), admission free. It is reserved for artists and students on Friday and Saturday, from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M., when the admission to the public is sixpence. On evenings

fixed by the Board, and notified by advertisement, it is lighted by gas, and open free from 8 to 10 o'clock P.M.

The Board of Governors and Guardians consists of 17 members; 5 are ex-officio, 2 are artists (resident), 3 are appointed by Government, and 7 are elected from time to time as vacancies occur.

The collection of paintings consists of works purchased by means of private subscriptions, and by the annual Parliamentary Grant, of works presented or bequeathed, and others deposited by the Trustees of the National Gallery of England. The Casts after the Antique and other works of Sculpture have been obtained by a Treasury order for a portion from the British Museum, aided by the funds of the Ancient Art Society and by private donations and subscriptions.

THE ROYAL HIBERNIAN ACADEMY OF ARTS.

Dublin.

STATE AID ... Yearly £300

Before the year 1823, Irish artists, though they undoubtedly had achieved "a name," were, nevertheless, without a local habitation. We find them holding exhibitions in various localities-William-street, Hawkins-street, College-street; and these frequent changes of situation had a more or less injurious effect on their popularity. In that year, however, the Royal Hibernian Academy was established by Royal Charter, and the Academy House in Lower Abbey-street was erected and presented to the members of the Academy and their successors for ever by Francis Johnston, Esq. His widow enhanced this gift by adding a Gallery for Sculpture, fitted to receive a collection of Casts from the Antique, the gift of the Marquis of Anglesea. This Gallery was also used as a School for Students up to a recent period, when, finding their studies were interrupted by the Annual Exhibition during some of the best months in the year, the present President, Sir T. A. Jones,

from his private purse, caused such alterations to be made that a spacious room is at the command of the students without interfering with the lower part of the building used for the purposes of the Annual Exhibitions. The Academicians and Associates are as follows:—

EXTRACT FROM REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR.

The attendance of the public during 1880 has numbered 192,357, showing an increase of 28,476 visitors over 1879, and 68,713 over 1878.

I have again to express regret that no progress has been made towards the erection of buildings for the extension of the Science and Art Museum, and for the accommodation of the departments or institutions connected with it.

Heretofore, in consequence of the continued occupation of the

agricultural premises by the Royal Dublin Society, it would have been premature to take steps for erecting any buildings on that site. In the month of September, 1880, however, the Society having surrendered to the Board of Public Works possession of those premises, the obstacle arising from preoccupation of site has been removed, and it is therefore presumed that action will now be taken in this important matter.

It is very desirable that the principal building, which would in itself be highly ornamental, should be placed, as proposed, across that part of Leinster Lawn fronting Merrion Square, a proposal to which, I regret to say, there is considerable opposition on the part

of the public.

It seems probable that those persons who object to any portion of Leinster Lawn being utilised for that purpose are not aware of the extent of space that will be required for the completion of this great establishment, which should, if possible, embrace the following sections or institutions, viz.:—

I. Zoology and Ethnology.

Geology, Palæontology, and Mineralogy, including the collections of the Irish Geological Survey.

3. General Art, Industrial and Physical Science Collections.
4. Agricultural Collections, including implements and machinery,

4. Agricultural Collections, including implements and machinery, which may be placed in a court.

Museum of the Perel Link Academy.

5. Museum of the Royal Irish Academy.6. The National Library of Ireland.

7. The Royal College of Science.

8. The Extension of the National Gallery of Ireland.

9. Refreshment rooms, retiring rooms, &c.

It is obvious that for the fulfilment of a design so comprehensive, and in order to provide accommodation for the inevitable expansion of the collections, the space available at the Kildare-street side of Leinster House will not be nearly sufficient; it should, moreover, be borne in mind that unless the Merrion Square site is utilised the National Gallery, which is greatly in need of extension, cannot be properly enlarged in any other direction. It is therefore reasonable to expect that the objections which have been urged against the occupation of Leinster Lawn by the principal building, grounded, as it is, merely on its shutting out the view of the lawn from Merrion Square, will be withdrawn, and that the people of Ireland may have the opportunity of enjoying an institution at least comparable with that now existing in Edinburgh.

I have been unremittingly engaged, with the aid of the Art and Industrial Assistant, in forming a collection of objects for the Art and Industrial Museum, and by the opportunities we have had of visiting London and various places in Europe we have been fortunate in securing many important specimens, which it is to be regretted must be put in store, as there is no place at present available for

their exhibition.

The following questions were asked in the House of Commons:--

March 3rd.—Mr. Dawson asked the Vice President of the Council whether any site had yet been fixed on for the National Library in Dublin; whether any decision as to its external and internal plan had been arrived at, and if the trustees of the library had been consulted on these points; if he would state why the reports of the Visitors of the Dublin Science and Art Museum, the Natural History Collection, and Botanic Gardens for 1877, 1878, 1879, and 1880 had not been laid before Parliament; and, if the Visitors had met, and how often, to advise on matters affecting the institutions above named.

Mr. Mundella said the site had not yet been fixed, but the

Visitors would meet this week.

May.—Mr. Dawson asked the Vice President of the Council whether, before deciding on any plans for the building of the new Science and Art Museum and National Library of Dublin, the Corporation of Dublin would be consulted; and whether, in the construction of the National Library, regard would be had to the improved mode of construction which separated the public reading rooms from those in which the books were stored.

Mr. A. M. Sullivan asked whether, considering the long delay,

expedition would not now be used.

Mr. Mundella said one scheme had hitherto been thwarted by local and unreasonable opposition. Another was now prepared, and every opportunity would be given to the Corporation to express their opinion.

This Department was established in 1853 as a development of the Department of Practical Art, which in 1852 had been created for the re-organisation of Schools of Design. It was placed under the direction of the Committee of Council on Education in 1856.

The object of the vote for the Department is to promote instruction in Drawing, Painting, and Modelling, and Designing for Architecture, Manufactures, and Decorations, especially among the industrial classes.

As it takes a volume of over six hundred pages to contain the Annual Report for 1880 (presented 13th July, 1881), only a condensed summary is here inserted. Every endeavour has been made to sift the volume and to present what appertains to Art in a concise form.

The greater part of the information contained in the annual Art Directory is also given here; but Art teachers, and those interested in the formation of Art schools, are recommended to examine the regulations laid down in that publication, which is issued by the authority of the Department, price 6d.

The ramifications into which the Art Department has spread in the twenty-nine years of its existence are divided into:—

- 1. The aid given towards the promotion of instruction in Elementary Drawing as a part of National education, and in Fine Art as applied to industry.
- 2. The South Kensington Museum as the central repository for objects of Art to be circulated thence through the country (as to which see p. 14).
- 3. The Branch Museums supported by the State, and the Institutions which received aid subject to the superintendence of the Science and Art Department (as to which see p. 21).

As to No. 1, namely—The aid given towards the promotion of instruction in Elementary Drawing as a part of National Education and in Fine Art as applied to industry. Starting at the lowest grade we find this aid is given:—

- (a) To Elementary Day Schools (see below). (b) To Diocesan and other Training Colleges (see next page). (c) To classes for children above twelve years of age and artisans (see p. 90). (d) To Schools of Art (see p. 91). (e) To selected pupils of Local Schools of Art, to enable them to attend the National Art Training Schools (see p. 93). (f) In prizes at a National Competition (see p. 105). (g) By the circulation of books and works of Art (see p. 20). (h) Grants in aid of examples (see p. 93).
- (A) To ELEMENTARY DAY SCHOOLS.—Where drawing is taught concurrently with reading and writing, and is specially directed to the improvement and refinement of the perceptive powers of the children.

The number of schools examined in March, 1880, was 4,758. The number of children taught was 768,661, examined 554,785; these numbers, compared with 1879, present an increase of 269 schools, 43,532 children taught, and 13,056 examined. The number of pupil-teachers and paid monitors examined was 13,494, as against 13,132 the previous year. The exercises worked by children and pupil-teachers under examination were as follows:—

Against 673,678 exercises worked in 1879. Of these, grants were made on 566,308 by children and 5,425 by teachers. The total amount given in aid of instruction in drawing in these 4,758 schools in 1880 being £43,203; this, with £5,750 for prizes and examples, makes the total aid from Government £48,953, as against a total of £38,882 in 1879 to 4,489 schools.

Great difficulties having been met with in providing for the conduct of these examinations simultaneously, it is proposed that they shall in future be held from time to time throughout the year.

(B) TO DIOCESAN AND OTHER TRAINING COLLEGES.—In which teachers of Elementary Schools obtain certificates as teachers of drawing.

At the examination of the 48 Training Colleges in November, 1880, 621 students in training and 354 teachers and pupil-teachers obtained full certificates for drawing; 609 of all obtaining prizes. The number of students examined was 3,568, a decrease of 130 from 1879; of these 2,361 were successful, an increase of 58 on the previous year. The number of pupil-teachers and teachers examined was 1,087, an increase of 101; of these 618 were successful, an increase of 61 over 1879. A supplementary examination of teachers and

pupil-teachers was held at South Kensington in November, and was attended by 358 candidates; of whom 211 were successful, 8 obtained prizes, and 126 obtained full certificates.

The amount granted to these Colleges for payments on results increased from £1,261 in 1879 to £1,342 in 1880; and the amounts for prizes and examples from £342 in 1879 to £400 in 1880, making a total aid of £1,742 in 1880 against £1,603 in 1879.

(c) To Classes for Children above Twelve Years of AGE AND ARTISANS BEING STUDENTS OF THE INDUSTRIAL CLASSES.—In these classes the primary instruction of the children is carried further than in the Elementary Schools, and they are associated with adult students in the study of form, light and shade, and linear drawing. Aid is given to such classes when they are under a responsible local committee, meet at least once a week, and are under instruction by a certificated teacher. Under "Students of the Industrial Classes" are included only:—(a) Artisans or operatives in the receipt of weekly wages. (b) Coastguards, policemen, and others who, though in receipt of weekly wages, do not support themselves by manual labour. (c) Teachers and pupil-teachers of Elementary Schools in connection with the Education Department, Whitehall, or the National Board of Education, Ireland. (d) Persons whose incomes from all sources do not exceed £200 per annum. (e) The children (not gaining their own livelihood) of all such persons above mentioned. In 1880, in 632 classes, 26,646 students were taught at a cost of £7,226, as against in 1879, 29,393 students taught in 732 classes at a cost of £7,087, in direct payments, prizes, and examples. Of 11,792 students examined in the second grade examination, 4,657 were successful and 1,109 obtained prizes, against the following totals in 1879: -Students, 14,232; successful, 4,192; and prizes, 906. In the third, grade or highest Art examination, 13,315 students sent up 144,749 works for inspection; to these 12,362 artisans contributed, on whose works payments were allowed, and 477 of the whole students obtained prizes. In 1879, 14,254 students sent up 144,461 works; there were 13,153 artisans on whose works were allowed payments, and 434 obtained prizes. In 1880 the payments on the results of examination amounted to £6,119, against £6,167 the previous year; £122 was given as aid towards purchase of examples, against £239, and the costs of prizes in 1880 was £985, and in 1879 £681.

Although new classes to the number of 74 have been opened during the year, the total number has declined from 732 to 632, thus showing that no less than 174 classes have been discontinued. This decrease is principally due to the higher qualification now required to be held by teachers.

To 128 schools and classes of a public character, presenting 4,605 candidates for examination not entitled like the preceding classes for payments on results, direct grants were allowed for prizes, the cost of which was £140, an increase of over £33 compared with the previous year: the number of classes was one more than in 1879. Of the candidates 937 were successful and 282 obtained prizes in the first grade, as against 944 and 326 the previous year in the first grade; and, in the second grade, 854 were successful, 200 obtained prizes, compared with 748 and 154 in 1879.

There were also 241 science classes that obtained grants to the amount of £1,751, against £1,541 in 1879. In these classes Art papers in Second Grade Practical Geometry and Perspective and Drawings of Buildings and Machines were worked by 4,633 students, who sent up 49,411 exercises, of which number 364 gained prizes. In 1879, 3,989 students sent 43,640 papers, and 100 gained prizes.

(D) To Schools of Art.—Where the student, after having obtained sound elementary knowledge, pursues the technical study of Art in the direction required by his occupation.

A School of Art is defined to be a room devoted wholly to instruction in Art, where examples of Art are always accessible for study and inspection, and where instruction is given by a teacher holding an Art-teacher's certificate.

The total number of Schools of Art in operation at the close of 1880 was 151 and 9 branches, and of students 30,239, as against 146 schools and 9 branches and 29,191 students in 1879. New schools were established during 1880 at Blackheath, Blackheath Hill, Carmarthen, Gosport, Leicester, Manchester, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Poole, and York.

At the Annual Examination in April, 1880, 10,949 students were examined in the second grade; of these 6,022 were successful and 1,934 obtained prizes; the corresponding numbers in 1879 being 10,784 students, 4,868 successful and 1,401 prizes gained. For the Local Advanced Examination at the same time 689 candidates were examined, the papers of 377 candidates were marked successful, and 73 obtained prizes; the preceding year's figures being 732 candidates, 302 successful, and 36 receiving prizes. For the Third Grade Examination 19,338 students sent up works to the number of 170,383; of the students 16,642 were artisans on whom payments were made, and 1,098 of the whole gained prizes. Of the works mentioned 989 were referred to the National Competition, the result of which will be found on pp. 103-6 of The Year's Art, 1881. The following awards were then made:-13 gold medals, 43 silver medals, 73 bronze medals, and 154 Queen's Book prizes; the numbers in 1879 being 10 gold, 45 silver and 77 bronze medals, and 172 Queen's Book prizes. Information respecting the National Competition for 1881 will be found at p. 105.

The building grants for Schools of Art in 1880 were:—Farnham, £225 15s., and Kidderminster, £500. Grants may be made, subject to the usual conditions, to schools which are in progress at Hanley (extension), £46; Inverness, £348; St. Alban's, £234; Salisbury, £326; Penzance, £405. These will probably be finished and the grants claimed during the financial year 1881-82. Grants may also be made to Cardiff, £500; Chelsea, Onslow College, £280; and Ipswich, £332, which will be claimed during 1881-82.

- (E) TO SELECTED STUDENTS OF SCHOOLS OF ART.—To enable them to attend the National Art Training School, which is maintained for training Art teachers, designers, and Art workmen, for particulars of which see under heading National Art Training School, p. 103. The number of students who received allowances was 54. These and 73 others also received gratuitous instruction, and 36 paid only half fees. The total number of the students, including the foregoing, was, in 1880, 824 (448 females and 376 males); in 1879 a like number of students and sexes. At the Annual Examination 33 students passed as teachers, 30 being the number in 1879. All other information regarding the school will be found at pages 103 to 109.

The best works sent up for examination are selected to enter into a National Competition between the works of all the Schools of Art in the kingdom, and medals and prizes are awarded to those students who execute the most meritorious of the competing works.

The prize list includes 12 gold, 30 silver, and 60 bronze medals. Every gold, silver, or bronze medal carries with it a book prize.

Conclusion.—In the six years, 1875—80, the number of institutions in which instruction is given in drawing or in higher Art, with the aid of the Department, and subject to its inspection, has increased from 3,904 to 5,589, while the amount of aid given by the Department in the form of payments on results of this instruction, as tested by examinations, has risen from £38,528 in 1875 to £67,756 in 1880, or nearly 80 per cent. of increase, an amount which compares favourably with the increase of the means of instruction and the number of persons taught.

The courses of instruction pursued have for their object the systematic training of teachers, male and female, in the practice of Art and in the knowledge of its scientific principles, with a view to qualifying them as teachers of Schools of Art. The instruction comprehends freehand, architectural, and mechanical drawing; practical geometry and perspective; painting in oil, tempera, and water colours; modelling, moulding, and casting. These courses are open to the public on payment as follows:— For classes (studying five whole days a week, including evenings) f, 5 for five months, and entrance fee of 10s. Evening classes: male school, £,2 per session; female school, £,1 per session, three evenings a week. Teachers in private schools or families may attend the day classes for not more than three months on payment of f, r per month, without payment of the entrance An evening artisan class is held in the elementary fee. room, fees 10s. per session. No students can be admitted to these classes until they have passed an examination in freehand drawing of the second grade. Examinations of candidates for admission will be held weekly at the commencement of each session, and at frequent intervals throughout the year. These examinations are held at the school on Tuesdays at 10.30 A.M. and 6.45 P.M. The examination fee is 2s. 6d. for day students, and 6d. for evening students, to be paid at the time of examination. The annual sessions, each lasting five months, commence 1st March and 1st October, and end on the last day of July and last day of February. The school is open every day, except Saturday. Hours of study: day, 9 to 3.30; evening, 7 to 9, 6 to 8 during summer months. Evening classes for females Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. Classes for schoolmasters, schoolmistresses, and pupil-teachers of public elementary schools meet two evenings in each week. Fee 5s. for the session.

The last issued report shows that during the year 1879-80 40 students in training to become Art teachers, and 14 national scholars in training to become designers or Art workmen, received allowances to enable them to study in the school and museums; 36 students were admitted on payment of half fees, and 127 others, including the 40 students in training and the 14 national scholars, received

gratuitous instruction.

At the annual examinations for third-grade Art certificates, held in February and July, 1880, 33 students of the Training School obtained certificates qualifying the holders of them to earn payments from the department as teachers in Schools of Art. The general and fee-paying students won 3 gold, 4 silver, 15 bronze medals, and 15 Queen's prizes in the National Competition, besides 153 prizes of books, &c., for works sent in for examination. The students in training and national scholars won in the same competition 3 gold medals, 19 silver medals, 15 bronze medals, and 19 Queen's prizes of books.

The number of students was 824 (376 males and 448 females); and the fees received amounted to £3,506 18s., of which sum

£307 14s. was paid by evening students.

The Etching Class.—This class has been conducted during the past session by Mr. A. Legros, and has been attended by an average of 9 students of the Training School. The Wood Engraving Class has been discontinued.

Students of Schools of Art who propose to become teachers, and who have taken the first certificate of the third grade, are eligible to compete for admission to the National Art Training School at South Kensington, with a maintenance allowance of 15s. weekly, to which may be added personal payments not exceeding 20s. per week. Students who have taken the Art Class Teacher's Certificate may compete for admission as free students.

Students of Schools of Art may compete for National Scholarships of the value of from £1 to £2 per week, tenable at South Kensington for one, two, or three years.

Two scholarships, called "The Princess of Wales Scholarships," of the value of £25 and £11 respectively, are awarded to the two female students who take the highest prizes of the year in the These Scholarships date from the 1st National Competition. October in each year.

A limited number of duly qualified students from the Local Art Schools will be appointed to National Scholarships in the National Art Training School, with weekly allowances for maintenance of 20s., which may reach 40s., according to the work of the scholar.

Students who are already engaged in designing for, or in producing, works of Art manufacture, are the most eligible candidates for these scholarships, which are intended to enable advanced students, who may have given evidence of special aptitude for design, to prosecute their studies in the Training School and Museum.

The duties of the National Scholars will be defined by the Principal. Appointments to these Scholarships will be for one year only. They may be renewed for a second year, and in special cases of great proficiency for a third year.

Applications, accompanied by drawings, designs, or other evidence of the candidate's ability, must be made on the 20th of February or

20th of September.

Should the conduct or progress of students in training or National Scholars be unsatisfactory, their allowances may be reduced or wholly withdrawn.

NATIONAL COMPETITION OF THE WORKS OF SCHOOLS OF ART, 1881.

The following is the official report on the competition:-

The number of drawings sent up from Schools of Art for examination this year was 190,615 from 157 Schools of Art. Of these works 1,218 were referred to the National Competition, being 229 more than in 1880.

In these works a general improvement has called for the award of a large number of the higher distinctions.

FIGURE DRAWING AND PAINTING. Examiners: G. D. Leslie, R.A., W. F. Yeames, R.A., E. J. Poynter, R.A., H. A. Bowler.

In the competition for the medals for drawing from the Antique and the Life a decided improvement was observed. The competition was more equal than in previous years, owing to the rule forbidding the use of backgrounds in chalk studies, which has left the students more free to observe the niceties of form in the contours of the figures

selected. The Gold Medal for the Antique was awarded to a figure of Silenus nursing the infant Bacchus from Edinburgh. To Edinburgh also was awarded the Gold Medal in painting from the Antique, in which a background is admitted, for a monochrome study of the same figure, excellent in its treatment of the head, but in which the modelling of the limbs might have been carried further. The Gold Medal for the drawing from the Life was awarded, with some hesitation, to a drawing from South Kensington, to which the least objection could be made, and which was characterized by a graceful treatment of a thin and delicately marked figure.

A Gold Medal was well earned by a painting of a nude figure from Birmingham, which was quiet in colour, firm in drawing, and well considered in tone and in relation to its white background, though its effect was injured by incompleteness in the parts a little

removed from the figure.

The Examiners recommend that in future a special Silver Medal shall be offered for a study, in light and shade only, treating a number of objects with especial reference to "tone," and the true expression of their relative force in light and shade and their position in the picture. The subjects of these studies may be objects of stilllife, casts of ornaments, or combinations of these. This will supplement the drawing from the Antique, now treated without background, by a form of study for which the Antique figure has been in some schools too exclusively used.

DESIGN WITH ARCHITECTURE AND MODELLING. Examiners: J. E. Boehm, A.R.A, Wm. Morris, J. J. Stevenson, The Director

and Assistant Director for Art.

The Gold Medal for Architectural Design was awarded to a design for a cathedral, somewhat grandiose, showing also imagination and a sense of beauty, though not quite practical for execution. A second Gold Medal was given to a set of drawings showing an admirable method of study. Well-selected examples of church porches had been visited, measured, and carefully drawn in preparation for designing a number of porches in the historic English styles. The drawings were well executed in pen and ink, and the filling in of the tracery openings with dead black, which gave an ugly and untrue effect to some other drawings, was avoided. In a design for candelabrum for a synagogue remarkable for careful study of classic forms and ingenious application to its purpose, though unsuitable from the introduction of figures, the conventional form of the branches for seven candles was gracefully treated and thoughtfully enriched. It gained a gold medal.

In modelling, the excellent teaching of the Instructor at South

Kensington secured almost all the prizes for that school.

DESIGN. Examiners: H. S. Marks, R.A., W. Morris, J. J. Stevenson, The Director and Assistant Director for Art.

A Gold Medal was awarded for a carpet from Salisbury of good colour, carefully designed, and well expressed in the drawing, the

various parts being in good proportion, and the border especially well treated. A Bronze Medal was awarded to another carpet for good colour and design, though wanting in constructive knowledge; and a Book Prize for one treating the thistle cleverly as regards form, though failing in colour. Generally the works in this section suggest the observation that too much interest is shown in ingenious twisting of the plant forms used in the designs, and too little pleasure in colour, which should be the first consideration in a carpet. Wall decoration was represented by numerous carefully executed works, especially from Nottingham, in one of which the Guelder rose was ingeniously conventionalised. The use of gold is too readily resorted to, and designs are too frequently put on a black ground; black and gold no doubt form a safe combination with which almost any colour may be made tolerable, and the difficulties of combining pure tints are thus evaded in many cases; moreover, the pattern would have had a better effect on a white or some other light ground, but many of those exhibited would have made the walls of an ordinary room oppressive.

Lace designs were as usual beautifully executed. Gold Medals were given for designs showing a just distribution of textures of thick and thin work, and a genuinely artistic conventionalising of plant forms and flowers in designs for pillow lace came from Dover.

The designs for pottery were discouraging. Students seem to have studied the current show in shop windows rather than examples of work of the best periods. Little skill was shown in the proper conventionalising of plant forms. The designs were frequently merely direct copies of bunches of flowers, not even well placed on the surface to be decorated.

Ribbons also seem to have been designed without thought, merevulgar copies of flowers, and those not well done. One sheet received a small award for evidence of a somewhat better treatment.

Designs for white damasks exhibited want of appreciation of the opportunities this fabric offers for beauty to be obtained by the interchange of shades of white, which, when skilfully employed, should depend rather on agreeable distribution of quantities than on arrangements based upon flow of line.

The exercises in design, which were too much confined to simply covering a given space with mere repetition of accidental forms, would have been better if based on selected geometrical lines, to which floral forms derived from nature should be applied. The analysis of plant forms, valuable as a study, is still too much used for supplying in the place of design mere mechanical arrangements.

PAINTING IN OIL AND WATER COLOURS. Examiners: H. S. Marks, R.A., L. Alma-Tadema, R.A., Val. Prinsep, A.R.A., The Director and Assistant Director for Art.

The works representing still-life in oil and water colour excited the admiration of the Examiners, which was expressed by a large number of awards. The Gold Medal for oil painting was gained for the Liverpool, South District, School of Art, by a firmly executed imitative painting in a large style, in which the objects represented kept their places in their various planes remarkably well, owing to the truth of tone in the work. The effects of many of the oil studies is lost by the too great use of mediums. The most successful water-colour work was distinguished by similar qualities, and was a pure, broad, carefully finished, and effective drawing painted in washes, with close attention to truth of tone and light. The useful study of drapery should be more general.

Scale, 2 inches to the foot. Details, 3 inches to the foot, to be given on the same imperial sheet. For the best, £8 8s.; for the second best, £5 5s.

These prizes are open to all students in Schools of Art, including artisan classes in those schools; but the first and second prizes in either case cannot be both taken by students of the National Art

Training School at South Kensington.

All works sent in competition for these prizes must be specially prepared, and marked "In competition for the Prizes of the Plasterers' Company of London." They must be sent to the Science and Art Department in April, 1882, at the same time, and labelled in the same way, as the other works submitted for examination under the regulations in the Art Directory. No student may send more than one design for each subject.

The designs will be judged and the prizes awarded by the

Science and Art Department.

The models and designs will remain the property of the competitors, but the Plasterers' Company reserves the right of taking copies of them, should it be thought desirable.

The School of the Antique is open every day from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M., and from 5 to 7 P.M. The School of Painting, from 9 A.M. to 3 P.M. The Life School, from 5 to 7 P.M., and the Architectural Class, Tuesday and Wednesday, from 6 to 8 P.M.; and the Library, containing a valuable collection of works of Art, is open to all students every day of the week from 2 to 6 P.M., and on Tuesdays and Fridays till 8 P.M.

The following are the rules for admission of students during

All applicants for admission to the schools of the Royal Academy must give proof of proficiency in drawing or modelling, and, except in the case of architects, of such acquaintance with the anatomy of the human frame as is comprised in a knowledge of the skeleton.

and the names and uses of the external layer of muscles.

Painters are required to produce, as a specimen of ability, a finished drawing in chalk, not less than two feet high, of an undraped antique statue; or, if of the Theseus, the Ilyssus, the Venus of Milo, or the Hermes (the only mutilated figures admissible), it must be accompanied by, in the case of the Theseus and the Ilyssus, drawings of a head, hand, and foot, and, in the case of the Venus of Milo and the Hermes, of a hand and foot, all of the size of life. They must also produce drawings of a figure anatomized, showing the bones and muscles, in two distinct drawings, with the names of the several muscles, tendons, and bones contained therein.

Sculptors are required to produce, as a specimen of ability, a model, either in the round or in relief, not less than 2 feet high, of an undraped antique statue, accompanied by a drawing in outline of the same or a similar figure. They must also produce drawings of a figure anatomized, showing the bones and muscles, in two distinct drawings, with the names of the several muscles, tendons, and

bones contained therein.

Prior to the delivery of the specimens referred to, candidates must obtain from the Registrar, through the written request of any member of the Academy, or other artist or person of known respectability, a printed form, the blanks of which must be filled up and delivered, with the required specimens, at the Royal Academy, on or before the 28th of June or the 28th of December, to be submitted to the first Council held after those dates. If approved of, he candidate will be entitled to admission as a Probationer, and two months are allowed in which to prepare within the Academy a similar set of drawings, or a similar model and drawings. The time of attendance to be from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M.

At the end of the two months these drawings, or model and drawings, together with the specimens originally presented by the candidate for admission as a Probationer, will be submitted to the Council, and if approved, the Probationer will be admitted a student

of the Royal Academy for three years.

At the end of the three years the student, subject to the fulfilment of certain conditions and the passing an examination, will be ad-

mitted for a further period of three years.

Architects are required to produce, as a specimen of ability, a plan, elevation, and section (which may be copies of published drawings or engravings) of an existing building; an original perspective sketch in pencil of an existing building or part of a building, on a quarter of a sheet of imperial paper; and a drawing of a piece of architectural sculpture, from the original or from a cast, shaded in pencil or tinted, and of the size of the original.

Prior to the delivery of these specimens, candidates must obtain from the Registrar, through the written request of any member of the Academy, or other artist or person of known respectability, a printed form, the blanks of which must be filled up and delivered, with the required specimens at the Royal Academy, on or before the 28th of June or the 28th of December, to be submitted to the first Council after those dates; together with a certificate from an architect member of the Royal Academy, of the Royal Institute of British Architects, or of any other public institution for teaching Art and Science, certifying that the applicant has followed up the study of architecture and architectural drawing, and has acquired a fair degree of proficiency in the same. If approved of, the candidate will be entitled to admission as a Probationer, and will be allowed six months in which to prepare within the Academy a set of drawings or designs, consisting of: a sketch in perspective of some subject set by the master of the architectural school, and executed in one day within the walls of the Academy; a plan, elevation, and section copied from a given subject, in the same style as the drawings originally submitted; and a drawing from a cast made in twelve hours in the Architectural Class Room. The time of attendance to be from 6 till 8 P.M. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, or at such other times as the keeper shall on application give permission for.

At the end of the six months these drawings, together with the specimens originally presented by the candidate for admission as a Probationer, will be submitted to the Council, and if approved, the Probationer will be admitted a student of the Royal Academy for

three years.

At the end of the three years the student, subject to the fulfilment of certain conditions, will be admitted for a further period of three

years.

Candidates in any branch who have been unsuccessful in their first endeavours to gain admission as Probationers, can renew their application at any subsequent period, by again going through the prescribed forms; but the drawings or models submitted must be different from those sent in on any previous occasion.

If any candidates shall be found endeavouring to impose on the Academy, by presenting, as specimens of their talents, drawings or models not of their own performance, they shall be declared incapable of being admitted students of the Royal Academy.

All instruction in the Academy is gratuitous, the student provid-

ing his own materials.

The period of studentship is limited to six years, and cannot be renewed.

PAINTING, DRAWING, AND ETCHING.—The studios are open for the students from 9.30 A.M. to 5 P.M. except on Saturdays, when all the schools are closed at 2 P.M. Two models sit in the life-schools for five hours every day from 10 A.M. Male and female students work together in the antique school and from the draped model.

All students (except those specially exempted by the professor) will, on entering the schools, be required to draw from the antique until judged sufficiently advanced to draw from the life. They will also be allowed to paint from the antique or the life according to their proficiency. Subjects for composition will be given by the professor. The students will also pursue such other studies as the professor may direct, and will be required to work under his direction, from the antique, nude, or draped model, as he may think best. Fees for the session, £19 19s.; for each term, £7 7s.

Students entered to this course will be entitled to work every day from the nude or draped model for five hours from 10 A.M., and from the antique or at other studies up to 5 P.M., except on Saturdays. Instruction in etching will be given by the professor. A printer will attend every Friday to prepare plates and take proofs of

students' works.

SCULPTURE.—A qualified instructor will attend for the purpose of

giving lessons to students.

ARCHÆOLOGY.—Professor C. T. Newton will lecture on Greek Art and Greek and Roman Ritual. The lectures will be illustrated

by drawings and photographs.

ANATOMY.—During the second term, on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 4 P.M., commencing on Tuesday, January 18th, a course of Lectures on Anatomy will be held with special reference to the requirements of Fine Art students. It will consist of twenty lectures.

An examination will be held and a prize will be awarded to the student who displays the greatest proficiency. Fee for the Course, £1 11s. 6d.

PERSPECTIVE.—Arrangements will be made for a course of lectures by Mr. Slinger. Students entered for whole session

CHEMISTRY OF MATERIALS USED IN PAINTING.— A short course of lectures will be delivered by Professor Graham, beginning Wednesday, 3rd May, 1882, at 3 P.M. No additional fee required for this course from students of the school.

SLADE SCHOLARSHIPS IN FINE ARTS.

THE GROSVENOR SCHOOL OF ART,

Conducted by Miss E. Digby Williams.

The classes are for Ladies only, instruction being given in Drawing and Painting, from the Life, Figure, and Model; they meet daily, and on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. There is a free studentship competed for annually. Special attention is devoted to Ladies who wish to study composition by the aid of life models.

THE ROYAL SCHOOL OF ART NEEDLEWORK,

Exhibition Road, South Kensington.

Secretary-L. Higgins.

Was founded in 1872, for the twofold purpose of supplying suitable employment for gentlewomen without publicity, and restoring ornamental needlework to the high place it once held among the decorative arts. The result of eight years' experi-

ence of the working of the school has shown that the objects for which it was formed are appreciated by the public, and has justified its establishment on a permanent basis. The ultimate profits after all payments are applied to such charitable purposes as the Association may determine.

Nearly one hundred ladies are now earning sums varying from 6d. to 10d. an hour according to their proficiency. Although the school has met with much success, and is now known throughout the length and breadth of the land, its opportunities of giving employment are still hampered by the difficulty of obtaining a large and constant sale for its work.

Agencies have been opened in Liverpool, Manchester, Leeds, Norwich, and Glasgow; and a member of the staff takes charge of the School of Art Needlework in Philadelphia.

The show-rooms are open from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M. in summer, and to 5 P.M. in winter; close on Saturdays at 2 P.M.

THE NATIONAL SCHOOL OF ART WOOD-CARVING,

Royal Albert Hall, Kensington, S.W.

Secretary-Thomas Healey.

Established with a view of encouraging, or rather reviving, the greatly neglected art of wood-carving in this country. The Royal Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851 have placed a room in the Albert Hall at the disposal of the school, and the Drapers' Company and the City and Guilds Institute have voted funds with which the Committee are enabled to provide for the instruction of twelve free students. Candidates for free studentship are selected from persons of the industrial class who are intending to earn their living by wood-carving. Other students are admitted to the day classes of the school on payment of $\pounds 2$ a month or $\pounds 5$ a quarter, and to the evening classes on payment of 15s. a month or $\pounds 2$ a quarter. For particulars address the Secretary.

The summer Exhibition is held in the Albert Hall. Visitors are allowed to see the students at work.

THE WORKING MEN'S COLLEGE,

45, Great Ormond Street, Bloomsbury, W.C.

Secretary to College-J. RIGBY SMITH.

Objects of the College.—The students are, for the most part, working men; and the teachers are, in general, members of the Universities and of the different professions, or those who have themselves been students in the College. Its purpose is to unite these classes together by associating them in the common work of teaching and learning. It provides instruction at the smallest possible cost (the teaching being almost wholly unpaid) in the subjects with which it most concerns English citizens to be acquainted, and thus tries to place a liberal education within the reach of working men.

The Art classes were taught for several years by Professor Ruskin; the following are the present arrangements:—

Head Master, Mr. John J. Offord. Subjects taught: Freehand drawing from copies, casts, objects, nature. Shading drawing in chalk and pencil. Monochrome painting in water and oil. Painting in water and oil. Painting on china. Life Class (Mondays and Fridays only). Model, perspective, practical geometry, and mechanical drawing.

Students are expected to prepare for the annual second grade and other examinations of the Government Department of Science

and Art.

Class nights, Monday and Friday. Studios open for practice, Tuesday and Wednesday. Fees: Ticket for the course, September to April (inclusive), 15s. Monthly Tickets (four weeks), 2s. Entrance Fee, 1s. 6d.

The works of the students are exhibited at the beginning of the year.

THE CRYSTAL PALACE SCHOOL OF ART.

Free Scholarship, value £30, open to students who obtain certificates.—The Committee adjudge the scholarship to the student who in their estimation manifests most promise in Art. The award entitles the gainer to instruction during the next ensuing session, without any payment of fees, or for models, from any or all of the Art masters in the school.

THE ROYAL TAPESTRY MANUFACTORY,

Windsor, Berks.

Director-H. HENRY.

This manufactory is now established as a national self-supporting institution under Royal patronage to resuscitate and encourage the manufacture of tapestry in England. At the Paris Exhibition, the dining-room in the Prince of Wales's Pavilion was hung with its earliest productions, which gained a Gold Medal. Various large and small parcels have since been executed from designs by eminent artists. More than a dozen looms are employed, and English workmen are now becoming proficient in the art.

EXTRACT FROM REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR.

In reporting on the operations of the Metropolitan School of Art for the year ending July 31st, 1880, it is gratifying to have to remark that, notwithstanding the general depression which has characterized the past year throughout this country, the school has fairly maintained its position, the payments upon results for the past year having been greater than on any former occasion.

The school has been very largely attended by students of the artisan classes, &c., who are admitted to study on a low scale of fees; a special class has been recently established, meeting on Saturdays in the afternoon, to meet the requirements of such

students.

The total number of students attending the school for the year

ending 31st July, 1880, has been 399; of this number 244 were male and 155 female students.

The fees received from these amounted to £383 2s. 6d.

The school has expended from its own funds the sum of £151 2s. 11d. in the purchase of examples.

The day classes were attended by 138, and the evening classes

by 261 students.

The works executed by 321 students during the year (numbering 1,607 studies) were forwarded to London for examination and competition in April last; such works had been chiefly executed by junior students, or those who had not attended the classes for any considerable length of time; the senior students and prize-takers of former years having very generally worked out their various terms of study here. I may remark that students have latterly been encouraged to a more rapid method of execution, and to more self-reliant effort than formerly.

At the late exhibition of the Royal Hibernian Academy works exhibited by students of this school were numerous, and it may be observed that the higher prizes awarded to studies executed in the schools of that institution are, in nearly every case, carried off by students who have been trained in this School of Art, as are also the leading prizes offered by the trustees appointed to carry into effect the will of the late Captain George Archibald Taylor, by

which funds were left for the promotion of Art in Ireland.

The distribution of medals and prizes gained by the students in the various competitions, &c., during the year took place in the lecture theatre of the Royal College of Science, Stephen's Green, on the 23rd January, 1880. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough,

K.G., presided on the occasion.

The formation and instruction of a class for landscape study direct from nature occupied much of my time and attention during the months of June and July last. Some of those attending this class gave evidence, I consider, of the possession of much ability for this department of Art, which, if fully developed and cultivated, would doubtless result in the production ultimately of works of great merit.

Class lectures on anatomy and botany in their application to Art were given during the session to students attending the school by

Dr. Alexander MacAlister and Professor McNab.

In concluding this report, I may remark that the building in which this school is located was originally intended for a museum, and is, consequently, in many respects unsuited for a School of Art, since both the lighting and ventilation of the class-rooms are imperfect, leaving much to be desired in this respect; and this is especially felt during the warmer months and when the gas is lighted for the evening classes, when such defective ventilation acts very injuriously upon the attendance of students.

THE QUEEN'S INSTITUTE AND COLLEGE FOR THE EDUCATION OF WOMEN,

25, Molesworth Street, Dublin.

Secretary-Miss A. B. Corblett.

This institute, founded in 1861, is partly an affiliated institution to the Government Department of Science and Art, South Kensington.

The School of Art Industries attached thereto has, besides ordinary Art classes, teachers of painting on porcelain, ivory, vellum, silk, wood, and tapestry—of carving in wood, corals, and ivory, and engraving on wood; the terms for the course of six lessons is about £x 1s. An Exhibition of the Works of Students and Amateurs is held annually at Christmas. It was at this institution eleven years ago that painting on porcelain as an employment or amusement for ladies was first introduced.

The Tenth Annual Exhibition of the works wrought in the Institute was opened by the Lord Lieutenant, January 2nd, 1881. Over 200 were shown, and were very creditable, proving that considerable advance had been made, especially in ceramic painting—a branch for which this institution is well known.

The Institute also holds classes at Belfast, 126, Albion-place, Dublin-road.

The Advanced Art Studio is established to promote the study of Art in Ireland. An advanced course of Art studies, lasting for a session of three months during the Dublin season, is formed at the Queen's Institute. The studio is open all day during the session. The life model is posed for students twice in each week. An Academician attends once a fortnight to give aid in criticizing the works of the students.

ROYAL INSTITUTE OF BRITISH ARCHITECTS,

Founded in 1834, and obtained a Royal Charter in 1837. Its affairs are controlled by a Council of twenty-one. There are two classes of professional members-Fellows and Associates. Fellows must be architects who have been engaged as Principals for at least seven successive years in the practice of Architecture; they must sign a declaration that they will not engage in measurement, or valuation, or estimation of any works undertaken by any building artificer except such as are executed under their own direction; they further engage not to accept any pecuniary consideration from any builder whose works they are employed to superintend, and they are not allowed to take out "quantities" except for works executed under their own superintendence—and then only with the concurrence of their clients. Associates must be persons engaged in the study or practice of Architecture, and who * have attained twenty-one years. They are required to sign a declaration similar to that made by Fellows, but they are allowed to measure, value, and take out quantities for any building artificer or any other architect. Both Fellows and Associates are forbidden to have any interest in any trade contract, or in any materials supplied at works which they are engaged to superintend. There are also non-professional members, viz. Honorary Fellows and Honorary Associates, who must be persons unconnected with any branch of building as a trade or business. Every candidate must be recommended by at least three Fellows who are personally acquainted with him. If the Council approve the recommendation they nominate the candidate for election by ballot

of general body of Fellows, one black ball in five excluding. In 1882 every candidate for Associateship will have to pass an examination.

During the Session 1880-81 there were elected twenty-eight Fellows, one hundred and forty-three Associates, and nine Honorary Associates, as well as nine foreign Corresponding Members.

In 1847 the Queen granted to the Institute a gold medal to be conferred on such architect or man of science of any country as may have designed a building of high merit, or produced a work tending to facilitate the study of Architecture. In 1881 the Medal was presented to Mr. George Godwin, F.R.S., F.S.A.

Subscriptions.—Honorary Fellows, no subscription; Honorary Associates, entrance donation to Library £2 2s., and annual £2 2s. Fellows £4 4s., and entrance fee £5 5s. If elected from Associates, entrance fee is £2 2s. Associates £2 2s., and entrance fee £3 3s.

Publications.—The Journal of Proceedings is issued to members fortnightly during the Session, and the volume of Transactions annually in October.

The Office is open from 10 till 4 (Saturdays 10 till 2), and the Library from 10 till 9 (Saturdays 10 till 2); and is closed during September as well as on certain holidays throughout the year. Meetings held once a fortnight on Monday evenings. Annual Meeting and Election, May 1st.

"The Dictionary of Architecture" is issued only to subscribers, the present subscription price being twenty guineas, which may, by arrangement, be paid in instalments. The work has so far advanced that the last issue included the letters P and Q. The letter R is now in hand and partially printed. Local Honorary Secretaries are appointed throughout the kingdom.

THE MANCHESTER SOCIETY OF ARCHITECTS,

The Society of Arts was founded in 1754, and incorporated by Royal Charter in 1847, for "The Encouragement of the Arts, Manufactures, and Commerce of the Country, by bestowing rewards for such productions, inventions, or improvements as tend to the employment of the poor, to the increase of trade, and to the riches and honour of the kingdom; and for meritorious works in the various departments of the Fine Arts: for Discoveries, Inventions, and Improvements in Agriculture, Chemistry, Mechanics, Manufactures, and other useful Arts; for the application of such natural and artificial products. whether of Home, Colonial, or Foreign growth and manufacture, likely to afford fresh objects of industry, and to increase the trade of the realm by extending the sphere of British commerce; and generally to assist in the advancement, development, and practical application of every department of Science in connection with the Arts, Manufactures, and Commerce of this country."

The session commences in November and ends in June. The number of meetings held amounts to nearly eighty. Every Wednesday evening papers on subjects relating to Inventions, Improvements, and Discoveries are read and discussed. A Journal, free to members, is published weekly, and contains full reports of the Society's proceedings. Conversazioni are held. The members number nearly four thousand. Annual subscription, £2 2s. Every member is entitled to be present at all evening meetings of the Society, and to introduce two visitors; to vote at General Meetings; to be present at Lectures, and to introduce one visitor; to have personal free admissions to all Exhibitions and Conversazioni held by the Society; to receive a copy of the Journal; to the use of library and reading-room.

"The most useful work done by the Society in Manchester has been the correspondence carried on with inquirers and friends in all parts of the country, the result of which cannot, of course, be seen at once in most cases; but, from the results which have actually arisen in several instances, we are justified in believing that the interest of many people in Mr. Ruskin's teaching has been stimulated by this means, and a determination to endeavour to extend the knowledge and appreciation of them has been aroused.

"Our membership shows but a slight increase, the large

number of other societies preventing many sympathizers with our work from joining us; and there are indications that in the immediate future our best course will be to work through existing agencies, and to endeavour to infuse the spirit of Mr. Ruskin's teachings into them rather than for the present to strike out on any new and independent path."

Societies are in process of formation at Sheffield, Birkenhead, and Rawtenstall (Lancashire).

THE KYRLE SOCIETY.

This Society was founded in 1877 to bring the refining and cheering influences of natural and artistic beauty home to the people. The report published in 1881 states that ten separate exhibitions were opened on Sundays by the Society, including those of the Grosvenor, the Hanover, the Graphic, and the Society of British Artists. The average attendance on Sundays when the exhibitions were open to the public was 1,623.

The Earl of Dunraven brought the objects of the Society before the House of Lords in February, 1881, when the resolution he proposed was strongly supported by Earl Granville, but was lost by

seven votes.

The income of the Society last year was £686 17s. 6d.

The following question was asked in the House of Commons,

August 19th:-

Mr. Alderman Fowler asked whether, in view of the fact that Parliament had repeatedly refused to sanction the opening of the State museums on Sundays, Mr. Mundella would give directions that works of Art should be loaned from the South Kensington and other museums for exhibition only on the condition that they shall not be shown on Sundays so long as South Kensington and other State museums remain closed.

Mr. Mundella said he was not aware that works of Art loaned from the South Kensington and other State museums had been publicly exhibited on Sundays, but he had been informed that the Corporations of Manchester and Birmingham had opened their museums on Sunday afternoons. The hon, member could not expect that the Government should refuse loans to these important centres on that ground.

Established to promote a knowledge and love of the Fine Arts, and their general advancement in the British Empire, by a wide diffusion of works of native Artists; and to elevate Art and to encourage its professors, by creating an increased demand for their works, and an improved taste on the part of the public.

It is under the direction of a Council of the members, whose services are honorary, and four of whom retire from office every year. Every member, for each guinea subscribed, is entitled to—(a) One chance in the distribution of prizes at the annual general meeting. Five hundred and forty-seven prizes were distributed in 1881. The first prize of £200 was taken by G. B. Hall, of Quebec, for whom the Council selected Mr. Arthur Stock's picture from the Academy, "At Last." (b) An impression of one or more plates engraved and printed exclusively for the Society. That for 1881, a line engraving by A. Willmore, from the original by O. W. Brierly, "The Loss of the *Revenge*." For 1882 the Council placed in the hands of M. Leopold Flameng, for etching, the series of five pictures by W. P. Frith, R.A., "The Road to Ruin."

The annual report for 1881 showed subscriptions to the amount of £11,940, as against £12,070 in 1880. They were no doubt influenced by the depression in trade, but a glance at the results of various years shows how much depends on the popularity of the engraving which is given away.

The Society have moved into new buildings, where they hold permanent exhibitions. The exhibition of prizes always opens on the Monday after the close of the Royal Academy. Local honorary secretaries and agents are appointed in the principal towns in the kingdom and in most parts of the world, through whom subscriptions may be paid, and the prints received free of charge, under certain regulations to be learnt at the office; but the cost of packing and forwarding all works given as prizes must be borne by the prize-holders.

THE ROYAL BIRMINGHAM AND MIDLAND COUNTIES ART UNION.

THE ROYAL ASSOCIATION FOR PROMOTION OF THE FINE ARTS IN SCOTLAND.

FOUNDED IN 1833. INCORPORATED BY ROYAL CHARTER, 1847.

The object of this association—the first established in the United Kingdom for similar purposes—is to advance the cause of Art in Scotland, by affording encouragement to its professors. The funds of the Association are appropriated to the purchase of modern works of Art, and to the execution or purchase of engravings, etchings, bronzes, bas-reliefs, or models. A portion of the funds is also devoted to the acquisition of works of Art for the National Gallery. A general meeting of the subscribers is annually held in July.

The presentation work for 1882 will consist of a volume containing a series of engravings in illustration of Sir Walter Scott's novel of "St. Ronan's Well."

Every subscriber of one guinea is entitled to one print impression, besides one chance in the distribution of paintings in July, 1882; every subscriber of two guineas to one lettered proof impression, besides two chances; and every subscriber of five guineas to one proof before letters, besides five chances.

THE ART UNION OF GLASGOW.

Instituted 1841.—Office: 22, Renfield Street.

Secretary-MacLean Brodie.

Object—to aid in extending a knowledge of the Fine Arts, by distributing among its members meritorious works of Art.

A subscription of one guinea constitutes membership for one year, for which subscribers are entitled to receive the Society's annual engraving, or other work of Art selected for the year, and the chance of obtaining a prize painting at the annual meeting.

DUNDEE ART UNION.

Honorary Secretary-J. MACLAUCHLAN.

Attached to the exhibition (for which see p. 76). The basis on which it is founded appears admirable. All services connected with the Art Union are honorary, and are undertaken without remuneration by gentlemen who desire to promote the cultivation of Art in Dundee. There are, therefore, no charges for salaries, rent, or commission; and the whole sum subscribed, except the very small amount unavoidably expended in stationery, advertising, and postage, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. spent in adding pictures to the permanent collection, is returned in prizes. In 1881 this was £470, and the expenses on an income of £537 amounted to £49. In each year a considerable sum has been added by the winners to the value of their prizes. In 1881 this addition was nearly four times the value of the prizes. Tickets, 10s. 6d. each. The drawing takes place in November.

KIRKCALDY ART UNION.

Established on the same basis as the Dundee. At the drawing in October, 1881, £211 was distributed in prizes; the prize-winners in previous years spent more than double the

amount of their prizes on the average. The expenses were about £20.

ART UNION OF IRELAND,

IN CONNECTION WITH THE ROYAL HIBERNIAN ACADEMY.

Lower Abbey Street, Dublin.

The Art Union of Ireland was established in the year 1858, with the object of encouraging native Art and its professors, by creating an increased demand for their works. The distinctive feature of this Art Union is that the entire subscription, less the working expenses, is allocated in prizes of money, which must be expended in the purchase of pictures or other works of Art exhibited in the Royal Hibernian Academy for the year. Prize-holders are entitled to select such works either personally or by nominee. While subscribers do not receive any subscription work, such as an engraving, their chance of gaining a prize is greater than it would be were a large amount of the subscription expended to this end.

ART CHARITIES.

THE ARTISTS' GENERAL BENEVOLENT INSTITUTION.

Offices: 24, Old Bond Street.

Secretary—F. Lambe Price.

Founded in 1814, its object is to extend relief to distressed meritorious Artists, whether subscribers to its funds or not, as well as to their widows and orphans.

Since its establishment £57,400 has been distributed; last year the amount divided between 145 applicants was £3,550, out of an income of £4,784. The invested funds

amount to £25,572. The expenses of management amount to £277 15s. 4d. only.

THE ARTISTS' ORPHAN FUND.

Offices: 24, Old Bond Street.

Secretary-F. LAMBE PRICE.

Founded in 1871 by the Artists' General Benevolent Institution. The object of the Fund is the support and education of the orphan children of deceased Artists. Last year the income of the Fund amounted to £1,135 13s. 5d., and £1,180 16s. 8d. was paid away—£1,115 4s. 11d. of it to 56 orphan children. The invested funds amount to £28,367. The expenses of management are confined to the smallest dimensions, namely, £65.

THE ARTISTS' BENEVOLENT FUND.

Secretary-Lambton Young, 23, Garrick Street.

Was established in 1810. Its objects are to assist Artists during the pressure of sickness or the infirmities of age, and to relieve their widows and orphans. It does not afford relief to any Artist not a member, or to the widows or families of any who have not that claim on its resources. The amount paid each year to widows and orphans is about $\pounds_{1,200}$. The invested capital is $\pounds_{27,000}$.

THE ARCHITECTS' BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

Established 1850.

Honorary Secretary-WILLIAM H. WHITE.

This Society renders assistance to distressed Architects belonging to any part of the United Kingdom. The income for 1880-81 was £530; of this about £400 was paid to applicants, a portion of the remainder having been invested in stock.

THE SPALDING FUND,

Edinburgh.

Factor-W. F. SKENE, D.C.L., W.S., 21, Hill Street, Edinburgh.

The late Peter Spalding, an officer of the Mint of India, bequeathed, in 1826, certain property as a fund for the support of Decayed and Superannuated Associate Artists belonging to the Royal Institution of Edinburgh, and named the Ordinary and Extraordinary Directors of the said Institution trustees for the investment of the fund and payment of annuities to such artists. The number of annuitants is at present ten, and the annuities given usually amount to £30. The annuitants are selected on a recommendation to the trustees by the President and two members of the Royal Scottish Academy.

THE ART SALES OF 1881.

The principal Art Sales in London are held at Messrs. Christie, Manson, and Woods, King-street, St. James's; Messrs. Fosters, Pall Mall; and Messrs. Phillips, New Bond-street. Engravings, china, and books on Art are usually sent to Messrs. Sotheby, Wilkinson, and Hodge, Wellington-street, Strand. The commissions charged are $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on pictures, and 10 per cent on engravings, china, &c., $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. being charged on unsold or bought-in lots. To secure a day at Messrs. Christie's application must be made some months beforehand, and Saturdays in the season are only allotted to exceptionally fine collections.

The Art Sales of 1881 were remarkable in many ways. An unknown buyer, who eventually proved to be Mr. Thomas Holloway, determined to possess, for the decoration of a charitable institution he was founding, certain works regardless of cost, purchased at the Coleman sale four

Landseers, namely:—"Man proposes, God disposes," £6,615; "Well-bred Sitters who never say they are bored," £5,250; "A Stag pursued by a Deerhound," £5,250; "Digging out the Otter," £3,097; two Stanfields, "The Battle of Roveredo," £3,465; and "Pic du Midi d'Ossau," £2,677; and Millais' "Princes in the Tower," £3,990. These enormous sums have only once been exceeded, namely, at the Novar sale in 1878, when nine of Turner's most celebrated pictures were sold. The highest price then reached, however, was only £6,142. The largest sum hitherto paid for a painting by Landseer was £5,932, at the Albert Grant sale in 1877.

The sale of the Bale collection was probably, for connoisseurs, the most interesting sale which has happened for many years. No one had ever collected with so much judgment or with such success in so many branches of Art. At this sale Turner's drawing, "Ingleborough," fetched £2,310; "Mrs. Otway," by Sir J. Reynolds, £1,260; "Interior of a Cabaret," by A. van Ostade, £1,008; an etching by Van Dyck, "Van de Wouver," £450; engraver's proof, "Ben Arthur," from Turner's "Liber Studiorum," £210; drawing of "The Marys," by Raphael, £535; a pair of Celadon match pots, £420; a miniature by Oliver, £2,126.

BEQUESTS TO ART DURING 1881.

The Artists' General Benevolent Institution received in June a legacy of £50 under the will of the late Miss Adelaide Neilson.

BIRMINGHAM.—The late Mr. J. H. Nettlefold bequeathed his collection of twenty-five oil pictures by David Cox to the Art Museum, the only condition being that they be exhibited in the evening by electric light. Mr. Nettlefold died on November 23rd.

THE PRINTSELLERS' ASSOCIATION.

Very few engravings of any note are published in England save through the medium of the Printsellers' Association. An analysis of the circulars issued monthly by that body is appended. It also includes many etchings, but particulars of a certain number, not published under its rules, will be found set out on page 181.

A short *résumé* of the objects of the Association may not be out of place here.

Proof states of engravings are usually divided as follows:-

Artists' Proofs.—With no engraved title, signed in pencil by the Artist and the Engraver.

Proofs before Letters .- Still without the title, and without the

foregoing signatures.

Lettered Proofs.—With the title of the work shortly and lightly engraved, in a manner capable of erasure when the title is finally placed on the plate in the print state.

It can easily be understood that this system of distinguishing the proofs is one which in no way protects a purchaser from a fraudulent publisher, for nothing is easier than for such an one in the event of any demand for an early state of an engraving, after the later state has been printed off, to efface the marks distinguishing that state and start again printing earlier proofs, the absence of lettering being set up as evidence which could not be gainsaid, spite of the worn appearance of the plate.

The good name of the printsellers having been actually imperilled through certain proceedings of this nature, an Association was formed, and a process has been adopted to prevent this fraud. It is this—The publisher, before the plate is placed in the printer's hands, has to make a declaration on a certain form as to the number of proofs of each state that he will print. He can only print through the medium of a printer, also a member of the Association, who is bound under severe penalties not to print more than the declared number. The proofs when printed are handed over to the Secretary of the Association, who impresses each with a stamp.

Artists' proofs are stamped on the left, proofs before letters and lettered proofs on the right. The stamp is altered for each engraving.

It will be seen that under this system connivance between the publisher, the printer, and the Secretary of the Association is necessary to enable a fraud to be perpetrated. No printseller who is a member of the Printsellers' Association may sell proofs exceeding in value 31s. 6d. which have not been stamped in this way.

LEGAL DECISION AFFECTING ART.

COURT OF APPEAL, March 3.

(Sittings at Lincoln's Inn, before LORDS JUSTICES JAMES, COTTON, and LUSH.)

EX PARTE LADY WILLOUGHBY DE ERESBY-IN RE THOMAS.

This was an appeal from a decision of the Chief Judge in Bankruptcy reported in *The Year's Art*, 1881, p. 189, as to the right to the signboard of the Royal Oak Inn at Bettws-y-Coed, in Wales, which was painted by David Cox.

Lord Justice James was unable to arrive at the same conclusion as the Chief Judge. It appeared to him beyond all doubt that in no conceivable way could this picture be the property of the trustees in the liquidation as a chattel by virtue of any ownership of Miss Thomas. She never acquired any right to it, for it was expressly excepted from what she bought from Mrs. Richards. The trustees could only take it as having been in the order and disposition of Miss Thomas with the consent of the true owner. It had been suggested on their behalf, but it was a defence which would not be favourably regarded, that they had got possession of the picture as wrongdoers, and were entitled to retain it as against Lady Willoughby de Eresby. The question, therefore, was whether as against the trustees the picture belonged to her either as a chattel or as the owner of the house. His Lordship was of opinion that it belonged to her as something which was annexed to the freehold. It was proved beyond all doubt that there was in 1847 a signboard affixed to the wall of the house by iron staples. His Lordship would assume that it was then what auctioneers call a "tenant's fixture"—that is, something which the tenant had put up, and which he could

remove during his tenancy. David Cox went up a ladder and painted on the board that which was now a very valuable picture. He painted it as the sign of the house, and a few years afterwards he retouched it. It continued as the sign of the house for some years while the tenancy from year to year continued. There was this thing affixed to the building, which was a tenant's fixture, but which was not removed by the tenant during the tenancy. It survived the new lease, which was granted in 1861. It appeared impossible to say, in the absence of any new agreement, that this fixture, which was not removed during the tenancy, could be afterwards removed by the man who took the new lease in 1861. All that appeared was that a new lease was granted in 1861 by Lady Willoughby de Eresby's predecessor in title to Robert Roberts for twentyone years. It would have been utterly impossible for him to have said that this signboard was a tenant's fixture which he could have removed. He had not put it up; it was demised to him by the demise of the house, with the signboard on it. It was a part of the house, and there was no right to remove it. The signboard ceased to be a tenant's fixture in 1861, and if it did not cease to be a tenant's fixture then it certainly did on the granting of the second lease in 1871. unless it could be supposed that the removal of it to the inside of the house in 1866 had converted it as against the landlord into a chattel. It was impossible to say that could be so. The tenant continued it in the entrance hall, and, according to his Lordship's view of the evidence, placed it there as the sign of the house. To say that the landlord's right could be affected by such a transaction would be contrary to the truth and justice of the case. It was Lady Willoughby de Eresby's property, and she claimed it when Mrs. Richards wanted to remove it. She was the true owner of it, and it never became with her consent a chattel of which the liquidating debtor was the reputed owner. It appeared to his Lordship that Lady Willoughby de Eresby had established her title to the picture as part and parcel of the house.

Lord Justice Cotton and Lord Justice Lush expressed their opinions to the same effect.

Mr. Romer stated that Lady Willoughby de Eresby intended to refix the picture in the inn.

—Pupil of Royal Academy; first exhibited there in 1832, after-

wards at the British Institution.

COLLINSON, JAMES, one of the original seven members of the famous Pre-Raphaelite Brethren, member of the Society of British Artists from 1861 to 1870, and occasional exhibitor at the Royal Academy, his first picture having been shown in 1847.

COUSEN, JOHN, engraver of many of Turner's and other pictures, born at Bradford in 1803, died December 20, 1880, at South

Norwood.

ELMORE, ALFRED, R.A., a well-known figure and incident painter, born June 18, 1815, at Cork, died January 24. In 1832 admitted a student of the Academy Schools; first exhibited in 1834, afterwards studied for years in Paris. Elected an Associate in 1845 and an Academician in 1857.

EVERARD, P. L., picture dealer, born in Belgium 1834, died in

London, January 29.

HALL, Mrs. S. C., art writer and wife of the former editor of The

Art Fournal, died January 30.

HART, SOLOMÓN ALEXANDER, R.A., born April, 1806, at Plymouth, died June 11th.—Of Hebrew parentage. Entered the Royal Academy Schools in 1823, elected Associate 1835, Academician 1840. He succeeded Charles Leslie as Professor of Painting in

1857, which he resigned in 1865 on being appointed Librarian to the Academy.

HUME, HENRY, painter of landscapes, born 1856, died April 25.

KNIGHT, JOHN PRESCOTT, R.A., portrait painter, born 1803, died March 26.—He entered the Academy Schools in 1823, first exhibited in 1824, was elected an Associate in 1836, and an Academician in 1844. He was Secretary of the Academy from 1848 to 1873, and from 1839 to 1860 Professor of Perspective. A frequent exhibitor at the Academy's exhibitions.

MONTI, RAFFAELLE, sculptor, born in Milan 1818, died October 16.

—He studied under his father, and came to England in 1849.

NESFIELD, WILLIAM A., one of the first members of the Society of Painters in Water Colours, born 1793, died in London, March 2.

—In his early life a soldier under Wellington. Elected an Associate of the Society in 1823, where he exhibited many Swiss and Italian drawings; latterly a landscape-gardener, having retired from the Society in 1850.

O'NEILL, HENRY, writer on Art subjects connected with Ireland,

died December 21, 1880.
