THIS IS THE BOOK, De Vincienque in scope and importance. The architectural, floral, soological, alphabetical and estistic, all sapped out in their striking and essential fundamentals. Glorious illustrated examples. We have all felt moved by "intrinsic beauty", and Docki (an architect) shows us why - by revealing the underlying structural geometries which abound in natural and man-made works of "art". 

This handsome book is chock-full of well executed inspiring illustrations (color too), and explanatory graphics. The complete coverage (as the title suggests) makes it important to those practicing, admiring or learning about the representation of nature's syriad manifestations.


Not your run-of-the-mill naturalist chatagua in the style of Lives of a Cell and Co., and certainly the opposite end of the spectrum from Darwinian (verbose) dissertation. You won't find ripe quotable facts here (go to your texts), but spend some time contemplating the depth in these simple poetic enecdotes. The writing triggers an understanding for the observer of earth. Awareness abounds. Reading his works is like being in nature's very essence, it will make your next voyage out the door different.

THE ARTISTS

GERTRIDE MYRRH REAGAN, Fiber Artist: "To draw or diagram something is to "own" it in an odd way. I started out wanting to "own" the graceful intricacy of maps and cells. Then, I began to see relationships between common natural patterns, and showed groups of them integrated within a single work. This was the common thread in my drawings, prints, scrapbooks, slide shows, and batiks. Oping these, I found that each pattern stands for shifting and repeating relationships. Now my big love is fluid dynamics, which I hope to animate with computers squeday. Patterns and symbols are ciphers, abbreviations for the complexity of reality, but for me they have also been pointers toward new worlds of ideas to "own".



MERRY RENK, Goldsmith: "Animals have had strong personal meaning in my dreams for many years, and after working with images im family landscapes as well as single animals, it was a natural outgrowth to develop animal families as mandalas. These animal images are for me the freedom to express multi-layered concepts, including the cycle of life which one family represents. By Jewelry has become a journal or families, dreams, places, and events. The wedding crown, "Butterfly Tree" reflects my happy momories of Monarch butterflies and the splendor of their clustering on the pine trees in Pacific Grove."


