

The New Underground Press An Introduction to the Less Well Known Magazines on the Left

Many people may not be fully aware of the range and richness of the contemporary left's periodical literature. Magazine racks are disappearing even from university bookstores and radical publications are disappearing from those racks still existing. As an example, Out Of Town News, at Harvard Square, used to carry a reasonably good selection of radical journals, magazines and newspapers. Now they have only a few. Virtually no radical publications even make it into standard magazine outlets, say in Store 24, Barnes and Noble, or street corner stands. We hope this brief survey will help inform. It has been hastily compiled (our apologies for any oversights) and based mainly on material available at Red Book (so come on out to J.P!). Most of these magazines are published by collectives, often on a shoestring.

Arsenal: Surrealist Subversion. Black Swan Press, 1726 West Jarvis Ave, Chicago, Il. 60626.

Four issues in 18 years, but well worth the wait. Journal of the Chicago Surrealist group. The most brilliant invective in American literature. Angry. Uncompromising. Provocative. Mindblowing perspectives on just about everything. Total revolt. A must read for anyone who seriously hates capitalism.

Processed World, 41 Sutter St. #1829, San Francisco, Ca. 94104.

This is a hot little magazine. Started in early 80's. 23 issues so far. Absolutely fabulous graphics. A scream. Wild. Burns the screen of computer myths, automated office work, "clean" technology. Some fiction. Focus on work, and getting free from it. Implicit workers control perspective. You'll enjoy this one.

Red Balloon 2652 Cropsey Ave #7H, Brooklyn, NY 11214. Current issue, Spring, 1988 #13, \$3.50

Hatched in 1969 at SUNY Stony Brook. Still going. Issue #13 is a blockbuster. Large. Thoroughly nonsectarian. Thoroughly intelligent. Wide range of topics. Great graphics. The spirit of the sixties lives. This collective is with it. Very in touch. Aware.

Midnight Notes, box 204, Jamaica Plain, Ma, 02130 \$7 for 2 issues.

Iconoclastic. Totally subversive. The "Great Refusal: into the eighties. Highly informed. Issues on computers, the anti-nuclear movement, the work/energy crisis, prisons/law/

police. Some of the hottest political writing of the eighties. Nine issues since 1980.

Ideas and Action. P.O. Box 40400, San Francisco, CA, 94140, \$6 for 4 issues. Published by Workers Solidarity Alliance, which is the U.S. section of the International Workers Association (the "anarcho-syndicalist" international founded in Berlin in 1922). Excellent articles. Lots of international tieins. Focus is on direct action, self-management, rank-and-file activism. 10 or 11 issues since early 80's

Changing Work. A magazine about liberating worklife. \$14 for 4 issues. Heller School, Brandeis University, P.O. Box 9110, Waltham, Ma. 02254-9110. Started in 1984

Nine issues so far. Covers the actual movement for democracy and co-operation at the workplace. Most articles written by those involved. Currently publishing a set of 10-year retrospectives on worker-controlled enterprises.

Madness Network News P.O. Box 684, San Francisco, Ca. 94101

Hard hitting anti-psychiatry, anti-electric shock, anti-lobotomy magazine. Lots of writing by ex-patients. Covers the mental patients liberation movement. Shocking, Subversive (this publication may be defunct)

Connexions: An International Women's Quarterly Published by People's Translation Service, 4228 Telegraph Ave, Oakland, Ca 94609. \$15/year.

Each issue focuses on a specific theme. A collective product of feminists of diverse nationalities and political perspectives. Many translations. Nicely done.

3 years old. Published by "rank-and-file" classroom teachers and educators in Milwaukee. Seeks to break the domination of administrators and educational consultants over discussion of educational issues. Newspaper format. Stimulating.

One of the best all around sources of information about the environmental movement. Very nicely designed and produced magazine. Founded by the organizers of the first Earth Day.

"Let's Put the <u>Movement</u> Back in the Labor Movement". Excellent 16 page newsletter on attempts to rejuvenate the labor movement from the bottom up. An efficient way to keep informed. Against "business unionism". National coverage. The group has also published several books. Resource lists.

Two years old. A project on "Neither East nor West". News from Russia and Eastern Europe. Anti-authoritarian focus (Libertarian Anarchist). Very hard to come by information like this.

The official publication of the Mohawk Nation. Newspaper format. 32 pages. Lots of news coverage and interpretive essays on the American Indian Movement. 21 years of publishing.

Full coverage of the Nicaraguan revolution and U.S. support groups and activities.

News and Letters, 59 East Van Buren, *Room 707, Chicago, Il. 60605. \$2.50/year -10 issues*

Newspaper of the "Marxist-Humanist" tendency developed by the late Raya Dunayevskaya and comrades. One of the oldest nonvanguard party radical publications in the U.S. Lots of rank-and-file reportage. Lots of international labor and movement news. Well worth a subscription.

New Politics. PO Box 98, Brooklyn, N.Y. 11231. \$20 for 4 issues

A revival of the original *New Politics* (1961-1978). Pursues a "Third Camp" perspective, seeking to steer a course between the bankruptcy of Capitalism and Communism. Commitment to democracy. international Focus. Very solid journal on cutting edge of contemporary politics. Plenty of historical material.

Fifth Estate, Box 02548, Detroit, Mi. 48202. \$5/year (quarterly)

An old-timer. A true survivor from the sixties. More than twenty years of continuous publication. Anti-authoritarian. Questions technology. Focuses on ecology, democracy,. Two issues back, launched a critique of and debate about "Deep Ecology".

Covert Action Information Bulletin. PO Box 50272, Washington, DC 20004

Thoroughly researched articles on the government's "dirty tricks". Reportage on government spies, soldiers of fortune, the CIA's machinations abroad and at home, domestic surveillance, biological warfare. Had a special issue on the AIDS crisis. Very frightening material.

Two-year old effort to monitor the machinations of multinational monster corporations. A useful endeavor considering that national boundaries are relatively meaningless now for understanding the world economy.

Founded in 1982. A forum for labor and community activists. One of the group helping to revitalize the U.S. labor movement.

One of only four magazines in the US following a more or less syndicalist approach (the others being *Ideas & Action, Workers Democracy* and *Industrial Worker* (IWW). Takes a strict line against working through existing "business unions".

A general all purpose socialist magazine. Non-sectarian. Independent.

Started at Columbia University in late sixties. Subsequently moved with its editor to West Coast. A scholarly journal from an orthodox Marxist position. *Praxis International* Published by Basil Blackwell, 108 Cowley Rd. Oxford OX4IJF, England.

Patterned after its predecessor, *Praxis*, from Yugoslavia, and involving many of the same people, this solid left journal provides nonsectarian analyses of wide ranges of topics facing the movement.
